WILLIAM JOHN PACK *

On Tuesday forenoon, March 12th William J. Pack, one of Marmora township's most highly esteemed and best loved citizens, entered into rest. He had been in failing health for a number of years and about three years ago underwent a serious operation in Peterboro Civic Hospital. His illness and suffering were so patiently and bravely borne that few realized the seriousness of his condition until a few months ago.

William J. Pack was fifty-five years of age and was born in Marmora township, only son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Pack. Thirty-one years ago he was married to Grace Lough, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lough. Shortly after their marriage they moved to a farm in Thurlow township, near Foxboro, where they resided for about four years. They then returned to the Pack homestead in Marmora township, where they have resided ever since. The late William Pack was a devoted member of St. Andrew's United church and formerly of the Methodist Church.

He was a member of the Session and also of the Board of Stewards and the official Board for a good many years and his loyalty and co-operation was greatly appreciated by ministers and members. So long as his health permitted he was a very regular attendant at the Church services. "Bill" Pack, as he was known to so many, served a long term as a member of the municipal council of Marmora and Lake. Most years the Council was elected by acclamation, but in every election he contested he had the distinction of heading the poll, sometimes by quite a margin, is proof that he was both liked and trusted by the electors of the municipality.

He was also a member of the school board for an even longer time and was secretary treasurer for quite a number of years. When the Township School Area was formed he was the first chairman of the School Board.

The deceased was a popular member of Marmora Lodge A.P. & A.M. No. 222, and in 1934 was Wor. Master of the Lodge. For about 20 years he was a director of Marmora Agricultural Society and always took an active interest in anything for the welfare of the community. In politics he was a strong Conservative, but was always kindly and fair in any election contest.

The late William Pack is survived by his wife and two sisters, Mrs. John Goodrich and Mrs. Irwin McCoy. The sympathy of the whole community, goes out to them in their bereavement. The funeral will be held this afternoon, leaving his late residence at 2 P. M. and proceeding to St. Andrew's United Church, Marmora, for service. Interment will be made in Marmora Protestant cemetery.

JOSIAH W. PEARCE *

A man, who for many years was a leading citizen of Marmora, held in high esteem by all classes, passed away in Belleville General Hospital shortly before noon yesterday, May 25th, in the person of Josiah W. Pearce. He spent the winter with Mrs. Pearce in Florida, returning to Belleville May 10th and the following day underwent an operation, but his advanced age prevented his recovery.

The late J. W. Pearce was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Peter Pearce and was born at Old Havelock over 88 years ago. Peter Pearce was the first postmaster of Havelock and gave it its name, calling it after Sir Henry "Havelock," who gained distinction during the Indian Mutiny in 1857 by the relief of Cawnpore. The deceased and two brothers, the late Joseph Pearce of Norwood, and the late Thomas P. Pearce, founder of The Pearce Company Limited, became prominent in the development of Marmora and Norwood. "Si" Pearce, as he was familiarly known to hundreds for many years, entered the mercantile business in Marmora, starting a general store.

For years he carried on business in what was known as the "Arcade" on Main street. When the block was destroyed by fire about 1904 he moved to the building now occupied by Clifford Jones. A few years later the late F. N. Marett was taken into partnership and the business grew rapidly.

For some years the late Mr. Pearce resided in the house on Forsythe Street, now occupied by Mr. Thos. E. Pritchard, and still owned by his daughter, Mrs. F. N. Marett. Later he built the house on Burstall Street, now owned by Miss M. Sullivan, and resided there until he moved to Belleville to become Bursar of the Ontario School for the Deaf. His home was widely known for its hospitality and many of the older residents still look back on the happy times spent there. The deceased took an active interest in everything pertaining to the interests of Marmora and North Hastings. He served for a time as a member of the Municipal Council and a member of the County Council for several years before Marmora village was incorporated, and was elected Warden of the County in 1901. In 1902 he was elected to represent North Hastings in the Legislature and retained the seat until 1911. In that year he did not allow his name to go before the Conservative Convention as a candidate, the late J. R. Cooke being selected, and the deceased was appointed Bursar of the Ontario School for the Deaf at Belleville and moved to that city. During the years he was a member of the Legislature he was very active in the interests of the Riding and secured much assistance for the improvement of roads and schools.

For some years he had been the oldest living Past Master of Marmora Masonic Lodge and for many years was one of its most valued members. He was also Treasurer of Marmora Methodist Church (previous to Church Union) for quite a number of years and a generous supporter. He also assisted the Agricultural Society and everything for the benefit of the community.

The late "Si" Pearce is best remembered for his personal qualities. A man of wide sympathies, kindly to all and fond of children, generous, with a keen sense of humor and love of keen sport he made a host of friends. He was known all over the County and had many friends in other parts of the Province.

The writer remembers with deep appreciation the many kindnesses, worthwhile advice and encouragement received from the late J. W. Pearce, when he first started in Marmora and tried to build up a business, and the friendship started then which ripened throughout the years.

The deceased was married three times and leaves a widow Mrs. Mary J. Pearce. He is also survived by one daughter, Mrs. F. N. Marett and four grandchildren — Donald Marett, Marmora; Douglas, Hamilton; Dorothy, Kingston, and James at home. His elder daughter, Bessie, passed away about 17 years ago.

The funeral will be held to-morrow. Service will be conducted at his late residence, Belleville, at 10.30 a.m., thence to the home of Mrs. F. N. Marett, Marmora, where a short service will be conducted at 3 p.m. Interment will be made in Marmora cemetery under the auspices of Marmora Masonic Lodge.
