

## MARY JANE (FAUL) LOVELESS

Mary Jane Faul, daughter of James and Susan Faul, was born Feb. 6, 1860. She was married July 31, 1875 in Murray Tp to Reuben Loveless, a farmer. Born Jan. 24, 1848, Reuben was the son of James W. and Polly (Cronk) Loveless. He and Mary Jane lived in Murray Tp, Ont. and had two children. Mary Jane died Apr. 11, 1881 in Murray Tp (consumption) and was buried at Stockdale Cemetery. Reuben remarried to Adeline Irish, born in 1853. They lived in Brighton Tp (Lot 6 Concession 1) and had three children: Lilla "Beatrice" 1883 (married an Adams), Ross 1886, and Arthur Bruce 1891 (died young). Reuben died Jan. 26, 1906 in Brighton Tp.

### 1. James "Roy" Loveless - Sept. 10, 1878

Married Aug. 10, 1899 in Trenton, Ont. to Mary "Luella" Maybee (1878-1911), daughter of William and Margaret (Jones) Maybee. Luella's brother, Nelson, married Roy's cousin, Gertrude Faul. # Floyd and Rita Loveless mark 28th business year

Like the familiar Dominion Stores commercial on Television "Its mainly because of the meat" that a good many Marmora people believe in buying their weekly supply of meat and groceries from the L.G.M. store owned by Floyd and Rita Loveless.

This month will see the completion of 28 years in business, a record that qualifies Floyd (better known as Bud) and Rita as one of the longest established storekeepers in Marmora.

Mr. and Mrs. Loveless had no experience in running a grocery store when they purchased the business from T.J. Burns on April 15, 1946 at the suggestion of Mrs. Loveless' father, the late Fred Johnston. At the time Mr. Loveless was working at the Canadian General Electric Company in Peterborough immediately following his discharge from the airforce in December of 1945.

Five years in the R.C.A. F., Bud had three years overseas service as a Spitfire pilot with No. 39 Reconnaissance Wing. He had 160 hours operation time when his plane was shot down over Germany and he bailed out. Taken prisoner, he spent the next five months in a prison camp at Pinneburg, near Hamburg. The end of the war brought his release from there and he came home to Marmora.

One of the things Mr. Loveless is most proud of now is his ability to cut meat to perfection. He believes in buying only Grade A Red Brand so his customers always get the best. He holds little hope that prices will ~~no~~ go on rising and has noticed an increasing number of shortages in their shipments from the supplier.

Besides themselves, the Loveless' employ three other people, Joan Nash, Blanche Dostank and Frank Napadek with extra staff added during the busy tourist season.

Reminiscing, Bud said that 25 years ago when Marmora was more of a farming community than it is now, the stores were open Tuesday, Friday and Saturday nights, as well as every day except Wednesday when they closed for half a day. The farmers came to town after doing chores, sometimes arriving at nine o'clock or later with eggs or butter to exchange for groceries. Sometimes it was 1 o'clock Sunday morning before Bud got home to bed.

Marmora is one of the best towns in this part of the county, Mr. Loveless, believes, but he is concerned about its future when the Marmoraton Mine closes and the wages earned by local employees no longer coming in. He thinks it is "ridiculous" for anyone to say that Marmora won't miss the Mine.

Bud has taken a very active part in local government through the years. He served as trustee for eight years on the public school board before the Hasting County Board of Education came into effect. For the past four years he has been a member of Marmora Hydro Commission, the others being Bob Maynes, and Reeve Jack Reynolds. He is also a member of the Marmora Businessmen's Association.

Born and raised in Marmora, Rita Johnston and Flying Officer Loveless were married in Peterborough while he was stationed in Winnipeg during the war. Apart from time off when their three children were born. Rita has been just as much a part of the business as her husband all through those 28 years.

Working full time and keeping house hasn't left Rita with many idle moments. She finds it easier to do her housework early in the morning before leaving for the store. Their youngest daughter, Jeanna, is the only one at home now, son Jim being married to Shirley McClary and working for the Ontario Government in the Assessment Division at Ottawa. Their other daughter, Mary is married to Ken Bonter and they live in Marmora with their two children.

# Marmora Man Receives 60 year Jewel From Masons

Harry Loveless of Marmora has become the first member of the Marmora Masonic Lodge to receive his 60 year past master's pin.

The honor was given to him by V. Wor. Ray Gonsolus of Belleville and pinned on him by his son Floyd, also a Wor. Bro. of the Marmora Lodge.

Mr. Loveless was pleased with the award, not just for himself but for the lodge. "I'm the first member of the lodge to receive this award and I'll probably be the last. It's something for the lodge."

Mrs. Loveless said that Mr. Gonsolus was especially pleased at being able to confer the award on Mr. Loveless. "He came to visit me in the hospital (Mrs. Loveless is now recovering well at home)

and told me how tickled he was to be able to give Harry the award."

Mr. Loveless was born in Saginaw, Michigan, but returned to Hastings County when very young when his parents returned here from the U.S. He has lived all his life in the area, working for Deloro Smelting for some 35 years. He now resides on Madoc St. in Marmora.

Mr. Loveless has been "a hard working"

member of the Masonic Lodge during most of his membership and served for 27 years as chaplain of that organisation. He joined the lodge in 1916 and attained the Master's chair in 1921. He has actually been a past master for 62 years but the lodge doesn't have an award for odd years.

Lodge member Bill McKenzie indicated that it was a rare award, hardly ever given.

An enthusiast for the glories of Britain is Flying Officer Floyd (Bud) Loveless, who arrived back at his Deloro home recently. He was a passenger on the Stratheden, which made a delightful, if uneventful voyage, from Liverpool to be the first troop ship to dock in Quebec since 1919 and Bud tells us it was some ovation they were accorded.

We can most of us remember that this young airman's enlistment was held back some months through an injury received in a car accident, but undaunted he enlisted in January, 1942. Following training in Canada and in England, he eventually became attached to 39 Reece Fighter Wing in Holland. From Holland his Wing operated over German territory. Later it moved to a strip of land on the border line between Holland and Belgium. When the Canadian troops crossed the Rhine the Wing operated as cover. The next move was to Rheinie, Germany, about eighty

and ultimately it was stationed at Walsdorf, about four miles from Hanover. Bud tells us that Walsdorf was a pretty place.

He had two misfortunes across the English Channel while ducking from some German strafing. In Germany he was to taste of the unpleasant experience of being shot down and later of being captured. While flying a Spitfire on April 24th of this year, about five miles south of Lubeck, his plane hit with flak took fire and Bud was forced to bail out. He had to avoid dropping into a lake and alighted uninjured on its shore. Evading capture for two hours he was finally picked up by two of the S. S. troops. Placed between them, in a practically standing position on their motorcycle, he was given a somewhat uncomfortable ride into Hamburg, where he was placed on a train for the short journey to Pinneburg, where he underwent interrogation at the Stalaz Interrogation camp there.

This proved to be his only place of detention as fourteen days later the victorious invading army reached the place to effect the release of the flier and fellow prisoners. Bud says he met no local men at this camp. Some were from Ottawa and others from Toronto. The only form of recreation allowed them was walking.

Bud was flown back from Brussels to Bournemouth and he was delighted to return to the charming seaside resort where he had commenced his duties in England.

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## Deloro's First Municipal Election

Paquet who came next are members of last year's council, while F. Wiley, lowest man of those elected, was voted into his first year of office. Of the defeated candidates W. Mumby served eight years as councillor, but F. Everard was an aspirant to office for the first time. H. A. McNally of last year's council did not qualify as a candidate at the recent nomination meeting, since recently he became a resident of Marmora.

Reeve C. H. Buskard will head the council, having been given acclamation at the nomination meeting.
