## OBITUARY

### ROBERT JONES

After a comparatively short illness, following a stroke, Robert Jones passed peacefully away last Friday forenoon at the home of his son, Charles Jones, at the ripe old age of eighty-five years and ten months. He was a life long citizen of Marmora township, having been born on a farm close to the place where he passed away. He was one of ten children of the late Hugh and Anne Jones and was born on May 8th, 1853. He was the last surviving member of the family. His father was Reeve of Marmora Township in the years 1860-1864 and was also a Justice of the Peace. Remarkable changes have taken place during the life time of the late Robert Jones. Much of Hastings County was still virgin forest and a trip to Belleville would be as memorable an event as a trip to New York is to-day. Frankford had not been erected into a Police village when he was born and Stirling was not incorporated until five years later. At that time Madoc, Audon and Elzevir were all one municipality. County Council had control of road allowances and Township Treasurers were also trustees for the school fund and paid to the teachers the small amount they received, upon the orders of the local superintendents. One of the earliest County By-Laws on record, No. 43, passed June 11th, 1852, attached the township of Lake to the township of Marmora. In 1859 a By-Law was passed by Hastings County for the endowment of a Professorship of Agricultural Chemistry and Mineralogy in Aldert College Belleville.

On March 25th, 1869, a by-law was enacted by the County that no taxes shall be levied in any of the minor municipalities within the County of Hastings for the purpose of paying for sheep killed. It was further enacted that no municipality shall be liable for any sheep killed in said municipality to any person or persons whatsoever, etc. To-day such regulations are under the control of the Province and are entirely different.

The late Robert Jones had a very retentive memory and liked to tell of conditions as they existed and events which happened in the early days and compare them with modern times. When he was a young man lumbering was the chief industry in the county and for about ten years he worked in the lumber camp for the Rathbun Company. The big drive of logs down the rivers and lakes each spring were among the outstanding events of the year.

For most of his life deceased was one of Marmora township's best known farmers. He was assessor for the municipality of Marmora and Lake for about fifteen years and had charge of the work the first year a colonization road grant was received by the municipality. He was also a school trustee for many years and a director of Marmora Cheese Factory. He was an ardent Conservative in politics and a member of the Anglican Church. He served as Rector's Warden at Trinity Church for some years.

The maiden name of deceased's mother was Anne Keys and she was a daughter of Royal Keys, one of

107 years, 1 month and 26 days. He was a native of County Fermanagh, Ireland.

On January 17th, 1872, the late Robert Jones was married to Margaret Jandreau, of Rawdon township, who was then teacher at S.S. No. 2, Marmora. At that time teachers boarded around with families in the section in turn and received only a small amount in money. She passed away about thirty years ago. Seven children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Jones, six of whom survive him. Robert passed away years ago. Surviving are Mrs. Julian Bedore, Marmora; Mrs. A. Kaiting, Kingston; Mrs. H. Mitchell, Crediton; Cyrus Jones, Ottawa; Hugh, Belleville; and Charles, Marmora township. He is also survived by 37 grandchildren and 26 great grandchildren.

The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon from the home of his son, Charles Jones, to St. Paul's Anglican Church, Marmora. In spite of stormy weather and bad roads there was a very large attendance, the community turning out to pay their last respects to a good neighbor and highly esteemed citizen. The funeral services were conducted by Rural Deacon A. B. Caldwell, who preached an impressive sermon from the text "This is life eternal, to know Thee, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom Thou has sent," John 17:3. The hymns sung were "On the Resurrection Morning" and "Abide With Me." Interment was made in the family plot in Marmora Protestant Cemetery. The pall bearers were Messrs. L. E. Neal, John Bell, Dan Shannon, Bert Crawford, Irwin McCoy and John Moffatt.

### Double Tragedy At Detroit

Charles Stewart Jones, son of the late Dr. H. M. Jones, of Marmora, and Mrs. M. Jones, now of Toronto, and his four year old son, Glen, were instantly killed on Wednesday evening of last week in Detroit. Mr. Jones had been night watchman at the big airport at Dearborn for some years and on the evening of the accident was taking his lithe son with him, as the lad liked to see the airships come in. Their auto was struck by a M.C.R. passenger train and carried about 200 yards a total wreck. Mr. Jones and Glen were instantly killed and their bodies badly mutilated.

The late Charles Stewart Jones was born in Marmora about 41 years ago and his early life was spent here, where he was popular with all classes. His father was a widely known physician here for many years and also owned and conducted a drug store. For some time he taught in the Ridge Road school, near Stirling, and then enlisted and went overseas with the 155th battalion. After his return from overseas he resided in Toronto for some time. A year or two after leaving the army he married Miss Emma Grant, daughter of the late Wesley Grant and Mrs. Grant, of Marmora. About ten years ago they moved to Detroit where they had since resided.

Besides his widow, he leaves one daughter, Helen, and one son, Lawrence, the latter being at present in a Detroit hospital, where he underwent an operation. He is also survived by his mother and two sisters, Misses Muriel and Olive, of Toronto, and one brother, Major Hubert M. Jones, of Belleville.

The remains of father and son were cremated and the funeral service was held at Funeral Parlors in Detroit. Mrs. Grant, Mrs. Campbell, Mrs. Hannah and Messrs. Frank and John Grant went to Detroit for the funeral. Mrs. Grant will remain with her daughter for a few weeks.

MRS. WILLIAM JONES

Marmora Township has again been rendered the poorer by the passing away last Sunday afternoon of Mary Elizabeth Bailey, wife of William Jones. The deceased lady had been in indifferent health for a number of years and since last December was unable to leave her bedroom. Her whole life of seventy seven years was spent in this community for she was born on the 1st eastward to that on which her late residence stands, the daughter of the late James and Isabella Bailey, who were amongst the early settlers here. Besides her husband, she leaves to mourn her loss, one son, James of Marmora Township and three daughters, Mrs. Robert Phillips of Marmora, Mrs. John Simmons of Campbellford, and Miss Goldie at home. Also several grandchildren and great grandchildren. She is also survived by two brothers and two sisters—James Bailey of Marmora Township, and Joshua of Marmora, and Mrs. John Bell of Marmora and Mrs. John Lough of Marmora Township. A son, Allan, predeceased her nine years ago, succumbing to an attack of influenza. Deceased was of an industrious and charitable nature and made friends among all classes and creeds. From the earliest years of her married life onwards till her own illness intervened, she was noted for her sympathy and readiness to nurse in cases of extremity. She was a faithful member of the Anglican Church attending Holy Trinity, North Marmora since its erection for which her parents had been largely responsible. She will be greatly missed by a large circle of relatives and friends.

The funeral took place on Tuesday, service being conducted in St. Paul's Church, Marmora, and interment-taking place in Marmora cemetery.

On Thursday, April 15th, one of the oldest and most highly respected residents of Marmora Township passed away in the person of John T. B. Jones. Deceased, who was 76 years of age, was born at Deloro and has lived there all his life. He was the eldest of a family of eleven. Last Fall the late Mr. Jones suffered a paralytic stroke from which he never fully recovered, though the immediate cause of death was heart failure. He was twice married and leaves a widow and two children, Will, of Cobalt, and Mrs. J. Reynolds, of Harold.

Deceased was of a very jovial and sympathetic disposition and his society was enjoyed by the young people as well as those of more mature years. He was honorable and upright in all his dealings and was much esteemed by all who knew him. Although liberal in his views towards all churches he was a staunch Methodist. The funeral took place on Saturday the 17th inst., services being conducted in the Methodist church, Marmora, by Rev. W. B. Secombe, and internment taking place in Marmora cemetery.

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## DEATH OF MRS. ALEX. JONES

After an illness extending over more than a year, Mrs. Alex. Jones passed away at her home in North Marmora on Sunday, August 8th. About a year ago Mrs. Jones underwent an operation in Toronto hospital, and although she was better for a time the relief was only temporary and she has been a constant sufferer ever since, being confined to her bed for several weeks before her death. MRS. ROBERT JONES

After a little over a week's illness of appendicitis Mrs. Robert Jones, a highly esteemed resident of Marmora township passed away on Monday morning. Deceased, whose maiden name was Margaret Jandrew, was born in the township of Rawdon in 1851. She was a public school teacher in Marmora township for a number of years and teaching at that time was very different to what it is now. The school sections were very poor and received but little assistance from the Government, the teacher having to board around from house to house, and sometimes Miss Jandrew had to walk four miles to school and back again at night.

About thirty seven years ago she was united in marriage to Mr. Robert Jones, who with a family of seven children survive her. The names of the children are as follows Mrs. Julius Bedore, Marmora; Robert of Toronto; Cyrus, of Peterboro and Charles, Hugh, Mildred and Francis. She is also survived by two brothers; W. J. Jandrew, principal of the George street school, Ottawa, and Charles, of Frankford, both of whom were present at the funeral. The only living sister Mrs. John Stacey, of North Bay, was unable to be present. Mrs. Jones was operated on by Dr. Holdcroft, of Havelock, but it was found to be too late to be of any avail and the absent members of the family were immediately summoned all being at the bedside when the end came. Deceased was a member of St. Paul's Anglican church, and for many years was a very active worker in the interests of the church.

The funeral took place on Tuesday, service being conducted by Rev. C. M. Harris in the church. It was very largely attended.

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The death occurred last Monday of Mrs. Robert Jones who passed away after a week's illness. Congratulations and good wishes were showered on Mr. John Holsey at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Waddell, Wareham street, Belleville, last Thursday it being the date of his 87th birthday. Mr. Holsey is remarkably active for his age and walked to the hospital during the day without fatigue, and in the evening enjoyed the visits of friends who called to extend best wishes. 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## EDWARD ALBERT JONES

One of the oldest residents of Marmora township passed away Tuesday morning in the person of Edward Albert Jones, at the advanced age of 80 years, 5 months and 14 days, at his home at Lower Williams' Mine. The deceased suffered a paralytic stroke about a year ago, from which he never recovered.

Mr. Jones' father came to Canada from Wales to build the first blast furnace constructed in Marmora, when Blairton iron mine was in operation and this village was known as "The Works." The iron ore was brought here and converted into pig iron and then shipped to the United States. The deceased and his brothers were born in this vicinity.

The late Albert Jones was married to Mary Anne Holbrook, who was born in Norwood. She predeceased him on Jan. 20th, 1889. One daughter, Miss Lily Jones, survives. The deceased is also survived by three brothers, Llewellyn, who has lived with him; Evan, of Edmonton, Alta.; and William, of Apsley. Mr. Jones was highly respected. The early pioneer preachers of the Methodist church found their warmest welcome and most ardent support from the Jones family.

The funeral will be held this afternoon. Service will be conducted in Marmora United church by Rev. C. J. Beckley and interment will take place in Marmora cemetery.

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
