OBITUARY

WARDEN G. CHRYSLER

The death of one of Marmora's most well known and highly respected citizens occurred in Peterborough Civic Hospital, on Saturday evening, in the person of Warden George Chrysler, in his 56th year.

He was stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage on Friday while out in the yard at his home and had to be carried into the house by neighbors. Dr. E. C. Shatford attended him.

His condition did not improve and on Saturday he was conveyed to the hospital where he passed away that evening.

The late Mr. Chrysler was born in Belmont Township, the son of the late William James Chrysler and Amanda Ellis. He attended Cordova Mines Public School. For thirty-five years he was employed by Deloro Smelting and Refining Co. Ltd. where for many years he was a foreman in the Oxide Department.

Upon leaving Deloro he operated a small grocery store in Peterborough for a short time following which he returned to Marmora and for a short time was employed by the C.N.R. Due to ill health he was forced to retire a couple of years ago. He was of friendly nature and popular with all who knew him.

The deceased was twice married, his first wife being Iva Kilpatrick, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Richard Kilpatrick of Marmora Township, one son, Kenneth, of Belleville, survives of his marriage. Later he was married to Pearl Wilkes, daughter of George Wilkes and the late Mrs. Wilkes, who is left to mourn his loss. Of the marriage there are three children, all at home Marion, Robert and James.

He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. William Chrysler, Hastings, two brothers, Wilfred and Wellington, Hastings, and one sister, Mrs. William Chamberland, (Wealthy) Peterborough.

The remains rested at the Wells Funeral Home from Sunday till Tuesday afternoon when the funeral proceeded to St. Andrew's United Church for Service at 2:30 p.m. Interment was made in the Vault at Marmora Protestant Cemetery.

A large number of Freemasons including visiting brethren from Campbellford, Havelock and Madoc attended the funeral.

PATRICK J. FITZPATRICK

The funeral of the late Patrick Joseph Fitzpatrick, a former Marmora Township boy, was held from his residence on Young Street, Sudbury, to St. Joseph's Church at nine o'clock on Wednesday morning, Sept. 18th. Rev. Father J. Salini sang the Requiem Mass, assisted by a full male choir.

Mr. Fitzpatrick had been suffering from a heart condition for some time, but had been in comparatively good health just prior to his death, and the last attack came suddenly. He was born in Marmora, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Fitzpatrick. He went north in the early days of the Froot Mine and carried on exploration work there.

Injured in an accident at the big northern mine, he was given a watchman's position for some twenty years in the Froot and Stobie Mines. Later he went to Crean Hill and then to Crean Hill. He was retired with pension only three years ago.

He married Suzanne Maloney of Marmora thirty-two years ago in St. Ann's Church, Sudbury. He moved to Sudbury with his family in 1914. Surviving are his wife, one daughter, Hettie, and two sons, Ran and Joseph. Also surviving are one sister, Mrs. James Henahan, of Trenton, and two brothers, Terrence, of Cordova Mines, and James of Detroit.

His great interest was horses and all sports. Interested in civic administration, he served on the township council at Crean Hill for a number of years, and for the last two years on the McKim Township Council. He was also a member of the Stobie and Froot School Boards for many years.

JAMES J. FITZPATRICK

Residents of Stirling village and district were shocked to learn of the sudden death of James Jeffrey Fitzpatrick, who passed away following a heart attack late Thursday afternoon. Though not enjoying the best of health in recent weeks he had continued his occupational duties as mail courier between Stirling and Marmora each day with the same regularities. Death was due to a heart attack, which came several hours after he completed his daily run to Marmora.

Deceased, who was in his sixty-fifth year, was born at Halloway, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Fitzpatrick and came to Stirling about twenty-six years ago and was engaged in the hotel business as proprietor of the Kirby House Hotel. Twenty-one years ago he entered the mail service as courier between Stirling and Marmora. Serving with faithfulness and dependability he became a friend of all with whom he came in contact. Ever willing to go the second mile in the performance of his duties, many little favours were performed by him to accommodate those whom he served. An ardent sportsman, he was widely known in all parts of the county and his qualities of good citizenship made him one of the most popular residents of the village. He was a faithful member of St. James' Church.

Surviving is his bereaved wife, formerly Sarah Burke; one son, John Fitzpatrick, Belleville; and two daughters, Marguerite, Reg. N. and Marie of Stirling, also one sister, Mrs. Mary Shea, Stirling.

The funeral took place Saturday morning from the family residence to the Church of St. James the Minor where Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father LeSage. Interment took place in St. James cemetery.

Cordova Boy Killed In Action

Mr. and Mrs. Terence Fitzpatrick, Cordova Mines, have received official notification of the death of their son, Spr. James T. Fitzpatrick in a road accident in France on August 13th. Sapper Fitzpatrick, who was 26 years of age, enlisted in the Royal Canadian Engineers, on Sept. 4th, 1942. He went overseas in March, 1943 after training at Toronto, Orillia and Petawawa, and went to France early in July. He was born at Cordova Mines, attended Cordova public school, worked at Cordova Mine and for the Acme Screw and Gear Co., Toronto, prior to enlistment. He was a member of Havelock Catholic Church. Besides his parents he is survived by a brother, Sgt. T. V. (Vince) Fitzpatrick with the Hastings and Prince Edward Regiment in Sicily, who was wounded in Sicily in July 1943. A brother Jack and sister Loretta at home.

TERENCE D. FITZPATRICK

Terence D. Fitzpatrick, native of Marmora township, died at his home in Havelock on Monday at the age of 79.

His illness extended over a period of five years, the last year of which was spent in bed.

He was the son of the late Daniel Fitzpatrick and Annie Flynn, and was educated in his native township. As a young man he was attracted to the mining camps of Northern Ontario, but after his marriage in 1910, he took up farming as an occupation residing at Cordova Mines for forty years before moving to Havelock for retirement. JOHN J. L. GIFFORD

On Sunday, December 4th, after an extended illness John J. L. Gifford passed away in St. Joseph's Hospital, Peterborough, aged seventy-six years and two months. For over thirty years he had been a well known resident of Deloro and district and had made many friends. Previous to coming to Deloro he resided in Toronto and suburbs for a long period.

In 1915 the late John Gifford served in the Sportsman's Battalion in which the late Lou Marsh, sports editor of the Toronto Star and one of Canada's finest sportsmen, was an officer. Later he transferred to the Queen's Own Rifles when the late Tom Longboat was attached to the Battalion. Longboat, an Indian, was one of the world's greatest runners and at that time was at the height of his fame and gave an exhibition of running every Saturday. The deceased would relate many incidents of the times he and Longboat had together. In 1917 he came to Deloro and entered the employ of Deloro and entered the employ of Deloro Smelting & Refining Co. Limited.

The deceased is survived by his wife, whose maiden name was Annie Fitzpatrick. They had no family.

The funeral was held on Wednesday forenoon, proceeding from his late residence on the old Deloro road, to Sacred Heart Church, Marmora, where Requiem Mass was conducted by Rev. J. A. O'Neill. Interment took place in Sacred Heart cemetery.

FATAL ACCIDENT

The one regrettable feature in connection with Marmora Fair this year was an accident which resulted in the death of Mrs. M. Fitzpatrick. She was crossing the race track with her daughter, Mrs. A. McLaughlin, when a horse belonging to Mr. Elmhirst, of Peterboro, and driven by a man named Bowen, ran into them. Both were knocked to the ground and injured, Mrs. Fitzpatrick so seriously that death resulted in a few hours, and Mrs. McLaughlin had her shoulder bruised and was badly shaken up. The victims of the accident were rushed to Dr. Thomson's office and given all possible assistance. It was thought for a time that Mrs. Fitzpatrick would recover and she was removed to her home east of the Village but she passed away early in the evening.

Dr. Bissonette, of Stirling, a Coroner of the County of Hastings was notified and it was decided to hold an inquest. Yesterday afternoon a jury was impanelled, the following being sworn in: W. R. Linn, Geo. Forestell, Char. Lummis, Tim Byrnes, C. W. Gladney, Jacob Wilkes, Philip Sopha, M. J. McInerney and Jas. Moiney. Mr. C. W. Gladney was elected foreman. After the jury had viewed the remains the inquest was adjourned until next Tuesday, Oct. 4th, when a number of witnesses will be called to fix the responsibility for the accident.

The sympathy of the community goes out to the bereaved family in their sudden loss.

MANY WITNESSES AT INQUEST.

The inquest in connection with the death of the late Mrs. Margaret Fitzpatrick was held on Tuesday with Dr. Bissonette, of Stirling, presiding as Coroner. Mr. Wm. Carnew, Crown Attorney, represented the Crown and E. Gus. Porter, K. C.; M. P., represented Marmora Agricultural Society.

The inquest lasted most of the day the following witnesses being called: Mr. H. Gillen, Mrs. A. McLaughlin, Mrs. Adam McGarvey, Dr. Crawford, Dr. Thomson, Messrs. John Burns, Clayton Tucker, Jas. McAvoyn, Wm. Holland, C. A. Bleecker, W. A. Sanderson, Fred Johnston, Seymour Henry, J. C. Bowen, J. F. Bowen, Chas. A. Dracup, A. T. Neal, Jas. Montgomery, Ross Turley, Thos. R. Warren, Geo. Wellman, Leonard Sharpe, Dan. Shannon, C. W. Clancy, Thos. Potts, Bert Crawford, John Hay, Hugh Farrell, Ed. Moloney, John Rainey, Jas. Scott, Wm. Wright, Dan Sharpe, Wilbert Bedore, John Thompson, Jas. Fitzpatrick, D. Crippen, Donald Moloney, Elgin Jackman and John Snarr.

Most of the evidence was very much along the same line. Mr. Gillen told of the procedure in connection with the selecting of the Jury and summoning of witnesses, etc. He also stated that the Agricultural Society had engaged five special constables in addition to himself and their duties were particularly to try to keep people from crossing the track while the speeding events were going on. The number of special constables was larger than had ever been employed before.

Dr. Crawford told of the injuries to the deceased revealed by the post mortem examination. Her nose was broken, there was a bruise under the skull on each side of the head and the skull was fractured. Dr. Thomson corroborated his evidence.

Mrs. A. McLaughlin, who was with her mother at the time of the accident and was also knocked down and injured, did not have a very clear recollection of what occurred. She told of going with her mother to the Fair and of crossing to the midway and then starting to recross the track when the band began to play. She did not see the constables or hear any warning until just as the accident occurred she heard some one call out, but didn't know what was said.

Mrs. A. McGarvey told of seeing the deceased and her daughter start to cross the track. They were not going straight across, but were going towards band stand where the band was playing. They appeared to be talking and did not look up the track as they crossed. She did not see the horse until it was a few feet from them and it was too late to stop it then.

Mr. John Burns told of being sent for ropes to stretch across the crossing before the accident started and the various constables told of the efforts made to protect the public and keeping them off the track while speeding events were going on.

Mr. Chas. A. Dracup gave very clear account of the accident. He was standing on the west side of the track when Mrs. Fitzpatrick and daughter started to cross from the east side. Quite a number of people were on the track and had lined up along the fence on either side. The deceased was south of the other people on the east side down near the judges' stand. Just as the horse was passing between the people she and her daughter stepped out and started to cross the track. They were talking and did not appear to look up the track to see if it was safe to cross. The horse struck Mrs. Fitzpatrick hurling her against Mrs. McLaughlin the latter also being knocked over by the shock. Messrs. Elgin Jackman and John Snarr corroborated this evidence in every particular.
