A freak accident in front of the Marmora Herald office injured Miss Mary Hughes of Burst-hall Street, Marmora.

Miss Hughes, 79, had just received a ride down from the Free Methodist Church with Mrs Stewart Hardy and was coming into the Herald office. However when she closed the back door of the car, part of her coat caught in the edge of the door. Mrs. Hardy unaware of this pulled away. Miss Hughes, unable to free her coat was thrown off her feet and landed on her head and shoulder knocking her out.

Dr. Parkin was summoned and she was carried to his office where she was treated.

A large bump on her forehead and a broken collar bone were the extent of her injuries. She was taken to Belleville Hospital on the weekend for x-rays but

no further injuries were found. However, it was decided that she should remain for a few days to recover.

We phoned Mr. Jim Hughes on Tuesday night and he said she was up and around and coming along remarkably well and was in good spirit.

This type of freak accident is one you hear about, but very seldom are ever near enough to realize what can happen. It looks like one can never be too caution around cars no matter what the circumstances.

MRS. FRANCES McCANN

At the home of her nieces, Misses Mary and Hilda Hughes, a former highly esteemed resident passed away in the person of Mrs. Frances McCann, of Tweed. The deceased, who was in her 80th year, was a daughter of the late Laughlin Hughes and wife, formerly Louise Chisolm, and was born on the old homestead in Marmora Township. While she was quite young the family moved to Belleville for three of four years and then returned to the farm in Marmora township, where she resided until her marriage to Thomas McCann, a prominent Tweed merchant for many years, who predeceased her some years ago.

The late Mrs. McCann had many friends among the older residents of the district and her frequent visits enabled her to keep in touch with friends of earlier years. She had been troubled with a heart condition for some time and about the first of last October came to visit the Misses Hughes, hoping that a few weeks in the old home would improve her health. However she failed to recover her health and gradually her condition became worse.

The deceased was a devout member of St. Carthagh's Catholic Church Tweed, and whenever at all possible was a daily attendant at Mass. Active in the service of the Church she was a member of the Altar Society and the Sacred Heart League. In Tweed, as in Marmora, she had many friends and was very highly esteemed. Only one brother survives, Thomas Hughes, of Minneapolis, Minn.

The funeral was held last Friday forenoon and was largely attended. High Requiem Mass was conducted in Sacred Heart Church, Marmora, by Rev. Father H. J. Farrell, pastor, and Rev. C. church and a reformer in politics.

MRS. FRANCES McCANN

At the home of her nieces, Misses Mary and Hilda Hughes, a former highly esteemed resident passed away in the person of Mrs. Frances McCann, of Tweed. The deceased, who was in her 80th year, was a daughter of the late Laughlin Hughes and wife, formerly Louise Chisolm, and was born on the old homestead in Marmora Township. While she was quite young the family moved to Belleville for three of four years and then returned to the farm in Marmora township, where she resided until her marriage to Thomas McCann, a prominent Tweed merchant for many years, who predeceased her some years ago.

The late Mrs. McCann had many friends among the older residents of the district and her frequent visits enabled her to keep in touch with friends of earlier years. She had been troubled with a heart condition for some time and about the first of last October came to visit the Misses Hughes, hoping that a few weeks in the old home would improve her health. However she failed to recover her health and gradually her condition became worse.

The deceased was a devout member of St. Carthagh's Catholic Church Tweed, and whenever at all possible was a daily attendant at Mass. Active in the service of the Church she was a member of the Altar Society and the Sacred Heart League. In Tweed, as in Marmora, she had many friends and was very highly esteemed. Only one brother survives, Thomas Hughes, of Minneapolis, Minn.

The funeral was held last Friday forenoon and was largely attended. High Requiem Mass was conducted in Sacred Heart Church, Marmora, by Rev. Father H. J. Farrell, pastor, and Rev. Dean Cullinane, of St. Carthagh's Church. On arrival of the cortege in Tweed Libera was sung in St. Carthagh's Church. Interment took place in St. Carthagh's Cemetery, Tweed.
