An inquest may be held into the death of Edward Galloway of Deloro, Ontario's Chief Coroner Dr. H.B. Cotnam said recently. Mr. Galloway, who lived near radioactive slag heaps for a number of years, died last summer of lung cancer at the age of 53. The inquest would be the first of its kind in Canada, as an inquest has never been held to investigate a radiation-related death. Prior to his death, Mr. Galloway issued writs against Eldorado Nuclear Ltd. of Port Hope, Deloro Smelting and Refining Co., the Ministry of Health and the Ministry of the Environment, and the Atomic Energy Control Board of Canada. Mr. Galloway charged that carelessness on the part of all five of those bodies was responsible for his contraction of lung cancer.

For 11 years Mr. Galloway, five of his six children, and his wife Sylvia lived beside the Deloro Smelting and Refining Co. Ltd. which ceased operation in 1961. The Atomic Energy Control Board found radiation levels to be 133 times higher than normal in the family's home in Deloro. The Galloways were ordered to move to a provincially-leased home in Marmora in late 1975. Mr. Galloway underwent treatment for lung cancer from February 25, 1975 until his death last summer. He was instructed to receive medical testing in 1975 when the province discovered the unusually high radiation levels. Mr. Galloway told the Marmora Herald last spring that his house was originally purchased from Eldorado Nuclear Ltd. by the Deloro Smelting and Refining Co. in 1969. The house was sold to Mr. Galloway four years later.

Mr. Galloway said the Deloro company bought a quantity of nuclear waste from the Eldorado company, removed the cobalt from it, and used the remaining material to fill a hollow adjacent to the home he subsequently bought. When Mr. Galloway bought the house in 1964 he knew the hollow had been filled, but was unaware that 10 to 15 feet of radioactive waste slag had been used as fill, he told The Herald prior to his death.

The closure order against the Galloway home was issued last fall when a quantity of radioactive ore was reported missing from Eldorado and an investigation was launched. That investigation revealed that radon gas was escaping from the waste used as fill. The closure order specifically states that radon gas does cause lung cancer, Mr. Galloway said in March.

"My family and I were exposed to the radioactive products for 11 years. I feel Deloro Smelting and Refining Co. is careless for dumping it there and the Atomic Energy Board should never have allowed them to handle it," Mr. Galloway stated last spring.

Mr. Galloway had a chest x-ray in 1967 when he was employed at the Deloro mine and no problems were revealed. One of 15 doctors who examined him at the Kingston Cancer Clinic in 1975 attributed his lung cancer to radioactive waste. Other members of the Galloway family were also tested. Doctors told the Galloways at the time that consequences of radiation contamination may not appear for 20 years.

Mr. Galloway incurred further complications as a result of getting treatment for the lung cancer. He suffered from a radiation reaction and sugar diabetes. Ontario Provincial Police officers are investigating the circumstances surrounding Mr. Galloway's death. Dr. Cotnam has predicted that the police investigation will be completed early this month, and the inquest could be held within the next two months. While the closure order issued against the house by Public Health Inspector Dr. J.H. Aitken dated October 31, 1975 said, "Persons who inhabit the said household premises are being subjected to excessive exposure to radiation with consequential risk of developing lung cancer therefrom,"

Dr. Cotnam has said that it would be difficult to prove that radon gas was directly responsible for a death.

A story which appeared in The MarmoraHerald last spring quoted the late Edward Galloway as saying that carelessness on the part of five bodies -- Eldorado Nuclear Ltd. of Port Hope, Deloro Smelting and Refining Co., the Ministry of Health and the Ministry of the Environment, and the Atomic Energy Control Board of Canada - was responsible for his contraction of lung cancer. Those facts were again quoted in The Herald last week.

Mr. Galloway's widow, Sylvia Galloway, says that Mr. Galloway actually said carelessness could have contributed to his contraction of cancer, but he admitted that he might have suffered from cancer anyway. "

Mrs. Galloway also said that it was incorrectly reported in that story last spring that the house the Galloways purchased in Deloro was originally owned by Eldorado Nuclear Limited. Mrs. Galloway says that in fact, Eldorado never owned the house. It was owned by the Deloro Smelting and Refining Company, from which the Galloways purchased it. We apologize to Mrs. Galloway for any embarrassment this incorrect information may have caused.

An inquest may be held into Mr. Galloway's death. He died last summer at the age of 53 after living near radioactive, slag heaps in Deloro for a number of years

A coroner's jury ruled last week in Belleville that Edward Galloway, formerly of Deloro, died July 8, 1976 as a result of cancer which developed from both cigarette smoking and exposure to radon gas.

Mr. Galloway, his wife Sylvia and their children resided beside a radioactive slag disposal site in Deloro for 12 years. The inquest into Mr. Galloway's death was ordered by Ontario's chief Coroner Dr.H.B. Cotnam-. The inquest is believed to have been the first of its kind in Canada, as an inquest has never been held to investigate a radiation-related death.

The coroner's jury made a number of recommendations regarding handling of radioactive wastes, following the four day inquest which ended Friday.

The jury recommended that the federal and provincial governments should work together to ensure that no one is living unknowingly within range of unacceptable levels of radioactivity anywhere in Canada. Geoffrey Knight of the Atomic Energy Control Board told the inquest that radon gas levels inside and outside the Galloway house, tested in 1975, were higher than normal and very unacceptable. Mr. Galloway was unaware that he was being exposed to levels of radioactivity three and a half times more than the safe amount set by the Atomic Energy Control Board.

The coroner's jury also recommended that a single agency including representatives of both the federal and provincial government should have overall responsibility for monitoring and detecting radiation exposure among members of the public.

It was revealed during the inquest that no government ministry or department had the responsibility to ensure that residents are not harmed unknowingly by radioactive material.

Mr. Knight said at the inquest that technically no one is responsible for the public by legislation. The jurisdiction of the Atomic Energy Control Board only extends to protection of people working with atomic energy.

The jury also said that to facilitate more effective investigation of radioactivity complaints, better communication should be developed amongst all government agencies concerned with the problem. This again involves clearly defining responsibility of each level and department of the governments.

The jury also recommended that members of the public who are ordered out of their homes because of dangerous levels of radioactivity, be compensated by the federal and provincial governments. Mr. Galloway's widow Sylvia has been paying for expenses on the house in Deloro which the family was forced to vacate. Since that time, she has been living in accommodation provided by the government, but has never been assured of long term support or restitution. Another recommendation of the jury was that follow up studies should be done for cases involving possible exposure to unacceptable levels of radioactivity.

Finally, the jury decided that methods of transporting radioactive materials should be of a standard type, properly licenced by the AECB, have appropriate markings, and that their movements should be carefully controlled by AECB.

Mr. Galloway did part time work during 1952 driving loads of radioactive ore from Eldorado Nuclear Ltd. to the Deloro plant. The inquest revealed that the workers who transported 5,000 tons of radioactive waste to Deloro Smelting and Refining in the late 1950's did not know the waste was radioactive. They were not told to take precautions.

The final witness to testify at the inquest Dr. Ernest Letourneau of the Department of Health and Welfare, said there will be a country-wide study conducted this year to determine the normal level of radon gas naturally occurring in houses.

## **GARDINER ORVAL GAWLEY \***

A member of the Havelock- Belmont Branch 389, Royal Canadian Legion and of the Rotary Club of Peterborough, passed away at the Civic Hospital in Peterborough, Thursday, January 3. Gardiner, of R.R. 2 in Norwood, was the husband of the late Emma McLaughlin. He was in his 82nd year.

Mr. Gawley was born in Madoc Township and moved with his parents, the late Royal Gawley and Kate Hamilton, to Quebec. He was a dear brother of Murisson of Paris; Mrs. Freda Nickle of Cobourg; Mrs. Tom (Pauline) Wight of Trent River; Mrs. Opal Hilliard and Elwyn of Carleton Place; Mrs. Robert (Elizabeth) Tufts of Campbellford and the late Van. Camp.

Upon the death of his mother, Gardiner returned to the area as a young boy residing in the Cordova area and attending school there. As a youth and young man, he was full of vim and vigor and wanderlust. He went west to Saskatchewan on the "Harvest Excursion" and worked there. He spent some time in northern British Columbia as a prospector.

However, Gardiner was always drawn back to this area. He worked for several years for Scott's Bakery in Havelock, both as a baker and a delivery truck driver on routes that took him all over the countryside in a wide radius from Havelock.

He enlisted in the army soon after the outbreak of World War II. As a member of the invasion force, he landed in France in the Caen area. He was wounded and returned to England.

In 1946, Gardiner married Emma McLaughlin and the couple resided in Belleville. However, they soon returned to the McLaughlin family farm in Belmont Township which they operated for many years raising their prized Hereford beef' cattle.

Gardiner was also quite involved in the community over the years. Besides being active in the Ontario Federation of Agriculture and the Peterborough County Plow man's Association, he spent a term as Reeve of his beloved Belmont Township. He was Chairman of the Board at the time of the construction and opening of the Havelock-Belmont Public School.

When his farm chores became a little lighter he spent some time working at Security at Trent University.

Countless hours were spent by both Gardiner and Emma in helping to organize and establish the new Senior's building on George Street in Havelock. Gardiner's philosophy was: "if it's worth doing, it's worth doing well."

Travel was an important hobby to both Gardiner and Emma – both locally with their van, and on a wider scale to Ireland, England, France, Barbados, California, Florida, Western Canada and Alaska.

Besides the abovementioned brothers and sisters, Gardiner was much loved and will be sadly missed by several nieces and nephews, as well as a host of neighbours and friends.

The funeral service at Brett Funeral Chapel in Havelock was held on January 7 officiated by Gardiner's grandniece, the Reverend Jan Wight Shearman. Reverend Shearman was assisted by the Reverend Leo Leahy. A Spring burial will be in Mount Carmel Cemetery.

**ANDREW GAWLEY TO VISIT BIG FAIR \***

Meaford.Ont., May 25.

Andrew A. Gawley, "the man with the steel hands, left for the Chicago Century of Progress Exposition to day after reconsidering an offer he turned down a week ago.

Gawley will interview officials of the organization seeking his services and is expected to remain at the Exposition making steel hands for unfortunate persons afflicted like himself, Gawley, whose name and feats of dexterity with his steel hands .became widely known when the story of his accomplishments was published a few weeks ago, fell across a whirling buzz saw when 17 years old. His arms were severed between the elbow and wrist.

While he suffered In the hospital he planned the "steel hands" —hands that could do almost everything that human hands could perform.

After he left hospital his blind father and himself worked for weeks and succeeded in cutting, grinding and filing the "hands" from hard steel. Since then Gawley has made dozens of hands for others.

For 30 years Gawley has made these hands though the work is slow and tedious in his little machine shop in Meaford, where he has managed to make a living. He works day and night, unaided. He works with only common tools, including a small drill, and finds it necessary to "fit" every hand for seldom are there two alike.

Tourists and visitors at Gawley's little workshop stand and gaze for hours at the "impossible" things he can do, from lifting and drinking from the most fragile of china, to splitting wood and pulling an engine apart. Gawley has a Powerful grip with both hands and has been known to lift more dead weight than man with ordinary arms. He is.nmechaotic by trade and he will attempt any job.

For the past 15 years he has repaired lawn mowers bicycles, engines and all sorts of machinery. His "steel hands" are simple, with five strong grips of different degrees of power. He can crush a stone to powder, break wire, tie his shoelaces, dress himself and eat with knife and fork.

He is speedy with his work as any skilled mechanic. He can respoke a bicycle wheel and insert the hub in less than 30 minutes. He can drive a motorcycle as well as a motor car, and frequently rides a bicycle. He can write with pen and pencil and boasts of a good handwriting style.

Gawley's father who died four years ago, was blind for more than 50 years and never saw his son. Note- Mr. Gawley'a father was born in Marmora township and still has a number of relatives in Marmora village and township.

### **JOHN GILLEN   \***

In the death of Mr. John Gillen, briefly announced in our last issue, Madoc loses another of the old pioneers of this township. He was born near Cushindall, County Antrim, Ireland, February 2nd, 1826, and died February 2nd, 1903, exactly 77 years of age.

The deceased came to Canada in 1847. His father died crossing the ocean with fever, known as the emigrant fever of '47 and '48. He settled in Madoc and was married about 47 years ago to Miss McCauley, of Foxboro, who was a native of the same place and whom he had known in Ireland. She has been dead some 16 years.

Five children survive,—Alexander and Denis, of Madoc, Patrick of Arden, Mrs. Feeney of Belleville, and Mrs. Brownson of Stirling. Deceased has one brother and one sister living, Mr. Michael Gillen, of Marmora, and Mrs. John St. Charles of Michigan; a brother and sister dead, the late Patrick Gillen and Mrs. Authorson. The three brothers, John, Patrick, and Michael Gillen were the first discoverers and owners of the celebrated Deloro gold mines, and they operated the first crusher erected on the property.

### **PATRICK GILLEN   \***

There died in this village on the 17th ult., one who deserves more than a passing notice, namely, the late lamented Patrick Gillen, Esq.

Mr. Gillen was one of our oldest and most respected citizens. He lived here for almost forty years, and during that long period of time won the love and respect of all who knew him by his many acts of generosity and kindness. Before the Village grew to its present dimensions Mr. Gillen's house was always open to those who had to come here from long distances to do their business. Many a settler in the northern townships can recall the openhearted hospitality with which he was received by the deceased in years gone by, when we had none of our present commodious hotels, and when in fact the struggling settler had scarcely wherewith to pay for his lodging. To be in need of assistance of any kind was the only passport required to enlist his sympathy, and the many who often appealed to him will now remember him with grateful hearts for his numerous acts of kindness.

Mr. Gillen was a native of the County Antrim; Ireland, and came to Madoc when only nineteen years of age. By pluck and perseverance he conquered the many difficulties he had to encounter,

and in consequence soon acquired considerable property. At his death he was owner of that beautiful residence and splendid farm of 150 acres just outside the limits of our village corporation-, which are a standing monument to show that the only thing required to succeed in Canada is patience and perseverance. Mr. Gillen was greatly esteemed by all who knew him, and his familiar face will long be missed on the streets of our rising Village. His death was a surprise to all, as he was ailing only two days, and most persons never knew he was unwell. His funeral, which took place on Sunday, 18th ult., was attended by almost the entire village, and many from a distance came to pay their last respects to his memory. Rev. Father Collins conducted the funeral service and preached a most excellent and eloquent sermon suitable to the occasion. He left behind him his widow who has the heartfelt sympathy of the whole community in her sad bereavement. Mr. Gillen was a most energetic and enterprising citizen, and I am sure I speak the sentiments of all who knew him when I say "it will be long before we see his like again.
