Henora, widow of Patrick Callery imigrated to Canada between 1835 & 1840. With passage paid, and personal assets disposed of, Henora's only alternative was to bury her husband and take her children to Canada.

John Walsh married Estella .He was a school teacher and later school inspector with the "Separate School Board" in the Toronto area. John wrote several books, later used in the primary school education system. They had one daughter Joan, also a teacher. She never married.

Bartholemew "Bartley" Walsh (1885-1956) married Agnes Murphy (1887-1955). He farmed all his life. He was very active in local politics; spending several years in township council as councilor, deputy reeve, reeve, and county warden. They had five

Joseph E. Walsh (Joe E) married Mary Shannon and took over his fathers farm, which they operated until they retired and turned the business over to their son Gerald. Joe and Mary raised nine children - James , Mary, Patrick, Gerald, Bernard, Dennis, Terrance, Teresa, & Richard. Joe was a lover of music and a very capable violin player.

Patrick Callery married Bridget Cullen (born 1862, died 1939) at Read in 1894. Patrick and his brother Bartholemew operated a farm on a partnership basis all their lives. Patrick was township assessor in Tyendinaga for a number of years in the earley 1900's. Patrick loved music, especially Irish ballads and enjoyed singing and was a good stepdancer. Patrick and Bridget raised three children - Bartholemew, Catherine, & Thomas.

1-4-2-1

Bartholemew (Bartley) Callery married Mary McGrath (born 1898, died 1987) at Marmora in 1927. Bartley bought a farm on the fifth concession of Tyendinaga where he farmed until his death in 1938. Like his father. Bartley liked music; sang, played piano, violin, and played the organ at St Charles Church in Read for thirty years. They had two children - James Patrick (Pat) & Thomas Desmond (Tom). Bartley died in 1938 at age forty as a result of bloodpoison from a tooth extraction.

Catherine (Kate) Callery married Joseph (Joe) Buckley (born 1896, died 1967) at Read in 1929. Joe and Kate took over the family farm from his parents, where he farmed for many years. Kate was very ardent pianist. They had three children - John, Mary, & Lewis. Kate died in 1939, and Joe remarried Bertha Bishop.

Thomas Callery never married. He took over the farm from his parents, which he operated until his death in 1967. Tom was very fond of music, loved to sing, play the piano or violin.

Bartholemew Callery never married. He farmed in partnership with his brother Patrick until his death in 1941.

Dennis Callery married Catherine Macauley at Belleville in 19 . They took over the Macauley farm north of the village of Foxboro. After Catherine's parents died they sold their farm and bought another farm on the third concession of Tyendinaga west of

Queen's medical report from the 1930s confirms woman's memories

Madoc Twp. - Childhood memories can haunt one especially those surrounding a tragedy. It is never quite clear if something really happened or one just remembers talk around the kitchen table. Rarely can one confirm one's memory is accurate. Helen Feeney (nee Meraw), who now lives in Belleville, has a recurring nightmare. Seeing cattle drink from an old metal trough close to Highway #7 just east of Madoc brought back this nightmare and the tragedy that struck the Feeney family in 1932.

Helen, who was born in 1919, grew up as part of a close knit group of Irish Catholic families in Madoc Township.

Thomas Feeney, the son of the Meraws' neighbour Fred Feeney, and his wife Ethel, were healthy newlyweds when they took over the farm on the south side of Highway #7 just east of Madoc in 1927. Sadly, life started to go wrong for them.

"I remember the little white caskets," said Helen. "I would have been eleven or twelve years old at the time." These were for the babies who died soon after birth. "I remember a dead colt and I remember Mr. Feeney and Tom calling for my young brother to come and reach into a sow to retrieve some piglets. The piglets were dead. Calves were born dead too. Tom became sick too."

He was very ill when Ethel had her last baby which lived only a few hours. Tom had been brought down to his father's and mother's place because he was so sick. He wouldn't drink the water there. "I have to drink water from home it is so cold and clear," he said.

When Tom died soon after, they waked him in the house as was the custom. "His body was embalmed by Mr. Duffin from Stirling as Mr. Kelly the undertaker in Madoc was on holiday," remembered Helen. "When Duffin was draining the blood for the body he stopped. 'Woow, there is something suspicious here as there is no blood.' He suspected poison. The coroner's response was he knew the Feeney family and would classify the death as natural causes."

Dr. Eagleson from Madoc was the coroner at the time and Dr. Beattie was the new young doctor in Madoc.

"I remember Tom and Ethel," said Helen. After Ethel was alone she stayed on at the farm and her brother-in-law Frederick came to run the farm. "Frederick was sick a lot," said Helen. "I would go with Tom and stay at night as Ethel had the

little one." One baby girl had survived.

Helen said she used to go to elementary school with Jean Feeney, Tom and Frederick's younger sister. Helen herself married another of the Feeney brothers, Francis. "I just jumped the fence when I got married." The families were very close. The two elder Feeney sisters married two of Helen Meraw's uncles. "The fence was quite low and gas was rationed."

Frederick Feeney and Ethel continued to get sick. "We took Ethel to Kingston to see Dr. Third about a skin condition which had spread from her face and hands to her chest," remembered Helen. Dr. Third wrote a letter to Dr. Beattie, saying, you are putting too much arsenic in Ethel's medicine." (Arsenic was used in tonics at that time). Dr. Beattie's response was, "I have never put arsenic in her medicine."

This is where another member of the family came in. This was Uncle Bernie Callery, whose wife was a Feeney, and whose sister married Fred Feeney.

He and several of his sons worked at the Deloro Smelter and Refinery, and he knew something about arsenic poisoning. He urged them to get the water tested and took a sample to the company laboratory at Deloro.

Dr. Beattie also sent a sample to Toronto. Helen remembers word came back, "do not drink the water as there is a maximum dose of arsenic in it."

She then remembers, "Queen's students took samples of the well water. They took hair out of Ethel and out of the cows. I wonder what happened to the tea kettle?" She wonders still about who else could have been affected by the arsenic. The milk from the farm, went to the cheese factory, which was next door between the two Feeney farms. "I ate tons of the curd. Would pasteurization have removed the arsenic?" she asked. "Someone dug a new well in the barn and the contaminated well was capped." She is not sure whether it was the health department or someone from Queen's.

In 1937, Ethel and her daughter moved to an apartment in Belleville where she lived a long life. Her brother-in-law Frederick Feeney died in 1954 of cancer at only 44 years of age.

Tom Feeney was not the only young man to die suddenly. Helen remembers the case of a man called Wright who died mysteriously. When he died very suddenly, his wife blamed the water. He was renting Jim Pitt's farm, which was closer

"We thought when Highway number seven was blasted through from Marmora to Perth it may have effected the water," said Helen.

She was reminded of these sad events when she visited the area over March Break. She described how she felt a distinct chill when she saw the cattle trough at the site of the contaminated well. The wooden pump house, as she remembered it was still there.

What makes this all the more intriguing is Helen's story is borne out in an academic paper entitled "An Investigation of the Source of Arsenic in a Well Water," written by J. Wyllie, Professor of Preventative Medicine at Queen's in 1937 for the Canadian Public Health Association.

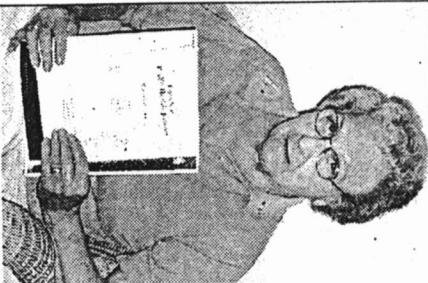
He described the circumstances around Dr. Beattie's request to test the well water. "In August 1932 the young farmer exhibited signs of chronic arsenic poisoning, but was diagnosed as a case of chronic nephritis."

He went on, "Thomas F. [Feeney], farmer aged 29, consulted Dr. B. complaining of weakness and inability to walk. He showed bronzing of the skin, acites, hyperkeratosis [A skin condition caused by arsenic.] of the palms and soles of his feet. On August 30, the patient was examined in Kingston, Ontario by Dr. T [Third] who noted that the skin was pigmented with clear 'bean-sized' areas. The diagnosis of advanced chronic nephritis [kidney disease] was confirmed by Dr. F. The patient died in a coma on October 9, 1932."

Wyllie documented four babies born to Ethel, three of which succumbed a few minutes after birth. They were apparently healthy, but with a duskiness of skin.

In the spring of 1935, Mrs. Thomas Feeney, 36, her daughter, Francis, four years, and her brother-in-law Fred F., 25, began to show pigmentation of the skin and hyperkeratosis of the palms of the hands and soles of the feet.

Wyllie visited the farm on September 27, 1935, and inspected the incriminated well. It was a drilled well 94 feet deep. "The pump was of a modern design and enclosed in a wooden shed along with a gasoline motor used for pumping supplies for the stock animals."



Helen Meraw was relieved to read a paper, "An Investigation of the Source of Arsenic in a Well Water," by J. Wyllie, Professor of Preventative Medicine at Queen's in 1937, which confirms her childhood memories.

Wyllie concluded that with these arsenic levels in the drinking water two and a half years was sufficient to produce symptoms of arsenic poisoning. "Mrs. Feeney did not show symptoms during her married life because she had four pregnancies and any arsenic ingested would tend to be stored in the fetal tissue." She became ill two and half years after the birth of her last infant with a heart complaint, a skin condition and gastro-intestinal disturbance.

Wyllie came up with three theories about where the arsenic came from. First, farmers used calcium arsenate as an insecticide, however, the arsenic in question was not linked to calcium or magnesium but rather with iron in the form of ferrous arsenate. Fred Feeney told Wyllie he did not use arsenic insecticide. The second theory was it was derived from urine of pigs in the piggery close to the well. Again the form of arsenic was different. Wyllie's last theory related to large beds of arsenopyrite in veins at Deloro approximately ten miles west of Madoc. "It may be that the occurrence of the ferrous arsenate in the limestone is due to the weathering of arsenopyrite at some distant point, salts of arsenic being formed; these salts finding their way into stream, have been carried along with the carbonates of lime and magnesium and deposited as a local stratum."

Wyllie also reported several pigs had died from an unascertained cause.

He sampled the limestone stratum from which the water was drawn and found 15 parts of arsenic per million. He tested the well and found in July and August 1935, there were 10 and 9.6 parts per million or 10 and 9.6 mg/litre of arsenic respectively. In the following winter the level was down to 0.4 mg/litre. (The current Ontario Drinking Water Standard is 0.05 mg/litre). He described the water as "bright, clear and sparkling."

Prof. Wyllie examined the kitchen kettle Helen talked about, and found concentrations of 0.4 per cent of arsenic in the lime scale.

The previous owner of the farm, A. Houser, dug the well in 1922 through the red rock. He admitted it not being well since around 1924.

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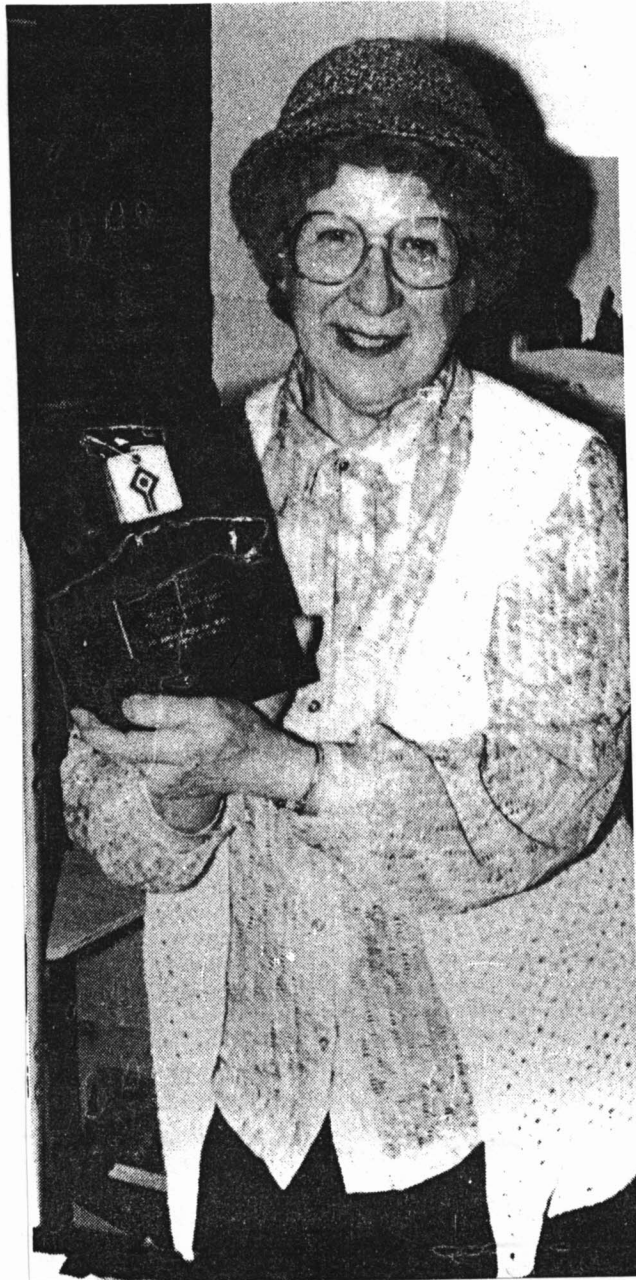

"This lady has a special appeal to people of all ages, and I think she could sell fridges to Eskimos," said John Murphy before handing her the plaque.

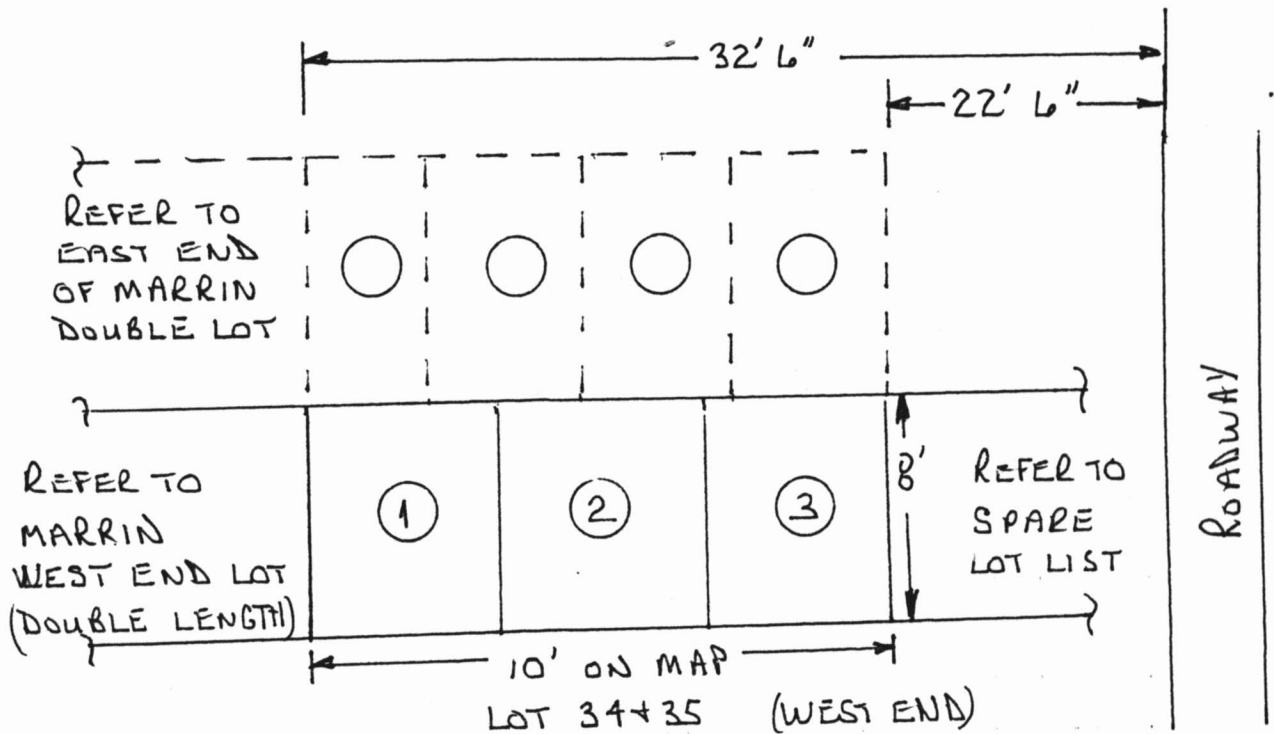

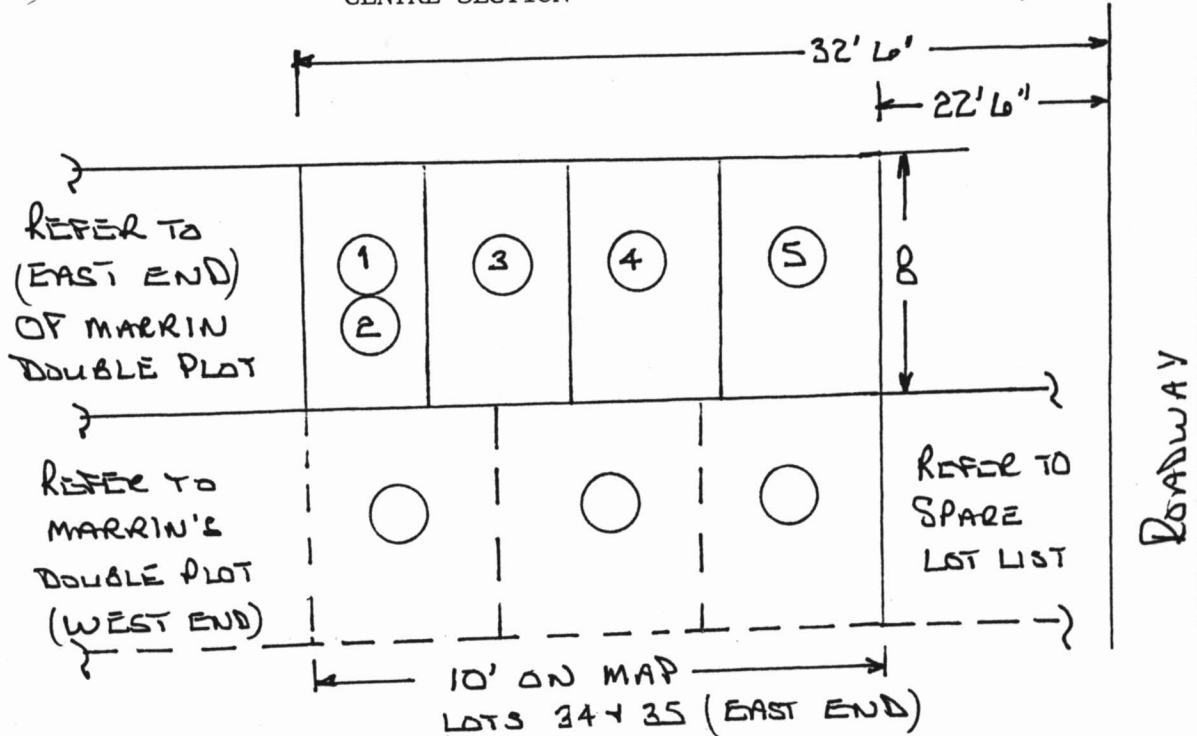

Vincent Callery Lost Life In Fire At St. John's, Nfld.

Citizens all over Canada were shocked when the fire at St. John's, Nfld., in which a hundred or more lost their lives and another hundred were injured, was announced over the radio. The fire started and spread with startling speed in a K. of C. Hotel in which a dance was being held for servicemen and their friends last Saturday evening with about six hundred in attendance.

The horror of the tragedy was brought home to residents of Deloro and Marmora on Monday when Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Callery received official notice from Ottawa that their son Vincent, who was a pilot with the RCAF, was one of those who lost their lives in the fire. He was in his 25th year.

Vincent Callery was born and spent most of his life on the farm near Deloro. He took an active interest in sports of various kinds, particularly baseball, and was a fine pitcher. For some years he was a student at Marmora High School. He was widely known and popular with young and old because of his friendly disposition and cheerfulness. He was a faithful member of Sacred Heart Church during his residence in his district.

He is survived by his parents and seven brothers and three sisters. They are William, Windsor; Joseph, Kingston; Bernard, Windsor; Michael and Murtagh, at home; Fred, Ottawa; Stafford, Marmora; Mrs. A. J. St. Antoine (Beatrice) Burlington, Vermont; Mrs. William Sweet, (Edith), Holtyre, Northern Ontario, and Zeta, Reg. N., Niagara Falls, N.Y.

With sixty other Canadians on active service the deceased was buried at St. John's on Tuesday, when a public service was held for those who lost their lives. The sympathy of the whole community goes out to the family in their bereavement.
