GEORGE RICE, R.C.A.F. VETERAN, AND CHUM KILLED IN MOTOR ACCIDENT

One of the most shocking accidents in the history of Marmora occurred about nine o'clock Saturday evening, as a result of which George Richard Rice, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Rice, and a war time chum, Edward J. Flynn, lost their lives. The accident occurred on the hill on No. 7 highway, a short distance west of the bridge where the old Havelock road branches off.

George Rice and three other buddies of the R.C.A.F. were enjoying a week end visit at Crowe Lake at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Rice. All had started for the village, George and Flynn riding the former's motor cycle, while Mr. and Mrs. Rice and the other two followed in Mr. Rice's auto. As the motorcycle came down the hill, following a car, Mr. Gilbert Steenburgh was proceeding up the hill on a business trip to a home on the old road. He stopped to let a car pass and then turned left, not seeing the motorcycle, which was obscured by the car, until it was too late. George Rice who was driving the motorcycle tried to pass between the car and the guard rails at the side of the road, but just missed by a few inches. The cycle struck the left front fender of Steenburgh's car with a very heavy impact crushing R and knocking off the left headlight and the left front wheel. The bodies of both boys were hurled through the ir striking the guard posts and wirs. Edward Flynn was instantly killed and George Rice died in less than an hour.

A few minutes after the accident Dr. H. Crawford and Constable Lavender reached the scene of the tragedy. F. N. Marett & Co's ambulance was summoned and George, accompanied by his mother and Dr. Crawford, started for Belleville General Hospital, followed by Mr. Rice in his uto, but he passed away before the ospital was reached.

i. H. Hatch, Provincial Constable, and Dr. S. Eagleson, of Madoc, a oroner for the County of Hastings, ere promptly notified and soon eached the scene of the accident. After a preliminary examination the Doroner ordered the removal of the body of Flynn to F. N. Marett & Co's indertaking rooms. The Provincial officer decided the collision was enirely accidental and unless some new evidence is brought out at the injuest no blame is attached to any-

George R. Rice was 22 years of age, as born in Marmora and spent all is life here until he enlisted in the LCAF, early in the war. A boy of xemplary character he was very opular with young and old alike and as held in high esteem. In High chool he was a fine student, adired by his teachers and popular ith other students in the school.

After enlisting in the R.C.A.F. and aining in Canada he was sent overas for further training in England. The then served in North Africa and ther parts of that continent and ter in Italy in a special branch of ne-R.C.A.F.

His closest friend during the war cars was Edward Flynn. They traind together, went overseas together, erved in the same war areas and remed together, both escaping without injury. In recent months they had been rooming in the same house on Beatty Ave., Toronto. For both death came in the same tragic accident.

Besides his grief stricken parents George is survived by two sisters Mrs. Dandy (Evelyn) and Mrs. Fobert (Kathaleen), both of Toronto. The sympathy of the whole community goes out to the family in their bereavement. An older brother, James lost his life about fifteen years ago as a result of the accidental discharge of a shot gun while duck hunting, which makes this tragely seem all the harder to bear.

The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon under the auspices of Marmora Branch No 237 Canadian Legion and was a very impressive one. Proceeding from the summer home of Mr. and Mrs. Rice at Crowe Lake the cortege was met at the Memorial building by a detachment of the R.C.A.F. from Trenton Airport, under the command of Fl. Lieut. Hook and a large number of veterans of World War 1 and II, who marched ahead of the hearse to St. Paul's Anglican Church. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. J. M. Brownlie, rector, who also conducted the burial service at the graveside.

The R.C.A.F. men and veteran also marched to the cemetery and after Rev. Mr. Brownlie had completed his part of the service, the Canadian Legion service was conducted by President Wilbert Mumby and veterans dropped a poppy in the grave and saluted. The last post and Reville were impressively sounded by L.A.C Beaudra a bugler of the R.C.A.F. A photographer from the R.C.A.F. also took a number of pictures. The pal bearers were Sergt. Don Prentice, o the R.C.A.F. and veterans of the las war Ted Gazeley, Robt. Gray, Bil Prentice, David Crawford and Gler Lavender.

Instructions were received by F. N. Marett & Co. to ship the body of Ed J. Flynn to Toronto where the funeral will take place. It is reported that his mother, who resides in England will reach Toronto by airplane for the obsequies.

The Coroner's Jury Attaches No Blame To Anyone

The inquest in connection with the death of the late George Rice and Edward Flynn, who died as the result of an accident on No 7 Highway West of the bridge on the evening of Saturday, July 27th, was held in the town hall yesterday afternoon. Coroner Dr. Eagleson, of Madoc, presided and County Crown Attorney B. C. Donnan, K. C., of investhe conducted Belleville, Lloyd, Mary Miss tigation. of Belleville was stenographer and Constable W. D. Lavender carried out the police duties in connection with the inquest.

The following composed the jury and gave their verdict after hearing the evidence: Vincent Lynch, foreman, Wm. Regan, Don Robertson, Gordon Jarvis and Wm. Shannon.

Seven witnesses in all were called in the following order: Dr. Hamilton Crawford, Prov. Officer J. H. Hatch, F. R. Wells, Jas. A. Rice, Jack Williams, Vernon Morgan and Gilbert Steenburgh. Williams and Morgan are the chums of the deceased who were with Mr. and Mrs. Rice in their car and witnessed the accident. Messrs. Rice, Williams, Morgan and Steenburgh were eye witnesses of the tragedy and quietly told how it occurred. Members of the jury, through the Crown Attorney, asked the witnesses quite a number of questions to have the whole picture before them in arriving at their verdict.

The verdict attached no blame to anyone and after the usual opening form was as follows:

"That Edward Flynn died at the village of Marmora on the 27th day of July, 1946, and George Rice died in an ambulance, while proceeding from the village of Marmora to the city of Belleville; both deaths being the result of personal injuries sustained when a motorcycle, driven by George Rice, upon which Edward Flynn was a passenger, collided with a motor car driven by Gilbert Steenburgh on highway No 7, in the village of Marmora in the County of Hastings."

After drawing water she had apparently left the trap door open and in carrying on her work in some way had stepped back, falling into the cistern. It appears that in falling she tried to catch a chair, as a chair was knocked over near the opening to the cistern. The water in the cistern was only about four feet deep, but the walls of the cistern were about seven feet high, so that it was impossible to get out without assistance and there was no one at home. Evidently Miss Flynn lived for some time at least after falling in the water as her hands and knees were bruised and torn by the desperate efforts she had made to escape.

Her aged mother, who lived with her, had gone for the day to the home of her son Edward, who was ill, and her brother John, for whom she kept house, was driving the mail route that day for Edward, owing to the latter's illness. On his way round he stopped at the house and discovered the tragedy. Relatives and friends were at once notified and also the Coroner, Dr. Harper, of Madoc. After visiting the scene of the accident, and learning the particulars as nearly as they could be determined, the Coroner decided an inquest was unnecessary.

The deceased was a daughter of the late David Flynn and Mrs. Flynn. Besides her aged mother, who is seventy-eight years old, she is survived by six brothers and four sisters. They are David and James Flynn, of Deloraine, Man.; Patrick, of Seymour township; William, of Marmora; John and Edward, of Marmora township; Mrs. John Sullivan and Mrs. John McCullough, of Marmora, Mrs. Alphonse Madden, of Peterboro, and Mrs. Harry Warren, of Marmora township.

The sympathy of the whole community will go out to the bereaved family in their trouble. A large number of friends will also deeply regret the passing of one who was esteemed for her ready sympathy and many admirable qualities.

LICENSE BOARD GRANTS LICENSES

Shop Licenses Cut off and a Number of Hotels Granted Only Three Months Permits.

The matter of the cutting off of the license of Mr. Wm. Flynn also came before the Board. It was felt by every member of the Council that as Mr. Flynn had only taken this business over about a year ago, paying a considerable sum for the good will of same, and has so far received comparatively small profits it was a hardship thus taking his license on such short notice. It seemed particularly unfair from the fact that there has been no complaints from any of the citizens of the village, while in Madoc, where there have been pregnent complaints in regard to the conducting of the liquor store, a license was granted. On motion of Councilors Mackechnie and Warren it was decided to memoralize the Commissioners asking that at least the time be extended for the current license year, and that in future the village council be given longer notice in regard to such charges, so that steps may be taken to provide in other ways for the revenue thus cut off.

The council then adjourned to meet in regular session on Monday evening next.

MARMORA HERAD 2 MAY 1907 The license board of North Hastings met at Hotel Royal, Marmora, on Thursday last. The full board were in attendance and had a hard day's work listening to complaints from deputations and other matters.

There were some radical changes made. A deputation from Coe Hill made a strenuous "kick" against a license being granted to George Hamilton. To back up their plea they had a petition signed by about seventy per cent of the rate payers of Wollaston Township. There was also a deputation who spoke in favor of Mr. Hamilton and the board decided to give Mr. Hamilton only 3 months permit to enable him to dispose of his stock.

Rev. Mr. Bates, Methodist Minister of Bancroit, spoke against renewal of shop license to Mr. P. Rody of Bancroft. | His case was a strong one. The Board decided to cut out all the shops, claiming this was the wish of the license department at Toronto. This means there will be no shobs at Bancroft, Madoc, and Marmora. Three months permits were granted to allow the shopkeepers to dispose of their stocks. The Board were not satisfied with the way Mrs. Potter conducts her hotel at Millbridge and she also was given 3 months permit. In the meantime she will probably sell the property. Mr. D. Hogan, of Hogan, must remove the Post office from his hotel or else lose his license on 1st August.

Mr. Doyle of Maynooth was not considered a good hotelman and license

will not be granted him.

The other licenses were granted in

the usual way.

Mr. Flynn being cut off in Marmora came as a surprise to everyone. It is reported that there had been no complaints against him. He stands to lose heavily because he bought out the business only a year ago. A large number of business men are surprised to find him dealt with so summarily and the general impression is that he should have been given notice for a year. It is also reported that the license to the shop at Mache has really been granted.

WILLIAM FLYNN

Following an operation in St. Joseph's Hospital, Peterborough, from which he failed to rally William Flynn passed away early yesterday morning, after a comparatively short illness. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Flynn, early pioneers of Marmora township and who came to Canada from Ireland. The late William Flynn was born in Marmora township seventy-seven years ago and had lived all his life in the township or village, with the exception of a short period spent in Western Canada with his elder brother James.

The deceased had a wide circle of friends who will regret his passing. As a young man he worked in the lumber camps and was a proficient river-driver, when the big drives of logs were brought down Crowe River. Later he went into business in Marmora and conducted a livery business and sold buggies and cutters and other vehicles. He also had a liquor store in the large frame building, which was destroyed by fire. His large barn and other buildings were also destroyed in the same fire, together with a large stock of new buggies and farm equipment he had on hand for sale. His losses in the fire were very heavy..

After the fire he built the brick residence now occupied by Mr. E. C. Prentice, the large steel barn and the building occupied by Mrs. Milton Campbell, which was used as a liquor store for a time. The passing of the Ontario Temperance Act closed the liquor store. The deceased then carried on a flour and feed business for a time, but later purchased what was known as the Fidler farm in Marmora township where he has since resided.

Those who knew him best will remember him for his kindliness and fondness for children. In religion he was a faithful member of Sacred Heart Church. He was a life-long Liberal, but in recent years had taken no active part in politics.
