THOMAS MILTON CAMPBELL

The many friends in this area of Thos. Milton Campbell were deeply shocked on Tuesday at the news of his sudden passing. Milton had to all appearances been in his usual health when he left home in the morning but he suffered a coronary attack about eleven o'clock and passed away before medical help could arrive. He was in his 36th year.

He had been employed as vendor at the L.C.B.O. store in Havelock since the store opened there and commuted back and forth from his home in Marmora. Previously he was employed at the Marmora L.C.B.O. store and for a time at the Deloro Smelting & Refining Co. Limited.

Milton was born in Dodsland, Sask., a son of Mrs. Wallace McInroy and the late Thomas Milton Campbell. He came to this area as a boy and attended Public School at Bonarlaw and Marmora Continuation School. He enlisted in the 2nd World War and served with the 711 Huzzards in France, Germany and Italy. He developed lung trouble and was an invalid for some time after his return to Canada.

He was a member of Marmora Branch No. 237 Canadian Legion and took an active interest in affairs in the community. His friendly disposition won him many friends in the district who will miss him.

He is survived by his wife, the former Amelia Lahey; two children, Thomas, aged 9 and Sharon Anne, aged 4; his mother, Mrs. Wallace McInroy, two sisters, Mrs. Jean Spry and Mrs. Bert Spry and one brother, Wilson Campbell, of Hastings.

The funeral is being held this (Thursday) afternoon from the Howden Funeral Home to St. Andrew's United Church, where service was conducted by Rev. F. E. Madden, pastor of the church, assisted by Rev. R. G. Fleming, Chaplain of the Legion. The funeral is under the auspices of Marmora Branch No. 237, Canadian Legion. Interment is in the Veterans' Plot at Marmora Protestant Cemetery.

and matching accessories. During the banquet, special violin selections were provided by request.

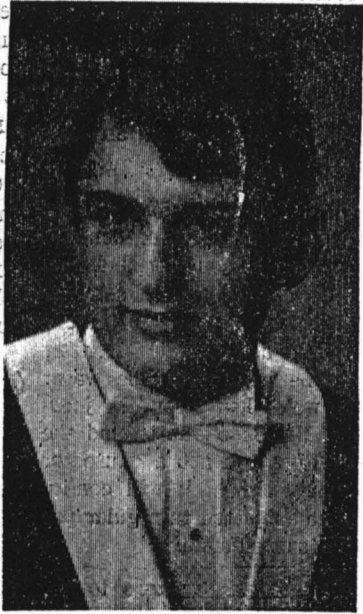

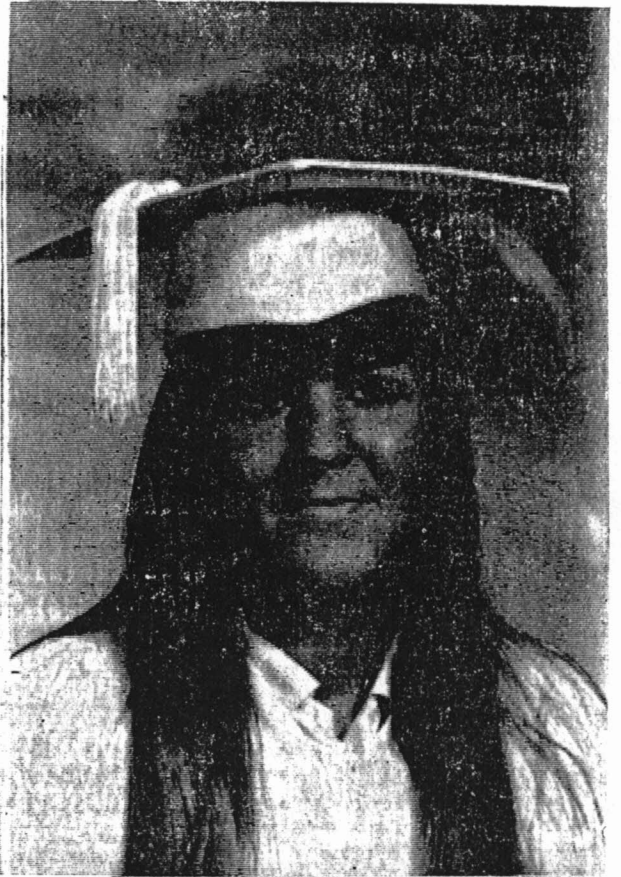
