FRED PINNER *

After a long illness Fred Pinner passed away in Peterborough Civic Hospital on Sunday, July 15th. He was born in Marmora, a son of Mrs. Urena Pinner and the late George Pinner and was in his 72nd year. His mother is Marmora's oldest citizen and is 97 years of age.

In the early years of the 19th century, when Marmora was noted as a lacrosse centre and competed with some of the leading teams of the Province, he was one of the star players of the local team, and was popular both with players and fans. He also took part in other sports on a smaller scale. In recent years, owing to ill health, he had lived a very retired life. He was a member of St. Paul's Anglican Church.

Besides his mother, he is survived by two sisters, Mrs. T. J. Butler, Toronto, and Mrs. G. R. Hartley, Marmora.

The funeral was held on Wednesday afternoon, proceeding from his late residence to St. Paul's Anglican Church, where service was conducted by Canon J. M. Brownlie. Interment took place in the family plot in Marmora cemetery, the committal services also being conducted by Canon Brownlie.

MRS. T. W. PINNER *

On July 1st, Martha Matilda, beloved wife of Wilson Thomas Pinner, was laid to rest in Marmora Cemetery beside, her daughter Annie (Mrs. S. T. Graham) who died in 1901. | Mrs. Pinner was the last of the family of ten children. The parents, Robert Christie and Rachel Sands, came to Canada from County Armagh, Ireland. Martha, the youngest child, was born at Williamsburg, Ontario, on November 23rd, 1855, and was married August 29th, 1873, to Thomas Wilson Pinner of Marmora, who lives to endure the loss of one who was a faithful and devoted companion during more than fifty years of life. The four surviving children are: G. W. Pinner, Vancouver, B.C.; T. R. Pinner. Massillon, Ohio; Mrs. James L. McCauley, Detroit, Mich.; and Mrs. Fred J. Hill of Smith's Falls, Ont. The family will be remembered in Marmora, Deloro, Malone, Whitehill, Mich., Clinton, Ottawa, Cordova Mines and Smith's Falls. For the past four years the parents have resided near Smith's Falls and during that time Mrs. Pinner had enjoyed surprisingly good health. Trouble with her heart is traceable, however, to the disastrous Halleybury fire, when, while visiting at Kennabeck she narrowly escaped suffocation. The recent attack of heart trouble baffled medical skill, and after a brief illness she peacefully passed away. Service was held at the residence in South Emsley, near Smith Falls, at 9 a.m. on July 1st. This was conducted by Bishop G. L. Monahan of the Standard Church, of which she was a consistent member. Numbers of relatives and friends attended from Smith's Falls, Brockville, Ottawa, and other points. The text was "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord, from henceforth." The deceased gave her life to God many years ago and her devotion has never wavered. To her family, to her friends, and to her fellow church workers her life has been an inspiration to nobler faith and better lives. Even the pain and suffering of her last illness served only to paint more brightly the colors of her faith, to fix more firmly her utter trust in the Supreme Being who ordered all things, the One to whom she had consecrated her earthly life. Her last moments were peaceful and happy, and the wonderful smile of transfiguring joy that illumined her face as death came, carried to those left behind the message "All's well". Friends and relatives accompanied the remains to Bonarlaw, and thence to the United Church at Marmora, where more had gathered to await the final service which was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Beckley, after which the body was interred in the family plot in Marmora Cemetery, there to await the Resurrection Morning.

THOMAS WILSON PINNER *

Another pioneer of Hastings County, Thomas Wilson Pinner, passed away in the Jarvis settlement on Friday, December 22nd, at the ripe age of 86 year. He was born in Sydney township on April 19th, 1847, his father operating a toll gate between Trenton and Belleville. Nearly all his life was spent in Hastings County, most of it in Marmora, Cordova Mines and Deloro. For a short time he lived in Clinton, Ont., and also in Smith's Falls for a couple of years. The deceased was a master mechanic, but like many of the pioneers could turn his hand to about any job that offered an opportunity. For a number of years he was engaged at the various mining centres in the county. He was quite widely known and had the gift of making many friends. He was a member of Marmora Masonic Lodge for many years and had been an honorary life member for several years.

He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. J. L. McCauley, of Detroit, Mich., and two sons G. W. Pinner and T. R. Pinner, both of Toronto. His wife predeceased him in 1927.

The funeral was held on Sunday, the 24th inst. Service was conducted at his late residence in the Jarvis settlement after which the remains were brought to Marmora for interment. Owing to the condition of the roads, part of the journey to Madoc had to be made with sleighs and the balance by auto, but the sleet storm made it almost impossible to see through the windshield of a car or to keep on the road. The service at the graveside was conducted by Rev. C. W. Hollingsworth, of Marmora.

During the years she was a resident at the Home she had many visitors and the fact that she lived to such a wonderful age speaks highly of the wonderful care she has received from the staff at the Home.

FRED PITT DROWNED

Last Friday morning Fred Pitt, aged 37 years, who had resided in Marmora Township or Village for three or four years, was drowned in the Moira River near Malone. Apparently he had slipped off the bank into about seven feet of water and was unable to swim. Mr. Walter Gawley, who was working nearby, heard him call for help and went to his assistance accompanied by Henry Nickle and Mervin Dafoe.

The body was recovered in a short time and artificial respiration used but failed to revive the victim. Dr. R. Taft was called and pronounced Pitt dead. Dr. S. Eagleson, Madoc, Coroner for the district was called and after learning the facts, as far as obtainable, decided an inquest was unnecessary.

A long and busy life ended Monday evening when Thomas E. Potts passed away at his home in the village. He had been in failing health for some time and recently his eyesight became very poor. He was born in Rawdon Township, over 80 years ago, a son of the late William Potts and wife, whose maiden name was Anne Barnum. Most of his life he was a resident of Marmora village.

As a young man he worked for the Pearce Company Limited for 13 years holding various positions. He also worked for Deloro Smelting & Refining Co. Limited for six years and ran the boarding house for three years. He operated the old St. James Hotel for nine years and then took over the management of the Royal Hotel for nine years. After leaving the Royal he operated the Tipperary House, Crowe Lake, for about five years. He next leased Huyck's Hotel, Tweed, later known as the Tweedsmuir Hotel, and operated it for six years,

During all the time he was in the hotel business Mr. Potts carried on without a liquor license and proved it was possible to make a success of it without one. His friendliness and consideration for the comfort of his guests and Mrs. Pott's ability as a cook made the hotel a popular stopping place.

Mr. Potts took a keen interest in municipal affairs. He served as a public school trustee for years and was a member of the village council for four years. He was always ready to support anything he thought in the best interests of Marmora and district and his strenuous support of them often made the meetings lively and interesting. One thing many admired about him was that no matter how hot the argument, when the meeting was over he did not hold any ill feelings or grudges.

Years ago when the "Booster Club" was organized to try to attract summer visitors and hunting and fishing parties, Mr. Potts enthusiastically supported it and gave considerable time to help the club to succeed.

Mr. Potts was the oldest member of Marmora L.O.L. No. 319 and served as Worshipful Master of the Lodge and as District Master. He was also a member of the Royal Black Preceptory and other branches of the Order. He joined L.O.L. No. 319 in July, 1896 and was well known to many Orangemen throughout this part of Ontario. He was a member of St. Andrew's United Church and formerly of the Methodist Church; in politics he was an ardent Conservative.

Mr. Potts was married to Ada Walker, of Gilmour, on July 3rd, 1895, and she has been a wonderful wife. She survives him and also three daughters and two sons. They are Mrs. Wilbert Bedore (Mary), Marmora; Gerald, Port Hope; Mrs. T. E. Pritchard, (Gertie), Peterborough; Clayton, Marmora; Mrs. Thomas Dickson (Myrtle), Beaverton. Also 14 grandchildren and 9 great grandchildren.
