PRIZE PICKEREL WAS CAUGHT IN CROWE LAKE

Last Friday the awards were announced for the Morley E. Mackenzie Angling Competition. This competition is for the largest specimen of various kinds of game fish caught in Ontario waters. The prize for the largest pickerel caught in Ontario went to Mrs. Forrest Dennis and the fish was caught in Crowe Lake. It weighed 11 ½ lbs. and was taken while trolling. The fish was a beauty and was much admired at the time.

A remarkable feature is that until about five years ago it was not thought there were any pickerel in Crowe Lake. About ten years ago a lot of pickerel fry were placed in the lake, but as none were seen for some years, it was thought the fry had died or been destroyed. About five years ago a couple of young pickerel were caught and each year since the number taken has increased. Mr. and Mrs. Dennis caught several fine pickerel and quite a number were taken by other fishermen, including summer residents from Oshawa.

Several years ago, when the Toronto Star conducted an annual competition for the largest small mouth bass caught in Ontario, the prize one year went to a fish from Crowe Lake and each year large bass were entered in the contest, but at that time no one ever imagined that some time the largest pickerel caught in Ontario would come from Crowe Lake.

In his broadcast last Sunday morning Andy Clarke, who speaks for the weekly newspapers and tells of what is going on outside the cities, mentioned the prize pickerel along with the other prize winners.



Double Sheet Bend






Caught Lunge on Minnow Hook

Narrowly Escaped Drowning

Allan McGarvey and Herbert Wright had an experience on Sunday which they would not care to repeat. They had started for their hunting camp, in a boat, driven by an outboard motor, in which they had three hounds and a lot of camping and hunting equipment. They were just a short distance past Airhart's saw mill on Beaver Creek, when for some reason, the dogs rushed to the front of the boat. Their weight caused the front of the boat to sink under the water and it rapidly began to fill with water then turned over, upsetting the occupants into the stream.

Herb Wright was able to cling to the boat and called for help, but Allan McGarvey was unable to get hold of it. He is usually a very good swimmer, but the weight of his clothing carried him under and every time he came to the surface the dogs climbed on top of him, scratching his face and forcing him under the water until he lost consciousness.

Fortunately Hiram Revoy, and a companion were nearby, waiting for a party of hunters to join them, and they hurried to the rescue in their boat. They got McGarvey to shore and worked over him for nearly an hour, but were unable to revive him. They then rushed him to Dr. Donevan's office at Marmora. When it was found that the unconscious man did not respond to efforts to resuscitate him a call was sent to Belleville fire department for a pulmotor. Two firemen made a very fast trip to Marmora and in a short time McGarvey was on his way to Belleville General Hospital.

Later Sunday evening a report was received from the hospital that he was getting along nicely. Herb Wright escaped without any serious effects, but his sweater was torn to ribbons by the dogs climbing up on him.


Five rifles and a shot gun were in the boat, besides ammunition and camp material, and they went to the bottom of the creek. Mr. John Morse was also at the Lake a couple of weeks, returning to Rochester a few days ago. Mr. George Morse, who was an annual visitor for years and was here last summer is now in Washington, D. C. in connection with Government war work.

The well at Booser Park was also tested and found to be in Class "A".







Is Building Fine Cabins





Likes Fishing at Crowe Lake

The following reference to Crowe Lake and W. Austin Peters is taken from an article "Outdoor Trail" in Tuesday's Toronto Globe and Mail.

It has taken a long time, but we finally got around to fishing Crowe Lake, near Marmora, the other day. only wish we had tried it sooner, for it's one of those places that is a pleasure to fish. Our luck was only modest, but there's something about the clear, clean waters, weed beds and shoals of Crowe Lake that just spells fish and keeps you casting and hoping.

The fish have been driven deep by the hot weather, and the most successful anglers we met were four from Buffalo who were trolling the deep spots with a Flatfish lure and getting some whopping wall-eyes. They were good sports, through, kept only what they needed and were tossing back 21-inchers.

W. Austing Peters, who bought Marble Point Lodge up there last season has had a full house so far this summer. He has one of the nicest family type resorts we've seen – fishing for those who like it, a good beach for swimmers and children, and it's only a 3 hour drive from Toronto. A Kingston businessman turned author (Feathered Preferred, a dandy book which came out last year), he is one of Ontario's outstanding sportsmen and conservationists. He was first general manager of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters.

The walleyes have moved strongly into Crowe Lake, for years a noted bass paradise. The bass are still there, some muskies, too, and I think it is a good thing to see the walleyes in the ascendancy.

The average angler wants to catch fish and isn't choosy about the species, and in this regard the walleye is most obliging. Certainly I'm going to take a whirl next spring at Crowe Lake walleyes, hoping that maybe we can beat Austin Peter's record – on his first cast on the lake when he took over he hooked and landed a 7 and a half pounder.


Cottage Put Up Quickly





Montreal Man Drowned In Beaver Creek

A tragic accident occurred last Friday afternoon, just east of Beaver Creek Bridge about a mile north of Marmora when a man fell from a boat and was drowned.

The victim was Francis Joseph Lamontagne, aged 21, of Montreal, who was an employee of Dominion Structures who are at present engaged in the construction work at Bethlehem Mines.

Lamontagne and a companion, Bill Lesperance, had taken the afternoon off and were fishing near Wanganui Lodge. Lesperance was running the motor and it is reported the boat tipped and Lamontagne lost his balance and was thrown into the river. Both men were non-swimmers and although Lesperance made an attempt to rescue his companion he was unable to help him. When help arrived it was too late, the body having been in the water for about three-quarters of an hour, and although artificial respiration was carried out for some time and a pulmotor was used all efforts at resuscitation were unsuccessful.

Rescue attempts were carried out under the direction of the Madoc Provincial Police detachment. Dr. R. C. Shatford of Marmora was called to render assistance.

Dr. Russell Scott, of Belleville, attended as coroner and decided an inquest was unnecessary.

The body was removed to the Cassidy Funeral Home and was conveyed to Montreal on Saturday, where the funeral was held on Monday morning.


The search continued on Sunday with members of Marmora Underwater Club, Jack Fraser, Doug Vilneff, and Donald Shannon assisting but without success.



Four People Escape Drowning

About six o'clock Sunday afternoon two Havelock couples had a very narrow escape from death when their boat was swept through the dam on Crowe River.

Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Davis and Mr. and Mrs. Fred Howard were cruising on Crowe River above the dam when their outboard motor stalled. While attempting to get it started they did not notice that they were getting close to the dam until it was too late. They tried frantically to get the oars out to try to row the boat to safety but the current was too strong and the boat was drawn swiftly to the dam.

Mr. Davis managed to grab the floor of the dam and hang on but was unable to stop the boat and it shot through the sluiceway with the other three still in it.

Mr. and Mrs. Howard were carried through the rapids and Mr. Howard was able to reach the boat as it came out into smooth water. He paddled to his wife and they clung to the boat until the current carried them in close to shore near the home of Ernest Gordon. They managed to grab a tree until help arrived.

Some girls were on McGill street and they saw the accident and ran down to the business section to get help. Bill Sabine was in front of the Herald office and he drove close to the river and pulling his shoes off went into the water and swam to the stranded couple and dragged them to safety.

When Bill Sabine reached them they were exhausted with the cold and fighting the swift current. Frank Bobyk, jr. and Doug Nobes waded in up to their shoulders and helped to drag them to shore

Mrs. Davis had caught hold of a tree in the rapids below the dam and she clung to that until her strength gave out and she was swept down the river. Mr. Ed. Killian and son Al. launched a boat from the west side of the river and they were able to reach Mrs. Davis and pull her out. Mr. Davis clung to the dam until Claude Nichol ran to him and pulled him to safety.

Both women undoubtedly owe their lives to the fact that they were wearing good life jackets which kept them afloat

Until help arrived.

These tree were so numbed by the cold and shock that they were completely helpless and they were carried to the nearby home of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Logan where they were wrapped in wool blankets and given treatment by Dr. H. G. Parkin.

This was the second accident for Howard in about six weeks. His car collided with a transport in Havelock and he had his leg fractured at that time and was still on crutches on Sunday.

The water has been unusually high this spring with the great depth of snow during the past winter, and all of the stop logs that can be moved are out of the dam which makes the current stronger then it would normally be at this time. It is truly a miracle that all of the four were rescued on Sunday.

The last people who went over the dam were Mrs. Charles Dunlay and her son who were both drowned on May 20th, 1943.



LINK WITH PAST UNCOVERED IN CROWE LAKE

A link with Marmora's past came to light this summer with the location and recovery of two large very old anchors from Crowe Lake by a young Toronto man.

Paul Allerillies spotted the two anchors while scuba diving and with the help of friends in four boats, raised them from the bottom. They have been painted and are now on display in front of his parents' trailer-campsite at Bayview Park on the west shore of Crowe Lake.

The first anchor recovered is believed to weigh in the neighborhood of 300 pounds and was found in 30 feet of water. The second one is smaller, running about 200 pounds and was lodged in rock when Mr. Allelleries spotted it.

It is believed the anchors may be anywhere from 50 to 100 years old. Logging was one of the principal industries of the Marmora area at that time and it is quite possible the anchors were lost as the log booms were moved along the channel of the lake enroute to Pearce's sawmill below the present Marmora dam. Log drives were also made on Beaver Creek, the last one being carried out in the spring of 1920.

Mr. Allerillies was not available on the weekend to give further information but Otto Lingertat, owner of the Bayview Tent and Trailer Park, showed a photographer and reporter to the location of the anchors.
