The cheese is graded at five centres, Belleville, Campbellford, Kingston, Brockville and Montreal. Mr. Finnegan had the high score for all centres hi. score being 93.3631. Last year he stood third and in 1928 he was second among all the contestants.

The trophy must be won three times before it becomes the permanent property of the winner. It has been up for competition for four years and no cheesemaker so far has won it twice. It is a high tribute to Mr. Finnegan that he has stood so high for three years in succession. The cup will be in Dunlay's window for a time, where anyone can see it.

Instructor Bailey, concluding speaker thanked preceeding speakers for their timely addresses and made some very practical observations.


