Mine prompted Lynch to buy

The Marmora Herald hopes in the months ahead to feature articles on various businesses in Marmora and introduce the people behind them.

Today we would like our readers to meet Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Lynch of Lynch's Frosted Foods, although they probably need no introduction since they opened for business at the corner of McGill and Madoc Streets on May 23, 1950.

On the basis of the good news in 1949 that Bethlehem Steel Company was going to begin open pit mining operations in Marmora Township, Mr. and Mrs. Lynch decided to purchase the vacant store of C. W. Gladney and open a locker storage and service unit with a retail food store. A four month period of renovations preceded the opening.

With the Lynch's, there was and always will be something for everyone of the family to do. Besides Mr. and Mrs. Lynch, Morris works on a full time basis with the assistance, on a part time basis, of Keith Douglas, daughter Anna Cosgrove, and Morris' wife Bernadette.

When the store opened their two older children, Carl and Patricia were almost grown up but as each one of their five younger children grew big enough they were expected to help out in the store. Mr. Lynch is a firm believer in keeping children busy so they don't have time to get into mischief.

For the past 42½ years Mr. Lynch has been employed as a chemist first by the Deloro Smelting and Refining Company, then its subsidiary Deloro Stellite Company of Belleville. He retired last December but the company has recalled him and he is once again working about three days a week for the time being. Weekends and days off he is to be seen wearing a white apron and serving customers at the store.

One of the prettiest flower gardens in Marmora every year belongs to Mr. Lynch. Using a variety of flowers he lays out a different arrangement each time so that the plot behind the store is a picture from spring right through to fall.

Besides leading a busy home life with seven children, Mrs. Lynch has managed to devote many hours each week to work at the store. Their children have chosen various careers. Carl, the eldest, graduated from Queen's University as a metallurgist, Patricia, the second oldest, now Mrs. Barry Olson of Vancouver, trained as a nurse, Keith is employed at Marmoraton Mining Company and Douglas is a chemist for International Minerals at Nepton, as well as reeve of Deloro Village. Another daughter, Anna Cosgrove became a teacher and is still doing part time duty. Vincent, the youngest son, is a mechanical engineer, employed by Ontario Hydro at Nanticoke, near Port Dover.

The Lynch family motto has always been to serve the public in an honest, courteous, welcoming and obliging manner to the best of their ability.

In the days when the ore was worth something...

Twenty-seven years ago and we were on the other end of the stick...Marmora was in the news, even to the extent of a photo spread in the Toronto Daily Star, under the headline "\$1000,000,000 Iron Ore Boom Stirs Ontario Village". The feature included the picture of the then reeve of Marmora, Vincent Lynch, shown here and the following article:

Marmora, Aug. 16 - This village, population 1,100, is enjoying a boom which is so quiet and leisurely some people doubt if it's a boom at all.

You can't find a place to park, four new buildings have gone up in one block and there is a hustle and stir on Main Street which has old-timers agog.

Best of all, unemployment is a word that doesn't exist.

This happy state is likely to grow even happier, now that Bethlehem Steel Corp., second largest company of its kind in the world, has landed on a rural centre with banners flying. In one short year it has turned loose unlimited capital on a mining enterprise which could put Marmora on the map.

"We're here to stay," declared Harold Olsen, the general superintendent. "The iron ore is down below and when we get to it, everyone should benefit."

Two miles south, \$1,000,000 worth of fancy machinery is turning mother earth upside down in an effort to bare \$100,000,000 worth of magnetite.

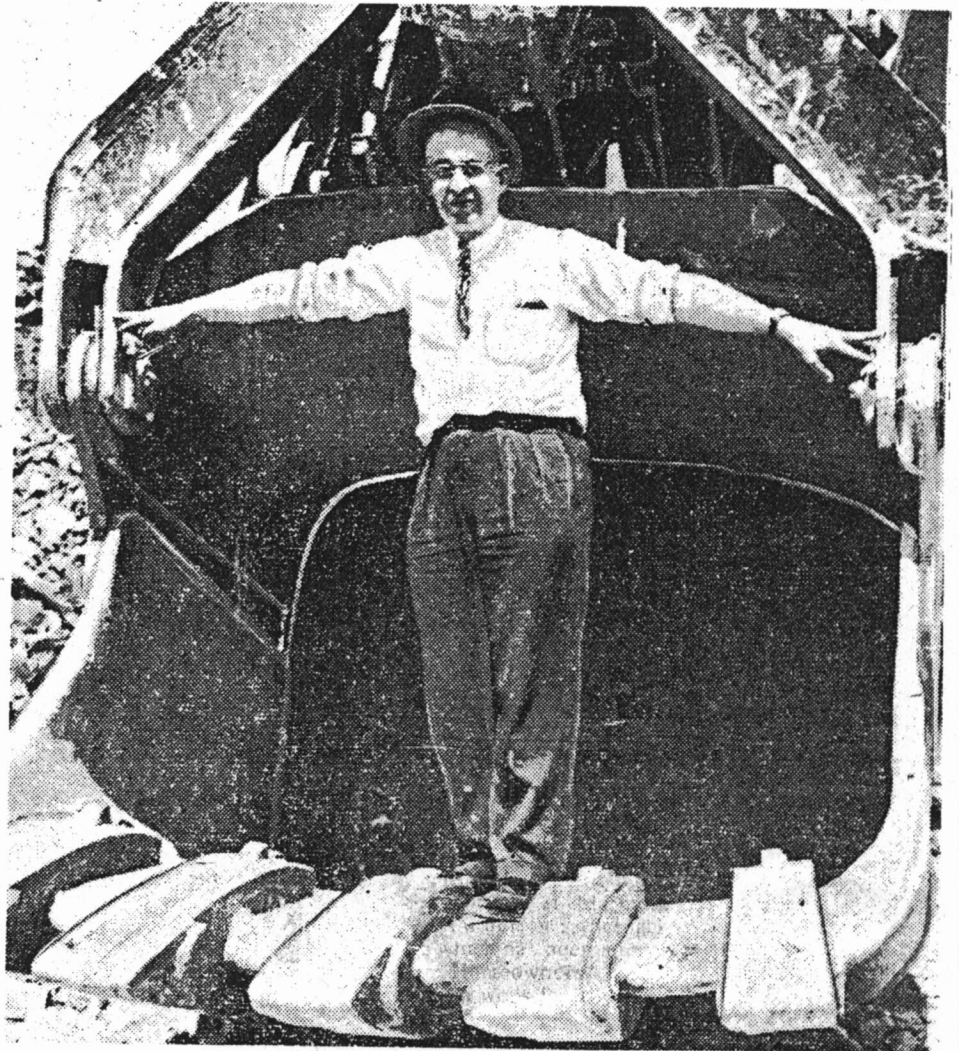
Depend on Wells

However one small cloud has appeared on the horizon at Marmora itself. This concerns water, or rather lack of municipal water, which has been a touchy subject for years. Homeowners and businessmen depend on wells for aqua pura and, while this arrangement has worked satisfactorily, the lack of a municipal waterworks will hinder any expansion in the village.

"We anticipate workers coming to Marmora from outside centres and we can't provide accommodation," explained Reeve Vincent Lynch. "Because we depend on wells, no housing development is possible."

Bethlehem Steel, however, has paved the way for all eventualities. It has purchased a 70-acre plot across the Crowe River where eight homes for company executives are now being built. If the need arises, 200 homes could be built on this land for workers.

"The company has been absolutely fair," said C.R. Young, a real estate dealer. "It has offered to install sewerage and water for any homes it builds and it will turn over this system to the village when the village gets a system of its own."



Debate Expenditure in Fall

Reeve Lynch said his council will debate the \$400,000 waterworks expenditure this fall.

On Aug. 1, 1950, first clearing started at the mine site where terrific noise and clouds of dust now fill the sky. Before that, excitement began when an Ontario government aerial survey showed heavy concentration of iron ore beneath a farmer's field.

Four farms were bought up by Bethlehem and now limestone is being gouged out at the rate of 30,000 tons a day. Even at this prodigious clip, two years will pass--and \$10,000,000 to \$15,000,000 will

be spent--before a single frying pan comes out of the open pit.

Bethlehem engineers figure there is enough magnetite, 100 to 150 feet below the surface, to supply 500,000 tons of the previous metal for 25 to 30 years.

When finished, the pit will measure a mile by a half mile and 20,000,000 tons of earth will have been removed--enough to fill a good-sized lake.

It's interesting to think that 27 years ago all that work was going into removing rock, whereas now, with the ore almost pure, it just sits in the ground. Human beings are difficult to understand.

Mike Lynch recounts how his grandfather Vincent used the snowbanks outside the door to store small trays of ice in the early 1950's, after he had just opened Marmora Frosted Foods.

"The trays were filled using a pail and a dipper, and the ice was knocked out by hand," Mike explains.

Now, Prince Edward Ice at 1 McGill St. has the capacity to pump out 3000 bags of high-quality tube ice manufactured with the latest technology, in one day.

"We've come a long way, no doubt about that," says Mike, who runs the business along with his dad Morris and mother Bernadette.

A long way indeed, and in a short time. In 1986, the year the Lynchs went full-gear into the ice-business, Prince Edward Ice had a respectable 26 accounts, Mike explained, on the first day of an open house at the ice-house, held on June 19, 20 and 23.

"We switched to the ice-making because we knew there was a market for another business in this part of Ontario," he said.

The Lynch's business sense was right on because the company's clientele has mushroomed to 300 accounts and the operation employs 11 workers and runs 24 hours a day during the summer to meet the demand.

This pressure on the Lynch's two five-ton ice-making machines ("Vodt" wet-ice machines, after the St. Louis inventor, which they bought in 1987) has the family thinking

expansion, Mike says.

"Oh yeah, definitely, maybe as soon as next year," Mike says. "Right now, we sometimes have to buy a tractor-trailer load of ice from another contractor to meet the demand. There's room upstairs for at least two more Vodt machines."

Warm ice

With the Vodt system, cooled water from a tower outside is sucked into the machine through hoses, and while the ice is being formed, a system of warming rods control the temperature so the individual pieces do not stick together.

The result is a perfectly formed, tube-shaped piece of ice, about an inch thick and an inch and a half wide. The ice is then carried by conveyor belt to another room where it's bagged, and the bags are placed on another belt which lead into the ice house. The ice is either taken off the belt and stored in the ice house or left on the belt to make its way outside the building where it's loaded onto one of the Lynch's three trucks for distribution.

This ice-making and conveyor system represents a \$50,000 investment by the Lynchs and they also had to put down another \$225,000 to buy approximately 100 freezers distributed to the businesses which buy the ice.

"That's why there aren't that many of these operations around, it takes a huge initial capital investment, considering it's a seasonal business," he explains.

The Lynchs have two other main competitors in their south-eastern Ontario market area, which extends westwards to Lindsay, east to Gananoque, south to Port Hope, and north to Algonquin Park.

Their customers are mainly variety stores, supermarkets and restaurants, which have a high demand for ice in the summertime, especially in the hot and humid weather we've been experiencing lately.

"We do 75 per cent of our business in nine weeks, from the middle of June to September," Mike says. "And the hotter, the better. We like this kind of weather!"

Community unaware

Even though the business is thriving, Mike acknowledges that the community in which his grandfather started his modest business almost fifty years ago is generally unaware of what goes on at Prince Edward Ice.

"Most people in Marmora have no idea," he said. "Many think we're still using trays!"

This is one reason behind the open house held last week, during which Mike and the other workers explained the system to curious visitors.

Another reason was simply that of celebration, Mike added.

"We're pretty pleased with our success," he said. "We've worked hard to get where we're at."

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REEVE LYNCH TO RETIRE

After six years as a member of Marmora Village Council and five years as reeve of the Village, Vincent M. Lynch has decided to retire. During his years as reeve he has given Marmora exceptional service. It has been a period which has seen the most rapid expansion in the history of the municipality and has meant new problems for the council.

The erection of the new High School in Marmora has been a source of satisfaction to all citizens. While the erection of the school was under the direction and control of Centre Hastings District High School Board the original financing and sale of debentures was up to Marmora Council. Through the efforts of the reeve and clerk a record price was received for the debentures at a lower rate of interest than had to be paid on the debentures for the additions to Madoc and Tweed High Schools.

As presiding officer at council meetings, as a member of Hastings County Council, and in many other duties that come with the office of reeve. Mr. Lynch has shown marked ability and he has made himself familiar with the financial side of every phase of municipal business. His unflinching courtesy and consideration for others has won him the esteem and good will of all his associates. Among the accomplishments of the council during his term of office was the new and very favourable terms received from the Post Office Department, Ottawa, for the lease of the post office premises in Marmora, the erection of the new fire hall, the purchase of fine modern fire fighting equipment, the renovation of the town hall, in which the council was assisted by the Women's Institute, and various other local improvements.

Citizens as a whole would have been delighted to see Mr. Lynch continue as reeve, but few have any idea of the time and duties involved. Take last year for instance about 20 long meetings of the council, committee meetings, of which the reeve is a member by virtue of his office, four sessions of county council, lasting three or four days at each time, the arena commission, etc. In addition there are many interviews with representatives of business firms, which are anxious to do business with the council, and day after day citizens came to him in regard to some matter they thought the council should deal with.

On the other hand Mr. Lynch's own business has been rapidly expanding and is requiring more and more of his time. His cold storage and locker business has doubled in the past year and still there are more applications for lockers.

There is every reason to believe 1953 will be the best business year in the history of Marmora and with the new homes being erected and new citizens moving in there will doubtless be numerous additional applications for lockers in the coming year and that will bring the problem of more room for the lockers. The cutting of car-cases and wrapping of parcels for the lockers means a lot of work and one can easily understand Reeve Lynch's decision that for a time his own business must have first consideration.
