# OBITUARY

MRS. MARIA FOLEY

The death took place on Saturday, August 25th, 1923, of Mrs. Maria Foley, at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Margaret Clement. Although Mrs. Foley had been ill for some time, death came as a shock to her numerous friends.

She was a daughter of the late Hugh Shannon and Fanny Hughes, and was born on the old homestead north of Marmora on August 9th, 1846, where her girlhood days were spent. Her life was an exemplary one, and those who knew her as a young girl, still remember her sweet, gentle disposition which she retained to the end. The friendships formed during her earlier days were deepened and unbroken in their memories of her life and personality. At the age of twenty she married Thomas Foley, residing on a farm west of Marmora, later coming to the village with her family where she resided for the past thirty years.

She is survived by two sons, T. J. Foley, and T. H. Foley of Marquette, Mich., and two daughters, Mrs. M. LaFountain of Tweed, and Mrs. M. Clement, of this village. A son, Daniel and a daughter, Mrs. Albert Brady predeceased her. One sister, Mrs. Devine of Deloro, and two brothers, Mr. Hugh Shannon of Marmora, and P. J. Shannon of Los Angeles, Cal., also survive.

The funeral took place from her late residence on Monday morning, August 27th, to the Church of the Sacred Heart, where solemn requiem mass was celebrated by Rev. Father O'Riordan.

## TIM FOUND IT A LITTLE CROWDED

Experienced Difficulty in Housing his  
Gang of Men at the "Soo"

According to an article which appeared in a recent issue of the Sault Ste. Marie Star, Timothy Clement, cement sidewalk contractor, of Marmora, was up against the real thing for a time after reaching that place with his staff of men.

The article reads:—

"The Soo has no room for more citizens until the building program makes some progress. For several days this week Mr. T. Clement, of the firm of Curran & Clement, the sidewalk men, has tried to secure accommodation for his staff. The firm makes a specialty of looking after the comfort of the men and for this purpose carry their own chef. But there isn't much use of having leather furniture and a Parisian cook if you can't get some place to stow them. Mr. Clement, after a strenuous effort, found a vacant house, and had just started to move in when the house was sold.

And then it began to snow.

It was as bad as being without visible means of support. The other man bought the house to beat Tim out of it.

Through it all Tim was cheerful.

"I think this is a fine town," he said, "It's like having a birthday to work here."

Finally the large and commodious building at the rear of the Star office was gratefully accepted till brighter days dawn. There Martin, and Bill, and John, and Joe and Mike, with the chef and the mahogany furniture, and the rest of the staff repose till someone builds something better.

And as for a single room furnished what do you imagine people are paying for one in our city? It's a pretty poor one you could rent this week for \$10 a month. From \$10 to \$16 were the quotations.

## THOMAS CLEMENT

After many long months of suffering from Bright's disease, heart trouble and other ailments, Mr. Thomas Clement passed peacefully away at his home here early Wednesday morning. Deceased was born in Belleville forty three years ago, but since reaching the years of manhood most of his life had been spent in Marmora. For several years he carried on business as a contractor. For some time he was in partnership with Mr. Harry Leal and later with a Mr. Curran under the firm name of Curran & Clement. They successfully handled a number of large contracts for constructing cement walks in various towns and cities, previous to the beginning of the war. Since that time, until laid up by his long illness, he was employed in various important positions at Deloro.

Wherever he went "Tim," as he was called, made hosts of friends. His genial disposition, and friendliness, his strong sense of humour and his kindly sympathy made him a general favorite with all who knew him. He was an ardent sportsman taking a keen interest in hockey, lacrosse and various other games, but his pet hobby was baseball. He loved to win, but was also a good loser.

He leaves a widow, formerly Miss Foley, and two sons Stafford and Paul, both at home. He is also survived by four brothers and three sisters. They are:—Louis and Patrick, of Rochester, and James and William Clement, of Belleville, Miss Lillian, of Hamilton, Mrs. Quincy, of Belleville, Mrs. Crothers, of Toronto, and Mrs. Chard, of Hamilton.

The funeral will take place from his late residence at 10 a. m. on Friday the 18th inst. to the Church of the Sacred Heart, Marmora, for service and interment.

WILFRED HENRY LEAL

On Thursday, Oct. 27th, Wilfred Henry Leal, a former resident of Marmora, passed away at his home near Millbrook, Ont. He was born in Freshwater, in the Isle of Wight, and came to Canada in May, 1885. He lived in Madoc for a number of years, but the greater part of his life, since coming to Canada, was spent in Marmora.

For some time he was a member of Marmora Lacrosse team in the years when the local team was noted throughout Eastern Ontario and was a fine player. The deceased also was in partnership with the late Thomas Clement for a number of years - and they handled some large contracts for concrete walks and other work.

Fifteen or twenty years ago the deceased suffered from blood poisoning as a result of stepping on a rusty nail, and he never recovered from the effects. In later years he also suffered from other ailments. Ever since the accident first occurred there had been periods when he was in agony for hours or days at a time and in recent years he was seldom free from pain. For years he fought with heretic...

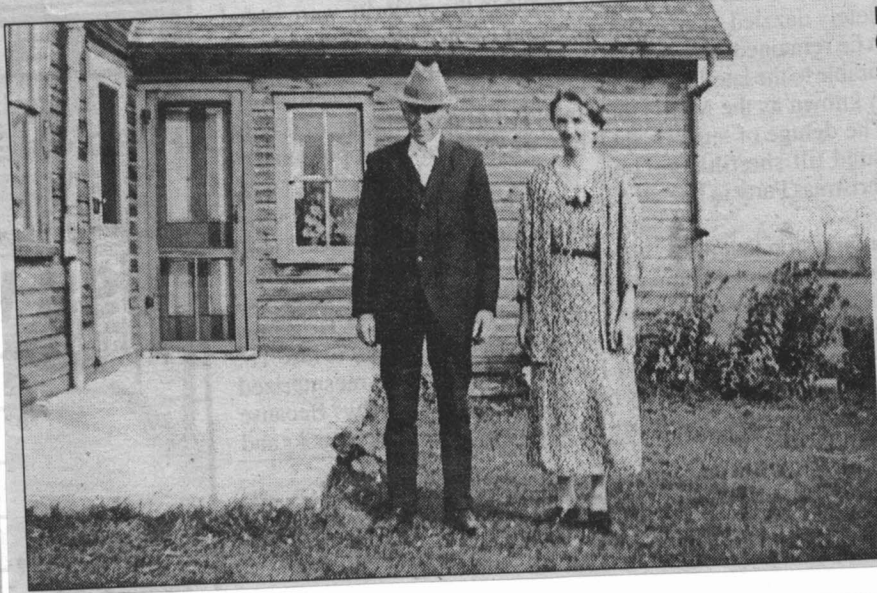

## In and around Ivanhoe



Librarian Hattie Clements stands beside her husband John in front of their Ivanhoe residence (first built by Wm. Mitz about 1835) across from the Ivanhoe Garage. The door on the left led to their parlour and the 800-book Ivanhoe Public Library. A framed needlepoint reading, "There is no frigate like a book to carry you miles away," hung just inside. Hattie acted as librarian from 1924 until her death in 1942.

### Those were the days IX

C.A. (Charles Allan) Mitz, Arthur Wood, Mrs. H.B. Rowe, Mrs. John Clements and David Fleming were the prime movers in establishing the Ivanhoe Public Library in 1921. The books were first kept in the schoolhouse with teacher Mrs. H.B. Rowe acting as librarian. In 1924 they were moved to the home of Mr. John Clements. John's wife Harriet Frances (Hattie) became librarian and remained such until her death in 1942. Although the library was open six days a week at all hours and many story times were arranged for the children, Hattie's starting salary was a modest sum of \$15 per annum, raised to \$25 and then \$35. The books were later located in Fleming's Store and finally donated to the Madoc Library.

The earliest volumes were purchased with the residue of funds collected during the Great War. Others were donated by Fred Timmerman, P.M. Wood, B.U. Lovibond, Rev. F. Sales, James Hill MPP, Dr. Embury, Owen Herity, Mrs. Sam Eagleson, Elizabeth Sarles and Annie Fleming. Monetary donations were received from B.U. Lovibond and the Hon. J.R. Cooke.

Beginning in 1925 and until 1938 the Ivanhoe Women's Institute donated \$20 a year. They dropped off on the latter date when Reeve Thomas Fleming was able to acquire grants from the County of Hastings. Annual family memberships cost 50 cents with members coming from West Huntingdon, Rawdon, Crookston and Moira Lake. Some walked several miles to borrow books. At its peak, the Ivanhoe Public Library contained over 800 volumes on its shelves.

Two fund-raising concerts were held, the first adding \$23.85 to the treasury and the second \$18.50. One of these concerts was a double bill including a Mother Goose presentation by school students under the direction of teacher Miss Winnie McInroy and The Mad Hatter's Tea Party under the direction of Miss Bessie Fleming. In the latter Alice was played by Lorna Wright, the March Hare by Jack Fleming, the Mad Hatter by Wesley Henderson and the Dormouse by George Fleming. Rev. D.M. Hill of Roslin recited several of Henry Drummond's poems, Adventures in Friendship was read by Mr. Arthur Wood.

But the public library wasn't the only library in town. The February 4, 1938 issue of the school newspaper, the ECHOES, tells us that in 1905 teacher Miss Hattie Bishop raised the question of supplementary reading material, stating the school was way behind the times in not having a library. In reporting this matter to the ECHOES Mrs. Wesley Reid commented, "However, nothing was done, so the teachers and pupils set to work and put on a school concert, which was great. The proceeds started the library, and well do I remember how proud we were of our new books and the first one I read was With Wolfe in Canada." (To be continued)

# EARLY HISTORY OF SPRINGBROOK

This article was written and compiled by Mrs. Florence McKeown who is a patient in Hillside Nursing Home, Campbellford. Mrs. McKeown who is now in her 83th year, was born and raised in Springbrook and spent all her life in the community.

She is the mother of Mrs. Granville Meiklejohn, Marmora.

The McKenna's bought fifty acres of land which is now the Village of Springbrook.

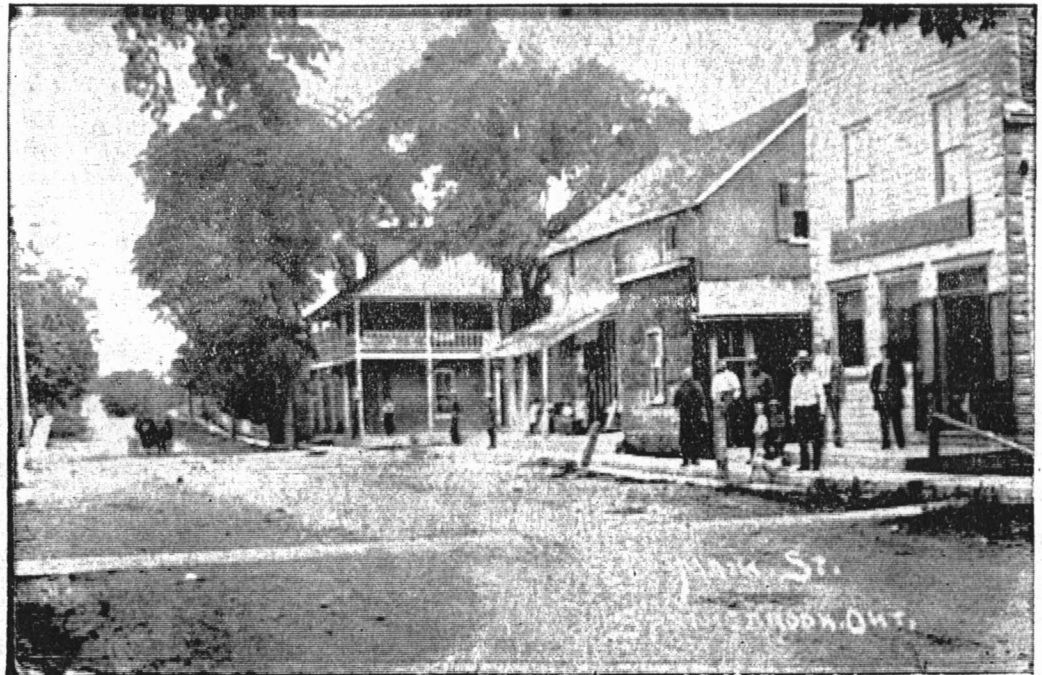
When this land was first purchased, the first house was built and took the name of Forest House.

To identify this house a sign was erected at the roadside and was displayed for many years. The Forest House was used by the shanty men and river drivers, for accomodation, food and rest for their horses going to and from work. From the 50 acres the McKenna's sold lots, and the second house was built by Thos. Rupert, father of Mrs. F. McKeown. His wife was the daughter of the McKenna's.

A few years later Mr. T. Rupert built a harness shop and worked in it many years.

From then on people began to build and settle in the immediate surrounding area. The cheese factory was erected on the ninth line on the Clements property. About this time the "Forest House" was sold, and the McKenna's built across the road over a spring, and a brook running from this spring.

Marcia McKenna who was the first woman to live there named the location "Spring Brook" and this name has been carried down through the years and the



present Village still holds the same name.

The main road was back of the present school and came out where Joe Thompson's farm now stands, and follows on through to Stirling. On this road a toll gate was erected at Sine.

The road was changed shortly thereafter and called the gravel road.

The C.P.R. and C.N.R. railways were built, also a church in 1882. The Village continued to grow with three general stores, a bake shop, a drug store, with Robert Stewart as druggist.

We also had two blacksmith shops, a wagon, and machine shop, a grain elevator, the harness shop, two halls and a saw mill owned by Mr. J. Morgan.

A Doctor then took up res-

idence here a Dr. Sargent, who married Mr. Sam Bailey's daughter.

Quite some time previous to this, before there were many families, the building of a school was quite a problem, but in time, the school was built after much discussion.

Some thought it an unnecessary expense and wondered how they could pay a teacher, and pay her board; so it was decided to take turns in boarding the teacher.

The school was built, one large room, a table in the centre and benches all around. The first teachers were Luellen McKenna, then John Irwin, Ed Tens and Mr. Minchin.

In 1873 a brick school was built, one room with desks and seats. Lizzie McFuade, Eliza

Wiggins, A. Armor, Miss Ousterhoute, Minnie Myrle, Miranda Mosher, Agusta Mosher, Miss Harvey, Nell Bird, J. A. Donnell and Mr. Minchin.

The present school was built with two rooms in about 1890.

## Expires Suddenly At Grave Of His Brother

## Former Marmora Boy Presides at Detroit Gathering

The Herald has received a copy of The Detroit Free Press, which contains the following report of a gathering at which Stafford J. Clement, National vice president of the Delta Phi Epsilon Foreign Service Fraternity, presided.

United States must import the equivalent of goods exported if it expects to ship merchandise abroad, H. H. Rice, chairman of the foreign trade bureau of the Board of Commerce, said Sunday night in an address before 40 members of the Zeta chapter of Delta Phi Epsilon foreign service fraternity, at the Statler hotel. The talk was in connection with the chapter's annual initiatory dinner following the induction of eight new members.

"The favorable balance of trade idea ought to be stricken from every text book," Mr. Rice asserted. "It can never be favorable in the idea that we as a nation can sell our goods and then are not going to buy anything in exchange. A farmer cannot impose a 14 cent tariff on butter and then expect to ship out his wheat."

## URGES ECONOMIC STUDY

Mr. Rice urged the members of the chapter to make a study of political economy. He said the settlement of America in large measure was due to the economic urge

"The Puritans and Jesuits helped by their missionary movement," he said, "but it is hard to separate the economic urge from the religious urge. Our legislators are woefully lacking in the fundamentals of political economy. They frequently make suggestions about which they know nothing."

Mr. Rice advocated world-wide interchange of the best goods of every nation. He said the United States should trade its best commodity for the best of other people's, and that such a trade will persist despite all barriers.

Stafford J. Clement, national vice-president of the fraternity, presided. Howard H. Wobrock, John A. Russel Samuel J. Hoexter, Lawrence E. Collins Joseph La Tourelle, George Feehan and Leo Lapham were other speakers.
