Michael Benedict (Mike) Auger, former president of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association and widely known throughout the north for the past 22 years, died in St. Joseph's Hospital, North Bay, last Friday morning.

Mr. Auger, who was 48 years old Sept. 11, had been in hospital a week following an appendectomy. He had been recuperating satisfactorily but suffered a sudden relapse from which he failed to recover.

Mike Auger was one of Northern Ontario's most prominent hockey executives. He was immediate past president of the N.O.H.A. Prior to holding that post he served for many years on the executive and was central group convener for many seasons.

A resident of New Liskeard for 22 years, he had recently purchased a home in North Bay, where he and his family intended to reside. Mr. Auger, previously associated with the Ontario Liquor Control Board, had been in the employ of Canadian Fairbanks Morse for the past year.
