Martha died 7 June, 1894 in Sidney Township

According to 1871 Sidney Township Census, Martha is living in that township. Perhaps she is living with her daughter Fanny. Her son, John Wilson Devlin born circa 1830 is employed as a shoemaker and living on Forsyth Street in the Village of Marmora. By the 1879-80 Belleville Directory, John has now moved to Matthew Street and is still-employed as a shoemaker.

According to the 1891 Sidney Township Census, Martha is now a widow and living with her daughter Fanny. Fanny A. has married Moses Boardman of Sharington, Sidney Township. Fanny has married on 1 November, 1863 at Brighton, Ontario. Fanny was born on 6 June, 1843 and Moses was born on 15 February, 1830. In the 1901 Sidney Township Census they are both farming in that township.

According to the 1858-1869 Marriage Register of Ontario, Hastings County, Volume 5 - Martha & Mark's children are ;



Mark Devlin appears present at Gilbert & Martha's wedding on the 29, February, 1864, but by the 1871 Sidney Township Census his wife, Martha Wilson is now living with her daughter, Fanny and Moses Boardman. Mark has either died between 1864-1871 or they are separated.

I have looked through all the eleven cemeteries listed in the Sidney Township and did not find Mark or Martha Devlin's name. I do not have a computer, so I do not go on line for my information. It is all done the old fashion way which means lots of leg work and is very time consuming. I have gone as far as I can this time- but keep me in your Devlin loop.

Please send me an up-date on the information you now have with this family and I will continue looking for information related to this family for you. You will have to verify some of this information.

COUNTY MARRIAGE REGISTERS OF ONTARIO, 1858-1869

In 1857, legislation was enacted to provide for the registration of all marriages performed by clergymen in the Province of Canada West (later Ontario). This led to the creation of a series of volumes known as the COUNTY MARRIAGE REGISTERS, which contain records of marriages performed by clergy from 1 January 1858 until 30 June 1869, at which time a new system of registration was established. Most marriage records found in the registers fall within these dates, but there are occasional records of marriages performed before 1858 and during the latter half of 1869. One minister from Perth County sent in marriage records dating back to 1850, which were duly copied into the register.

There are 42 County Marriage Registers, one each for each of the then existing counties, plus separate registers for the City of Toronto and the City of Ottawa. The register for Glengarry County is missing. It should be noted that Dufferin County was not established until a few years after the period covered by these registers, and the territory was then divided amongst the counties of Grey, Simcoe, and Wellington.

The registers vary in size from relatively small (Peel County, 1,428 marriages) to relatively large (Toronto City, 4,533 marriages). It is estimated that the existing registers contain records of some 130,000 or more marriages performed by clergy in Ontario between 1858 and 1869. There is, however, ample evidence that marriage returns from many ministers operating within the province never reached the County Marriage Registers. And in virtually every register, there are not as many marriages for the half-year of 1869 as should be expected, making it obvious that many records at this time were lost during the transition from one system of registration to the other.

INFORMATION TO BE FOUND IN THE COUNTY MARRIAGE REGISTERS

Although in many cases details have been left blank by the clergymen who performed the marriages, the registers provide for the following information about each marriage:

Bridegroom: name, age, residence, birthplace, parent's names.

Bride: information as for the bridegroom.

Witnesses: names and residences of one or more.

Date of the marriage.

Name and affiliation of the officiating clergyman.

Every minister interpreted in his own way how best to fill in the required information. Most ministers recorded the actual ages of the parties, but a few ministers recorded ages in the form of "full age", or "minor". Some ministers were quite specific when giving birthplaces, naming a parish or township; others were less specific, giving birthplaces such as "Canada" or "Ireland". If the parents of the parties were deceased, some ministers simply stated so, without naming them. Other ministers, notably Roman Catholic and Presbyterian, record the maiden names of the mothers, information which is often difficult to obtain from any other source.

SOME NOTES ON THE ACCURACY OF THE COUNTY MARRIAGE REGISTERS

Unfortunately, the system of registration that resulted in the County Marriage Registers left ample room for errors and inaccuracies. The original record of a marriage would be kept by the officiating clergyman at the time of the marriage (and there is evidence this

was often done later, from memory). The first transcription of this record would occur at the end of the calendar year when the clergyman, or someone acting for him, would copy this record and send the copy to the Registrar of the appropriate county. The second transcription would then take place, when the Registrar or his deputy would copy the minister's return into the County Marriage Register. Finally, a third transcription of the County Marriage Register was undertaken by the present compiler, in order to prepare this volume. There are, therefore, no less than four stages at which errors and misinterpretations can creep into the records, although it would seem obvious that the greatest number of inaccuracies would occur during the second transcription.

The COUNTY MARRIAGE REGISTERS are housed at the Archives of Ontario, under the designation RG-8, Series I-6-B, Volumes 1-86.

This particular transcription is complete for each entry, but excludes the names of witnesses, name of minister, and page number in the register. I have alphabeticized the names completely. However, a strictly alphabetical index would have resulted in the names of persons of the same family being found in widely separated sections, because of the many variant spellings of the same name. Thus, in order to retain natural family groupings, all variant spellings of one surname are grouped together.

The complete entry is listed under the bridegroom's name, but for ease of reference I have included, at the end of each transcription, an alphabeticized list of the maiden names of the mothers of either bride or groom when given in the record.

For example, when the list records "Campbell Mary see Donald Jones," you would look for the complete marriage entry under Jones, Donald, and either the bride or the groom's mother would be Mary Campbell.

When a question mark, thus (?), follows a name, it indicates that I am uncertain of the spelling of that name.

When he lived in Marmora there was only one church and that the old Roman Catholic Church across the river. Then services were only held in that edifice once a year. In the springtime a priest came up from Belleville to celebrate Mass. The bridge over Crowe River at that time was an old wooden one, and Mr. Anderson said "It was rickety and dangerous, very dangerous."

Residents of Marmora remembered by this grand old man as living at that time were:—John Devolin and Richard Laycock, both of whom were shoemakers. John Crawford, who clerked. William, John and Richard Leonard, three brothers. Patrick Callaghan, who farmed in the second concession of Marmora Township near his own brother, Roderick or Ludwig Anderson. John Sloan, the miller. Michael Shea. Others such as Benjamin Johnson, J. P. and Francis Revoir, who moved into Marmora from Rawdon later were well known to him. "The main part of Rawdon lay as a wilderness" to use his own words but the front part was settled.

Marmora Village

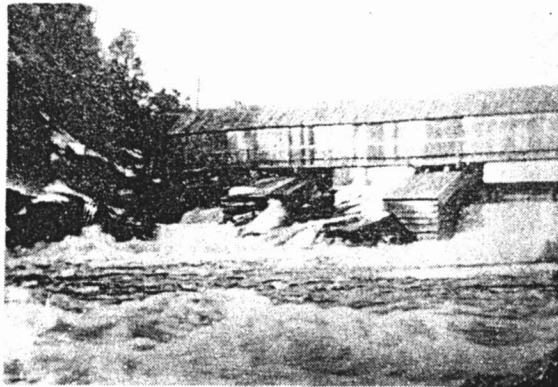
"The village of Marmora is known all over Canada, and in many parts of the Old World, not on account of its size and wealth, but from its connection with the Marmora Iron Works . . ."

(County of Hastings Directory, 1864-65)

Marmora was the first village of importance in the central section of Hastings County. The opening of its iron works after 1820 (as described in chapter eleven) created a thriving community, second only to Belleville for many years.

As early as 1822, Marmora had a population of between 150 and 200 persons. It was a company town in a sense, since the iron works originally built and operated many of the businesses and provided housing for its workers. By 1823, lands were being offered for sale to other interested businessmen, and a grist mill and brewery were erected in that year.

The Roman Catholics built the first church in the village by 1830. The building, about 43 by 25 feet, was of native stone. The floor was of three inch thick pine planks, while a putty coat of white plaster covered the inside walls. The first pews were of pine, simple in construction.

Marmora's history continued to be the history of the iron works, and when these shut down, as they did from time to time, the village suffered greatly. Fortunately, by 1860, lumbering and farming gained in importance, and the village merchants catered to these sources of trade.

As of 1864, there were 49 families resident in the village. The majority of the wage-earners were involved in supplying services to the surrounding inhabitants. John Devlin, Thomas Price, Patrick Shea, and Henry Weese were shoemakers, while Dennis Shannon was the village's tailor. There were two blacksmiths — Simon Armstrong and Charles

CHRONOLOGICAL DEVLIN FAMILY HISTORY

FOREWORD; It is regrettable that early information on Mark Devlin I could not be found. He was born in Ireland, but we do not know where or when. His first child, Bernard, was born in Picton, Ontario, in 1823, and his wife, Martha Wilson, was born in Adolphustown, Ontario, in 1800. We can only guess at his age. No record has been found of his marriage to Martha Wilson.

- 1805 Gavon Dame born in Belleville, Ontario [married Sarah A. Devlin, third child of Mark and Martha]
- 1815 Joseph Fraser Way born June 19 in Sophiasburg, P.E. County [married Jane Eleanor Devlin, fourth child of Mark and Martha]
- 1817 Edward Gladney born [married Ruth Meath who later married John Wilson Devlin, second child of Mark and Martha Devlin]
- 1823 John Courtney born in Ireland [married Harriet E. Devlin sixth child of Mark and Martha Devlin]
- 1823 Bernard Devlin born in Picton, Ontario, first child of Mark and Martha Devlin
- 1826 John Wilson Devlin born in Gananoque, Ontario, second child of Mark and Martha Devlin
- 1830 Sarah A. Devlin born in Gananoque, Ontario, third child of Mark and Martha Devlin. [The 1851 Census for Hastings County gives her birth as 1828 by age subtraction. Census data can be suspect.]

Also shown is Bernard Devlin, age 25, single, blacksmith, Catholic, born in Prince Edward County. Also shown is Martha Devlin, age 52, single, Episcopalian Methodist. Brighton, Ontario, is shown as residence for all three. (Note that John's and Bernard's ages are at variance with some records. This is not unusual for census records.) Sarah A. Devlin is shown in the Belleville Census records as age 23 (rather than age 21 in other data), single, Episcopalian Methodist, born in Canada, member of the family of Richard Russell (a housemaid perhaps?)
- 1854 William Edward Gladney born in Marmora,, Ontario, first child of Ruth Meath and Edward Gladney
- 1857 The 1857 Directory for the Province of Ontario shows John Wilson Devlin as a shoemaker in Sterling, Ontario. Mark Devlin is shown as clerk in the Crown Timber Office in Belleville, Ontario. (I believe that this is Mark I)
- 1857 Possible date of death of Edward Gladney in Marmora, Ontario
- 1858 Sarah Leticia Gladney born in Marmora, Ontario, second child of Ruth Meath and Edward Gladney
- 1860 Bernard Devlin, age 36, married Eliza Jane Lott, age 23, on April 19, in Toronto, Ontario
- 1860 Sarah A. Devlin, age 30, married Gavon Dame, age 55, on September 8, probably in Belleville, Ontario

By the 1879-80 Belleville Directory, John has now moved to Matthew Street and is still-employed as a shoemaker.

According to the 1891 Sidney Township Census, Mattha is now a widow and living with her daughter Fanny. Fanny A. has married Moses Boardman of Sharington, Sidney Township. Fanny has married on 1 November, 1863 at Brighton, Ontario. Fanny was born on 6 June, 1843 and Moses was born on 15 February, 1830. In the 1901 Sidney Township Census they are both farming in that township.
