## **OBITUARY**

FRANK N. MARETT

One of Marmora's most prominent citizens for over twenty five years passed away early Tuesday morning in the person of Frank Newton Marett. For the past few years he had not been in the best of health and his own extensive business affairs, together with his responsibilities as head of the municipality, proved a severe strain. Last summer his condition became serious and in the fall he went to Toronto for hospital and special medical treatment. While there was a temporary improvement in his health and he returned to Marmora it was realized there was little hope of complete recovery.

The late F. N. Marett, who was in his 59th year, was born and spent his boyhood days in Millbrook. Then as a young man he came to Marmora. entering the store of Mr. J. W. Pearce as clerk. From the start he showed a special aptitude for the mercantile business and his record was one of continual progress until the depression became serious about five years ago. His ability and his popularity was such that when Mr. Pearce was elected to the Legislature be took the deceased into partnership with him. A few years later, when Mr. Pearce was appointed Bursar for the Ontario School for the Deaf at Belleville, the tirm of F. N. Marett & Co. was formed and took over Mr. Pearce's interests. The members of the firm were F. N. Marett. W. C. Inkster and F. R. Wells. A few vears later Mr Marett purchased Mr. Inkster's interest in the firm and the business was carried on by Mr. Marett and Mr. Wells. A couple of years ago Donald Marett, son of the deceased. became a member of the firm.

For some years the firm of F. N. Marett & Co. continued in the former Pearce Store on the west side of Forsythe street, opposite the present store The business continued to grow and about twenty years ago Mr. Marett purchased the present store from Mr. B. C. Hubbell. The firm then added furniture, undertaking and other lines with marked success. Amongst Commercial Travellers Mr. Marett had the reputation of being an exceptionally shrewd buyer and much of his success was due to his ability to anticipate public demand and to get greatest value obtainable.

On the other hand his reputation for selling honest goods at a fair price, his attention to customers and the general manner of conducting the business constantly attracted new customers and made new friends.

The late F. N. Marett was always beenly interested in affairs pertaining to the village and gave long service as a member of the Council or Reeve. He first entered the Council about 1910 and with the exception of a few years was a member until 1930, when he was elected Reeve. He held that office until a few months ago when ill health forced him to retire and Mr. D E. Bell was appointed acting Reeve. In municipal affairs he showed the same sound judgment as in his own business and his services were highly esteemed.

Mr. Marett was also a director of Marmora Agricultural Society for many years and took part in or assisted financially nearly every organization for the welfare of the village. He was a Liberal in politics, though he took little active part in elections. He was a valued supporter and adherent of the Wethodist Church now the United Church. He had also been a member of Marmora Lodge A. F. & A. M. No. 222 for about 30 years.

In August, 1908, the late F. N. Marett was married to Jane A. Pearce, younger daughter of Mr. J. W. Pearce now of Belleville, who survives him. To them were born three sons and one daughter—Donald, at home; Douglas, of Queen's University, Kingston; Dorothy, who is attending Ontario College of Education, Toronto, and James at home. He is also survived by three sisters, Mrs. J. Chambers, and Misses Lillian and Ethel, all of Toronto, and two brothers, Albert, Vancouver, and Fred, now residing in Texas.

While he never cared much for social events the late F. N. Marett took a keen interest in sports, before his health began to fail, and was very widely known and highly esteemed. Those who came to know him intimately in these years remember him as a man whose first interest was his family, generous and kindly and very fond of children. Anyone in trouble found him ready to help and few had any idea how much he gave to those in need.

## F.N. MARETT & COMPANY

As Marmora prepares to celebrate the 175th anniversary of its founding, one company should be recognized for its part in Marmora's history.

Marmora has the proud distinction of having one of the few 125 year old general stores still in existence in Canada. We can be prouder still that the business represents the work of four generations of one family - the Pearce's and Marett's.

The company was started originally in 1871 by Josiah William Pearce (1850 -1938) as part of the retail portion of the Pearce Lumber Company which operated in Marmora for many years.

The store was first located in what is now the Coachlight Restaurant on the west side of Forsyth Street and carried on business there until 1916 when the B.C. Hubbell building across the street was purchased.

WEarly in the 1900's, J.W. Pearce hired a young man named Frank Newton Marett to work in his store. Born in Millbrook, southwest of Peterborough, Frank Marett had arrived in Marmora with a pack on his back and looking for work.

The young man worked hard for his employer and his value was recognized when Mr. Pearce offered him a partnership in the business in 1907. Mr. Marett was made manager of the store while Mr. Pearce went off to fulfill his duties as the newly elected member of the Ontario Legislature. 1941

When his term in office was completed, Mr. Pearce accepted a position as burser at the Ontario School for the Deaf (as it was known then) in Belleville. Due to his involvement in politics and the school, he never rejoined the the firm and subsequently sold his shares to his son-in-law. Mr. Marett had by then married Mr. Pearce's youngest daughter, Jane Almira, in August 1908. Mr. Pearce died in Belleville

The name of the store was changed to F.N.Marett and Company to reflect the new ownership and that name continues until to-day.

While her husband was serving the needs of residents in Marmora Village, Marmora Township and Deloro Village, Jane Marett was busy raising three sons, Donald, Douglas and James and daughter Dorothy, while at the same time managing their home at 18 McGill Street and playing a large pale in the life of this community.

Inkster. until the early 1950's when they discontinued the partnership. Mr. Donald Marett carried on the business while his wife Alice raised two sons, Frank and William and daughter Anne. Donald died in January 1968, also at the early age of 59. like his father.

Following his father's death, William Donald stepped in to continue the business for his mother until he purchased it in 1971.

This year, 1996, marks the 125 year of continuous business under four generation of the same family - first the Pearce's, then three generations of Maretts.

Over the years, the business has included clothing, footwear, groceries, paint, wallpaper, floor coverings, toys, furniture and yard goods as well as the funeral service that Fred Wells operated for the company.

During the early 1950's Fred Wells opened his own funeral business on Bursthall Street and continued on until he sold the business to Garnet Howden in 1956, then it was resold to the present owner, Jon McConnell, in 1978.

Early in the 1970's, the Marett store discontinued selling paint and wallpaper, floor covering and yard goods and the upstairs was turned into storage area.

In 1990 water sports were added to the inventory as that to-day the business deals in clothing, footwear, water skis, wet suits, kneeboards, kayaks and inflatable water products.

The Marett family have always stock excellent quality products for their customers and they continue to do so to-day.

Will there be a fifth generation of Marett's running the store? Will one of Bill and Pat's sons, Andrew or David, want to take on the responsibility of continuing this long time tradition? REFERENCE Only time will tell.
