The Herald is in receipt of a letter from Mr. Richard Campion, who is now temporarily residing in Brandon Manitoba, giving information of the death of his brother George, a former resident of Marmora township and of the Deloro districts. With his uncle, the late Richard Campion, he carried on farming operations on what was known as the old Lily Creek Farm. Following is an obituary from the Manitoba Oak Lake

News:

Friends in Bellevue, Pipestone and Virden districts learned with profound regret of the passing of George Reed Campion, who died following a brief illness at his home. Howheatley Farm, Bellview, Tuesday, April 16th. Mr. Campion was born at Marmora, Ont., August 10th, 1857, and shortly after reaching his majority came west. He worked for a time with a survey party and was amongst the first to homestead in the district where he lived for nearly half a century. While operating his farm successfully and devoted to his home and family, he found time to serve community in various capacities. He served as municipal councillor for five years in the eighties and for eight years he filled the position of postmaster. He also served as trustee and secretary-treasurer of Bellview School District for many years. Mr. Campion was a man with a kindly disposition, a good neighbour and a friend to everyone in his community. He was a member and elder of the United Church and was always ready to support the work of the Master, as well as help to promote every good cause.

He is survived by his widow, one daughter, Kathleen, at home; four sons - G.S., R.P., E.R., and E.T.—all farming in the district; also by a sister, Mrs.H. Stevens of Oak Lake, a brother, R.E. Campion of Brandon, and a grandson in the home district. These will have the sympathy of the whole community in their great loss.

The funeral was held on Thursday, April 18th. A short service at the home preceded the service at the United Church, Pipestone, which was altogether too small to accommodate the large number of neighbors and friends, including several from Virden, who thus paid their last tribute to an esteemed pioneer and man. The services were conducted by Rev. Dr. James Carlin. Many beautiful flowers, tokens of sorrow, esteem and sympathy, including a wreath from Belleview district, across from Pipestone United Church Board, a spray from the United Church Ladies Aid and many from personal friends and friends of the family. Long; one son, Reginald; three daughters, Mrs. Thomas Sutherland and Mrs. Henry Holt, of Rapid City and Mrs. Willard Warren of Fairpoint; two step children Mrs. Ralph Shaykett of Fruitdale and Charles Long of Lodge Grass, Montana. The original edition of 1868 is now so rare that second-hand copies sell at as high a figure as \$10 each. Marmora - More than 200 people attended the funeral service Saturday of Betty Card, the 15-year old Grade 10 CHSS student who was found murdered at the rear of Earl Prentice Public School Nov. 22. The municipal parking lot just up Bursthall Street from McConnell funeral home was filled to capacity and both sides of Bursthall were lined with mourners' cars.

The 1pm funeral service, conducted by Rev. Bob Quick, concluded about 1:30, but people remained in the funeral home for about one-half hour offering condolences to Betty's parents, Peggy Crawford and William Card. Family members followed the white casket out of the funeral home and immediately took their places in the lead car. A white OPP car led the procession to St. Paul's Anglican cemetery, Roslin. The rear of a following van was filled with floral tributes. It is believed a trust fund has been established in Betty's name.

BERNARD CARMAN INSTANTLY KILLED BY POLICE CRUISER *

A tragic accident occurred at Eldorado last Friday evening when Bernard Wesley Carman was struck by a police car, said to have been driven by Provincial Police Constable Arthur Bulyea, and instantly killed. The accident occurred just after the close of the Orange Lodge at Eldorado and there was a number of witnesses. It is reported that Bernard Carman had been standing at the side of the road talking to Albert Hagerman, who was parked on the east side of the road. He had turned to cross the road to his brother's car when he was struck by the cruiser.

Police claim the officer was blinded by the light of a car parked on the opposite side of the road and did not see Carman. They also claim the cruiser was not travelling fast at the time. Members of the Lodge, who witnessed the accident, claim it was travelling about 45 miles an hour. An inquest was ordered by Coroner Dr. S. R. Beatty and the facts should be brought out then.

Bernard Wesley Carman, who lived on R.R. 1, Eldorado, was born in Madoc Township, son of Mrs. C. Carman and the late Collingwood Carman. He was fifty-one years of age and had lived all his life in Madoc Township, where he was highly esteemed and had many friends.

Besides his mother he is survived by his wife, the former Vivian Clemenger, and three daughters, Beulah, 19, Barbara, 18 and Wilma, 15, all at home. He had no sons.

He is also survived by six brothers, Percy, Arthur and Ross, of Marmora Township, and Everard, Delbert and Ezra Carman, of Madoc township.

The late Mr. Carman, who was a successful farmer, was a member of Eldorado United Church, Eldorado, L.O.L. 517 and R.B.P. No. 1055, Eldorado.

The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon and was one of the largest held in that part of the township. It proceeded from his late residence to Fox's United Church for service. Rev. J. F. Lane of Madoc. officiated, assisted by Rev. J. Watson, of Madoc, and Rev. J. Crabble, of Eldorado.

At the graveside the Royal Black Preceptory service was conducted by Sir Knight W. J. Cottrell of Marmora, and Sir Knight Albert Empey of Madoc.
