FREDERICK BEDDOME *

Son of Benjamin Beddome, Esq., late of Marmora, out now of Minnedosa, Manitoba, committed suicide by drowning at the latter place last week. The sad intelligence was received at Marmora on Friday last, by telegraph. The unfortunate young man was well known in this neighborhood, and although being considered a little " queer" by some of his most intimate friends, was nevertheless highly respected, as was also his parents. The family removed from Marmora to Minnedosa about a year ago, and for some time previous to that the deceased acted as Marmora correspondent for the Review, writing over the name of " Fritz." He was laboring under some kind of mental depression when he committed the rash act

A highly esteemed resident of this district in the early days passed away at Hazelwood, Man., in the person of Mrs. Arthur Beddome, on November 12th, 1938, at the advanced age of 90 years. Her maiden name was Susan Terrion. In 1865 she was married to Arthur George Beddome, a resident of Ontario. In 1879 they went west living for two years in Winnipeg. In 1881 they moved to what is now Minnedosa, before the place had a name. At that time the only means of transportation west of Winnipeg was by horse or ox cart. Shortly afterwards they moved to the Hazelwood district where they have since resided.

A family of nine sons and three daughters were born to Mr. and Mrs. Beddome of whom six sons and two daughters, survive. Mr. Beddome predeceased her in 1918. The surviving sons are Benjamin, of Washington; Arthur, Hazelwood, Man., Ernest, Garry, Ind.;Neville, Winnipeg, Man.; George, Kansock, Man.; and David at home. The daughters are Mrs. C. D. Orr, Port William, Ont., and Mrs. Sadie Thompson, at home. She is also survived by 51 grand children and 55 great grandchildren.

The funeral took place in Hazelwood district. Service was conducted by Rev. A. Cooper and interment took place in Minnedosa cemetery. She remained in her home on Prince St. until December of 1952 when she went to reside at Brucelea Haven.

The Bell home was previously located at the corner of the Durham Road and George St., a third way up Shaw's Hill. On the premises Mr. Bell conducted a chicken hatchery, which gained wide recognition for quality of product.

The late Mrs. Bell was an active member of St. Thomas' Anglican church for many years, and despite her crippled hands in later life, was most efficient with the needle, making many attractive articles.

Surviving are one daughter, (Muriel) Mrs. T. A. Jamieson of Toronto, one grandson, James E Jamieson of Manassas, Virginia and one great-granddaughter, Kathryn Marie, of Manassas, Virginia, and one sister, Mrs. William James Jones of Marmora.

The remains rested at the Tanner and Pearson Funeral Home until Saturday afternoon when the Rev. J. Our quiet community was shocked to hear of the fatal accident which befell Mr. Carl Blakely while motoring on the 4th Concession of Rawdon, Evidently something went wrong with the steering gear as Mr. Blakely lost all control of the car, with the result that it turned over, pinning the unfortunate young man beneath. Timely aid arrived and after extricating Mr. Blakely, medical assistance was summoned after which he was taken to Belleville Hospital where he died a short time after being admitted. His hobby was curling and he was a charter and enthusiastic member of the Quinte Curling Club. He was ever ready to instruct the new members in the art of curling and in competition was a tough contender. In the club house he was affable and friendly and he will be sadly missed. He was also a member of the Bay of Quinte Country Club and the Quinte Yacht Club.

Charlie Bonter liked to be among friends and they were legion in all parts of the Quinte district. In his business he enjoyed a wide clientele and he was a successful operator. Many of the buildings in the province are finished in stone from his quarries.

He was a member of the United Church. Mr. Bonter who never married, is survived by his mother.
