



Obituary

CHARLES A. CLAIRMONT

On Thursday, April 18th, Charles A. Clairmont passed away, after an extended illness, at the home of his sisters in the village. He was the only son of the late Charles Clairmont, one of the pioneers of Marmora who conducted a blacksmith shop here for many years. Deceased was born in Marmora and spent his boyhood and early manhood here. He was altar boy in the first R. C. church, built on the site of the present church in the time of Father Davis. He served in that capacity for nearly twenty years.

The late Charles A. Clairmont left Marmora about forty years ago and has only been back on an occasional visit since. For some time he had resided in Toronto. About four years ago his health broke down. Later it was found that he was suffering from cancer and complication of diseases. Last summer he was in a hospital in Toronto for a time and he was advised by his doctors to get away from the city. He came to Marmora and has been with his sisters ever since. He gradually grew worse but was very patient in his suffering and retained his faculties until the end.

The deceased is survived by a widow, three sons and five daughters. The sons are Bernard, of Detroit; John of Marmora; and Louis, of Cleveland. The daughters are Mrs. Thos. Bailey, Mrs. Percy Kaiser, and Helen, Albertine and Veronica, all of Toronto. The eldest son, Charles, died in 1919 as a result of wounds received in action during the Great War. He also leaves three sisters: Misses Frances, Cecelia and Louise, of Marmora.

The funeral took place last Saturday morning, Mass being conducted in the Church of the Sacred Heart after which interment took place in the R. C. cemetery.

REMINISCENCES

June 30th, 1932

To the Marmora Herald:

I noticed in the Belleville paper the passing away of Joseph Clairmont, of Gravenburst, Muskoka. As we were both born and brought up in Marmora, I, of course, knew him well. He always looked on life in a very serious and dignified way. When I saw his obituary notice my mind shot back to Christmas, 1875. I had called at the home of the late Dan. Shannon to help out the passing of a rather dull afternoon. I was always helped out of the blues when I mingled with that lively family and that day was treated to an extra joy to flad Miss Crawford, now Mrs. Dunlay, was there "in all her glory." Then to add to our pleasure along came Joe Clairmont with McWilliams' grey mare and entter.

His mission was to look up a bunch who would go to help the swelling of a party which was coming off at Mr. Gillen's. I had reason to suspect that Joe had a strong hankering for Miss A. E. Shannon as his escort, I, being well pleased with having the bonor of the company of either of them. When we reached our destination dancing was in order with Dan McKinnon master of ceremonies and his brother Jack played the fiddle. Needless to say we all had a good time. I wonder how many who were there are now alive One of us four has just passed away; Miss Shannon married and lives in Seattle and is one of my valued correspondents; Miss Crawford, now Mrs. Dunlay, of Marmora, and I in Cherry Valley, Prince Edward County.

I only know of four persons now in Marmora whom I went to school with in the old Beaver Creek school, which I attended in 1871, that being my last year at school, - Miss R. A. Mouncey, of Madoc, being our toacher. Hester McMullen, Hugh and Dan Shanuon and Dan Campion are all I can trace in Marmora who once attended Beaver Creek School.

I would like to have a re-union of old timers take place, who were grown up in 1879. That is the year I left there in December. Fifty-two of us, all told, boarded the train in Belleville for Marquette, Mich., 150 miles west of the Soo on Lake Superior. We had to go by way of Chicago around Lake Michigan to reach our destination—no way being open by way of the Soo then.

At Chicago they told us we could get no lunch till we reached Marquette. We then got a bbl. of sodas and a cheese put in our car and away we went for 36 hours. There are those who are scattered through Hastings County who were on that excursion.

In the winter of 1891-92 I was away up at Swan Lake near the source of the Mississippi River and there I met two brothers by the name of Powers, who told me their sister was married to Chas. Bleecker, of Marmora, so, of course, we felt kind of chummy.

Tomorrow will be Dominion Day. The Beaver Creek folks celebrated the first one in 1867 in a grove south of the Briggs Farm and east of the Johns' homestead. The location was known afterwards as the Pinner farm. My sister Kate made a pyramid cake, above which was suspended a motto inscribed "Union Dominion". This supplied a text for the speakers.

Marmora's Oldest Home

By W. J. COTTRELL

Thousands of footsteps resounding on the sidewalk outside of the spacious, well-timbered Clairmont home, Marmora's oldest residence, are heard daily by its two inhabitants, Misses Selena and Louise Clairmont.

Situated at the intersection of Burstall and Matthews streets, the ancient building is passed by more people than any other house

in the village.

Seventy-five years ago, Charles Clairmont and his brother Eli, who were village blacksmiths, built the dwelling that today is the home of the former's daughters, previously mentioned.

The iron works in operation at that time has induced the Clairmont brothers to move to Marmora from Quebec. Charles hailed from Berthier while his wife was a native of St. Elizabeth.

Their original home which stood on the brow of McGill street, was destroyed by a fire which also claimed one of Marmora's oldest stores.

Bought an Organ

Charles Clairmont was musically inclined, though no musician, and on moving to the new residence he purchased an organ then available for \$200. Previous to this he had been intent on his oldest child, Selena, being able to play. An Englishman, Benjamin Beddomes, village division court clerk, was teaching a class of 15 to play a four oclave melodeon. Selena was the only one to finish the course.

When the new organ was installed in the Clairmont home the young musician practiced constantly and was eventually appointed organist of the family church, Sacred Heart. Later her younger sister Louise succeeded ner in this position.


Miss Selena never attempted singing but recalls many occasions when she had acted as accompanist for local soloists. One in particular was the late James Wilkinson, whose services as a soloist were often in demand at many public social functions.

Younger Louise also sang to her family and occasional community gatherings. She was fond of painting and some of her creations still adorn the walls of the Clairmont home.

Invalid For 8 Years

And although she has been an invalid for the past eight years, she maintains that old humorous, cheery spirit known in years gone by. Any visitor that comes to the house to entertain her gets it all back in good measure.

In the corner of the room stands a piano bought when the organ became slightly impaired. When company is present, Miss Selena is always anxious to play the piano. And the visitor cannot help but marvel at the dexterity

of the fingers of the planist who has seen more than 80 years slip past, and has solely done the housework in recent times.

Four children were in the Clairmont family — Selena, Fanny, Charles and Louise. Fanny died a few years ago and Charles has a home of his own, leaving the two sisters only inhabitants of the old homestead.

Never before have the Clairmont girls been interviewed and they showed gratitude and wonder at the interest taken in their home and themselves. Clairmont remains a beacon of goodwill and cheer to those who have time to visit it.

YOUR CENTENNIAL

...and mine

(By Mr. Arthur Sweet)

In a book recently published, called Historic Hastings, there appears considerable information concerning Marmora Village and anyone caring to read it, would be well repaid by doing so. Continuing one of our Centennial projects, the listing of the homes in Marmora Village and Township, that are 100 years old, or over, and to obtain for them, some form of recognition, we have the following.

What is probably the oldest, is that section of Dr. Parkin's home and office which Mr. Geo. Bleecker Sr., bought from the Marmora Foundry Company in 1857. The original building was built of hand hewn timber, but has been added too, and improved and moved to its present position. It was used by the Foundry Co. as an office, and store before being sold.

In 1866, Mr. Bleecker built for his own use, the building now used as a home and Shoe Store by Ron Stephens.

Among the listed assets of the Marmora Foundry Co. was a "Bake-House." As the ovens of that time were almost invariably built of brick and stone, we are led to believe that it referred to the house now occupied by Mrs. Charles Nichol. Until about 1896, when Mrs. Wilkinson built an oven at her home at the corner of Main and Madoc Street, operated it briefly, then sold it to Wm. Sweet. It was the only bakery on Main Street where most of the buildings belonging to the Foundry outside of those used in connection with the water power were siuated. The "Nichol" managed shop was first operated by the grand father, then by the father of Mr. Charles Nichol.

Mrs. Nichol stated that some of the equipment, including the oven remained there, when she was married, and she is now over ninety two years of age. This house is the only one in the Village, that has been occupied by the same family or descendants, continuously, for so long.

The present home of Mrs. F. N. Marett, was once the home of David Bently, who was managing director of the "Cobourg, Peterborough, and Marmora railway and Mining Co., which was amalgamated with the Marmora foundry Co., in its final re-organization in 1866.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Frost was built by Charles Clair mont Sr., grand father of Jack Clairmont of Marmora. He and his brother Eli, came from Quebec, while the iron Mine at Blairton was in operation. He lived first in a house north of that now the home of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Brady. Fire destroyed it and he built another of which Roy Frost is now the owner. Family records show that the house was built over ninety-five years ago.

The home of Jack Clairmont, is over 100 years old, having been in use by the "Page Lumber Co., and the Gilmour Lumber Co., in the early days of lumbering in this County. One of the final cuts of the latter Co. was in 1866, when government records show that they took out 22,000,000 board feet of pine lumber which was sawn at Trenton. The house was also the home of one of our oldest citizens, Mr. Richard Campion. He operated

a livery there when the Gold Mine at Deloro was in operation

No doubt there are other homes here which approach the age limit, but no evidence of this has been found, and it is necessary therefore that this limit be set.


