# **OBITUARY**

MRS. PATRICK CALLAGHAN

One of the oldest and most highly respected residents of Marmora township passed away on Monday 15th inst., in the person of Mrs. Patrick Callaghan, at the ripe age of 82 years. The deceased died at the home of her son, Thomas, after a brief illness, the infirmities of old age being the cause.

She was born in Belfast, County of Antrim, Ireland in 1827 and came to this country when she was about twenty years of age, and has since resided in Marmora township. She was a daughter of John Shannon and the eldest of nine children, one of whom, Mrs. John Neal, North Marmora, survives.

In 1852 she married Patrick Callaghan who predeceased her twenty-eight years ago. She leaves one son Thomas, of Marmora township, Mrs. Michael Sullivan, Marmora, and Mrs. John J. Buckley, Lancc ster, N. Y. In religion she was a Roman Catholic, and was always a devoted member of her church. The funeral was held on Wednesday morning to the Church of the Sacred Heart, where a High Solemu Requiem Mass was sung for the repose of her soul.
