Joseph and Margaret (nee Dema) Kirkey from Marmora Ont. moved into Ethis Community in 1905, bringing five small children at the time. They first settled in Casey Township on the 5th. Con. This farm was later owned and farmed by their son, John, and his family. They lived there until 1916. There was always the problem to all their property being near Moose Creek which would flood every spring. They moved to Harley Township and built a house just below the hill on the 5th. Con. There they raised a family of seven - four boys and three girls.

They were getting nicely settled and had built several other buildings when fire struck in 1922 as to many of their neighbors. One son (Pat) might have lost his life but had the presence of mind to dig himself into a ditch till the fire went over him.

They spent the winter in a neighbor's house as the neighbors had moved to the bush for the winter. In the spring they rebuilt again below the hill.

They kept cattle and a few chickens and grew most of their vegetables and picked berries in season.

Mr. Kirkey and his sons timbered most winters, and one of the daughters would go along to do the cooking. In the spring they would work the "log drive" to help with the family income.

All was not work though. Mr. Kirkey loved a good time and was called on frequently to "call out" for the square dances. His wife and family also loved music and a good time. Three of his sons played the violin, Harry especially played beautifully. The other one played a banjo, and the youngest daughter (Isabel) if there was a piano or an organ she would chord to their music.

One daughter (Margaret) Mrs. Ladoureur is still living and can tell lots of stories about those "good old days".

She recalls one time she and her cousins were picking hazel nuts and she, not being very old at the time, wasn't too sure what a hazel nut looked like, so she was picking what she thought was nuts, but her cousins noticed her hands were getting awfully dirty. They finally discovered that she was picking up "sheep droppings" as some sheep had been pastured there earlier.

Mr. Kirkey passed away in 1941. Harry, one of the four sons, his mother and his sister Mary remained on the farm until 1953. From there they moved to North Cobalt.

Mrs. Kirkey passed away in 1960 and Mary and Harry in the '70's.

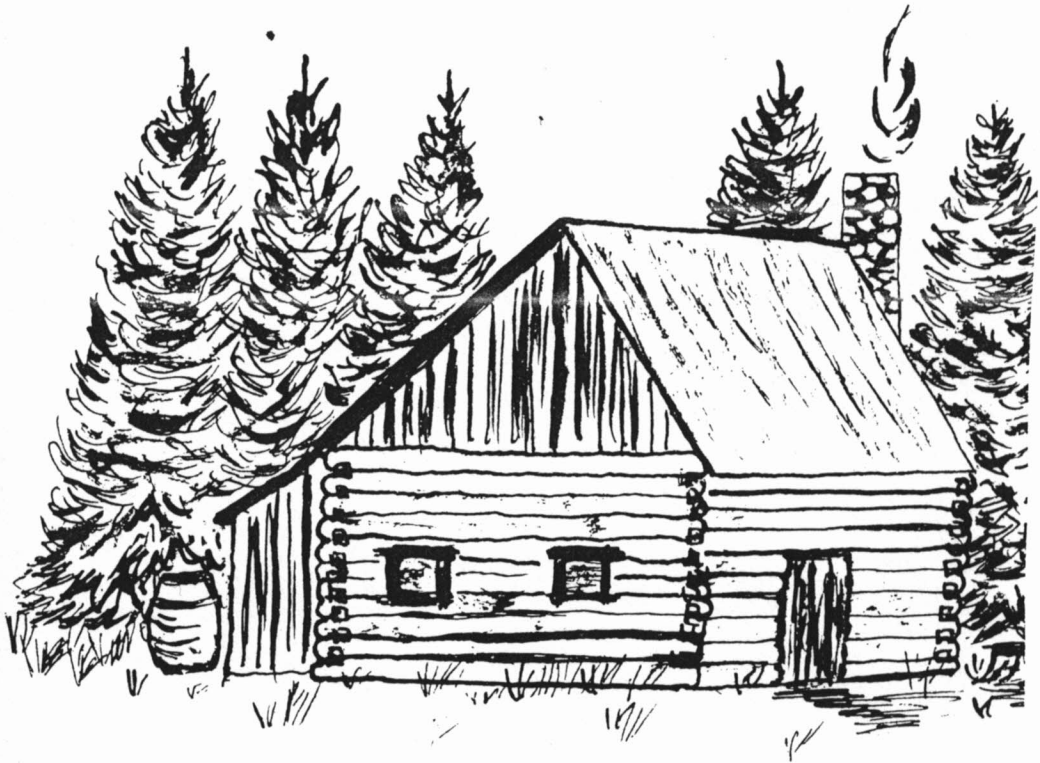

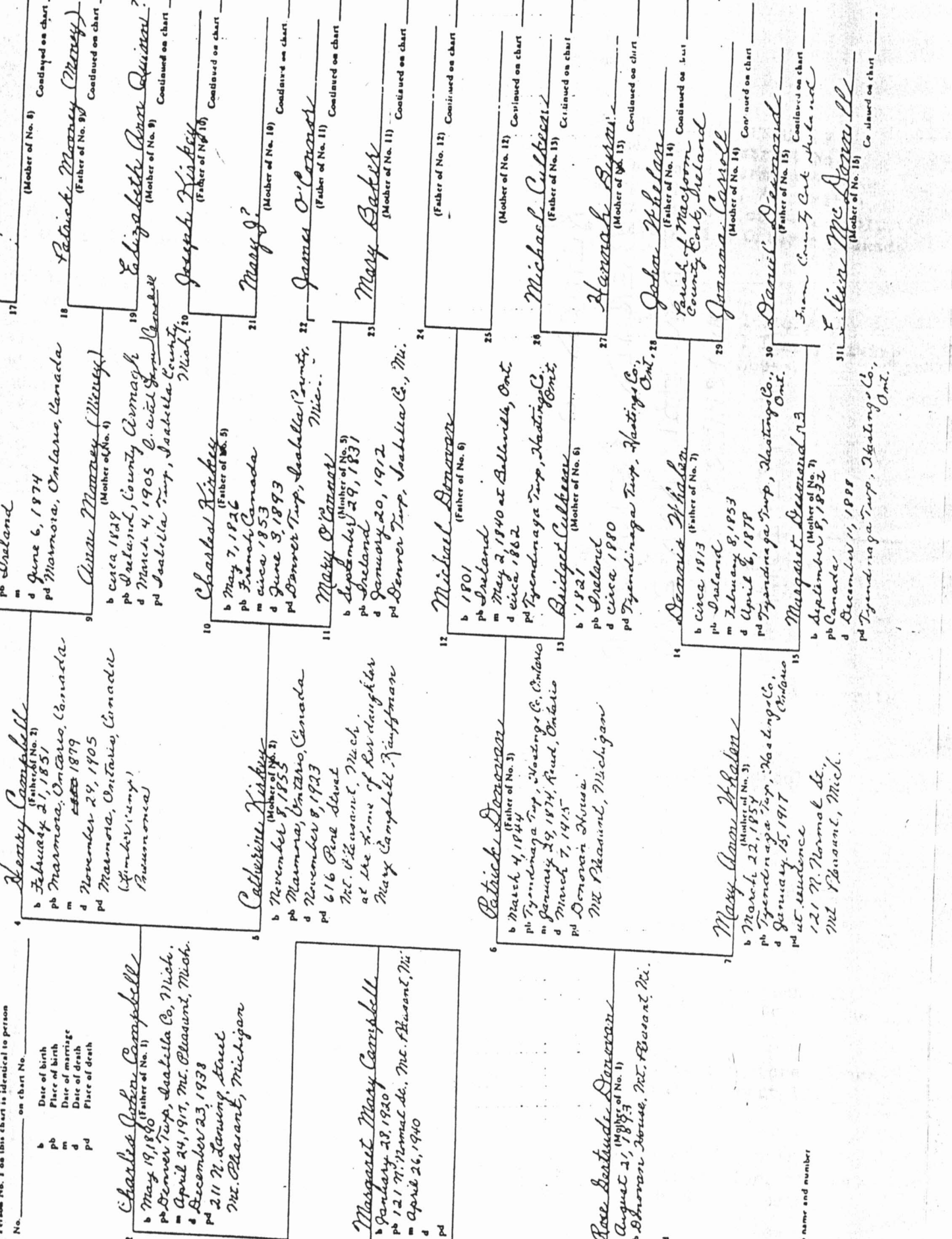

Most dwellings were one story log houses. I noted two frame and one stone houses There was a Roman Catholic Church built of stone 26' x 36' seating about 120 persons with a value of \$450.

There were eight schoolhouses in Marmora Township about the size of a present day two car garage ranging in value from \$50 to \$240; wood construction. There was one schoolhouse made of stone 26' x 32' value \$400. There were no school houses in Lake Township.

There were eight schoolhouses in Marmora Township about the size of a present day two car garage ranging in value from \$50 to \$240; wood construction. There was one schoolhouse made of stone 26' x 32' value \$400. There were no school houses in Lake Township.

Pte. William Kirkey, who recently returned from overseas, is spending a leave at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Kirkey.

Sapper William H. Kirkey, who continued his regular duties for a month before he learned that one arm had been quite seriously affected by enemy action, and who expects that his Scottish-born wife and their infant daughter will be joining him shortly in Canada, returned to his home here last Saturday on the usual 30 days' leave, at the end of which he is to report at hospital in Toronto for further treatment.

The young soldier, who served overseas with the Royal Canadian Engineers, told The Speaker this week that he was wounded at Caen in July last, but that it was late in August before it was discovered that fragments from a mortar bomb had done some damage to the upper part of his right arm, causing injury that put him in hospital for several months. He also was hit behind the right ear, but the arm was the more serious wound.

Sapper Kirkey, whose father, John Kirkey, also was overseas with the Canadian Forestry Corps in Scotland for a time, and who is still on duty in Canada, married the former Catherine McErlane of Glasgow, and they have a daughter, Catherine Anne Kirkey, now four and a half months old. The soldier said he had hopes that Mrs. Kirkey and the little girl would be able to leave for Canada at no distant date.

Part of his hospital treatment, which continued up to the middle of February, was taken in a castle on a private estate at the foot of the Campsie Hills, some twenty miles from Glasgow and not far from Loch Lomond, Sapper Kirkey said. He told The Speaker that the past winter had been exceptionally severe in Scotland, with two feet of snow falling in Glasgow to create a problem for the civic authorities with regard to its disposal, since the ordinary sewers could not carry it away.

Sapper Kirkey went overseas in September of 1941, and he was among arriving Canadian troops who were bombed soon after the ship reached the other side of the Atlantic. While there were some thrills on the trip over at that time, the most excitement, he said, was caused when a whale was sighted on one occasion, the huge mammal at first being mistaken for a submarine seeking out shipping to de-

Veteran And Wife Lose Home, Goods In Blaze

William Kirkey is Heavy Loser in Monday's Blaze

William Kirkey, a veteran of the last war and his Scottish bride lost most of their household effects when fire damaged the Whitewood Avenue residence, formerly owned by Mrs. M. E. Norris, on Monday afternoon. Again, as in the case of the recent fire at the Lever residence, the flames had secured a strong foothold before being noticed and when the brigade arrived the smoke was rolling from the building in dense clouds.

According to Fire Chief R. B. Grills, the blaze appeared to have started from hot ashes placed in a wooden container just outside the back door and against the wall. The wood shed and kitchen suffered the most damage although most of the siding on the south side of the house will have to be replaced. The blaze worked its way through the walls and into the attic. At least four groups of individuals, comprising twelve persons, made their home in the building and except for Mr. and Mrs. Kirkey and Miss Steele, the remainder suffered no appreciable damage except from smoke.

The fire department made one of the fastest runs on record to the scene of the blaze. Two lines of hose were laid and used while a third line was also put down, but within a comparatively few minutes the blaze was brought under control and water damage was kept to a minimum. The fire burned through the window frames at the east end of the house and worked its way into the attic before being extinguished.

Those occupying the house were Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Kirkey and their infant son. They lost most of their household effects including a new radio, Mr. Kirkey's new winter overcoat and a new fur coat of Mrs. Kirkey's which had just recently been purchased. Other occupants were the Misses Betty, Cora, and Shirley Johnston, Misses Lyda, Tilly and Ruth Batty, Miss Jean McGann and Miss Fay Steele.

FIVE KIRKEYS IN SERVICES FOR PRESENT WAR

One of Harley Township's oldest residents, William Joseph Kirkey passed away early Thursday morning, February 13, 1941, after an illness extending over a period of three years, but only three weeks of which were spent in bed. On September 21, 1937, he suffered a stroke, the effects from which he never recovered, and while he was able to walk around slowly, he never regained his speech.

The late Mr. Kirkey, who was of a very cheery disposition and will be greatly missed by his family and a large circle of friends and acquaintances, was born near Sunderland, Brock Township, Ontario, on May 18, 1859, a son of the late Wm. Kirkey and Elizabeth Burton. He married the former Margaret Louise Demas on January 7, 1890, in Toronto, and the couple celebrated their 51st wedding anniversary this year, but owing to his increasing ill health, the day was spent very quietly.

Mr. Kirkey spent most of his life in various places in Old Ontario up until April, 1905, when he came to Northern Ontario and was followed by Mrs. Kirkey and family in October of the same year; since then they have continued to reside here. He has been a farmer most of his long life. He is survived by his wife and four sons, Michael of Casey Township, John, who is with the Forestry Corps now stationed at Quebec City and who was unable to attend his father's funeral; Harry at home, and Patrick of Harley Township, three daughters, Margaret (Mrs. Ovide Ladouceur) of Harley Township, Miss Mary at home and Isabella (Mrs. Raoul Campeau) of Haileybury. There are also nineteen grandchildren, a half-brother, Louis Kirkey of Goderich, Ont., and a half-sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Hefferman of Wyantskill, N.Y. His parents, three brothers, two sisters and his first-born infant son, all predeceased him many years ago.

The funeral was held at 10 o'clock on Saturday morning at Belle Vallee Roman Catholic Church. High Requiem Mass was said by the pastor, Rev. Father J. A. Genier, with interment in Belle Vallee Cemetery. The pallbearers were Adrien Marcoux, Michael Kirkey, Raoul Campeau, Albert Jackson, Patrick Kirkey and William Kirkey. Owing to the very bad condition of the roads many were unable to attend. There were many spiritual offerings.

Further History of Early Resident

The publication of an obituary notice in the columns of The Herald a few weeks ago occasioned some inquiry as to what connection the deceased lady, the late Mrs. (Dr.) Anderson, of Belleville, had with Marmora, it being stated that her maiden name was Campbell and that she was born in Marmora 83 years ago. Communication established with her sole surviving brother, Mr. Alfred Campbell, of 58 Catharine St., Belleville, has brought out some interesting facts.

In the year 1825 four employees at the Iron works here were Campbell and Dyer, firemen, John Jones, founder and a Mr. Seagriff, ballast moulder. Mr. Alfred Campbell happens to be the son of the late William Henry Campbell, the fireman referred to. He was most willing to give The Herald the following particulars concerning the history of his family.

His father came direct to Marmora from Wales, having lived at Merthyr, Tydvil, in that country if not born there. He was sent out by the Government to be employed at the Works. He was twice married while a resident at Marmora. His first wife was a member of the Jones family which also emigrated here from Wales. As far as can be gathered by implication, she was the daughter of John Jones, the founder, whose gravestone in Marmora Protestant Cemetery reads "John Jones, died March 10th, 1862, aged 90 years, native of South Wales. Mr. Campbell is not able, by reason of physical infirmity, to recall any children of this marriage.

His mother, before marriage, was Ann Elizabeth Horne. She was born in Quebec and her father, who was a ship-buider later moved to Kingston. He was given a grant of land in Marmora township by the Government, which at his death became the property of his daughter. Mr. Campbell states that his mother often told him how the Indians advised her not to part with it since it was valuable. However, as her husband was deciding to go into the hotel business, she was finally persuaded to sell the property to Philip Brenton. The latter soon after discovered gold upon it and disposed of it for a favourable sum of money.

While resident in Marmora, three children were born to the Campbells, one of whom was the late Mrs. (Dr.) Anderson. An older sister to Mrs. Anderson was a lady of great talent. Mr. Campbell has a wonderful specimen of sample work, (needle point) which was executed by her when she was in Marmora. The work is framed and at first glance only appears to be a reproduction of the Lord's Prayer. Beneath the Prayer however is the following verse and statement:

Pour out on me Thy grace, O God,
Around me danger lies;
O guard me till in Thine abode
I banquet in the skies.
Adelaide M. Campbell,
Aged 12 years, 1849.

Whether this verse was one of her own composition or the line of an old hymn, Mr. Campbell does not know.

The other member of the Campbell family to be born in Marmora was the late William Henry Campbell, who for years was Chief of the Fire Brigade of Belleville. The three Campbell children to be born in Marmora all received the sacrament of baptism at the hands of the late Rev. Grier, of St. Thomas Church, Belleville, who made occasional visits to Marmora in those days.

The Campbells took farewell of Marmora when the father moved to Madoc to manage an hotel there. It was at Madoc that Alfred Campbell was born, but when he was a year old his father moved to Belleville to take over the Western house, which later became known as the Windsor Hotel, and was demolished a few years ago to make room for a service station near the lower bridge in that city.

Before Adelaide Campbell became Mrs. James Forsythe she had a varied experience as a school teacher, teaching among the colored folk in both North and South Carolina, as well as later conducting a private school on Pinnacle Street, Belleville. Mr. Campbell has a tintype photo of his father which he took himself a few years before his father's death.

The funeral was held at her late residence at 2 p. m. on Wednesday with Rev. L. Harding, of Stirling, officiating. Interment took place in Mt. Nebo Cemetery, Springbrook. The four sons-in-law, Samuel Kirkey, Irvine Eggleton, Orville Trumble and Bruce Wright were pallbearers.
