### Obituary

#### PATRICK MARRIN

Death came very suddenly to Mr. Patrick Marrin last Sunday night. He was in his usual good health all day and had a number of callers during the evening. After they had retired Mrs. Marrin went down stairs to remove some plants from a window, and when she returned Mr. Marrin spoke to her and afterwards passed away almost instantly.

Deceased was born in 1846 on a farm in Madoc township, about two miles east of Madoc, which his father had cleared out of the virgin forest. He spent all his life on the same farm until about fifteen years ago when he moved to Marmora. In 1872 Mr. Marrin was married to Elizabeth Mulroney, of Stocco, who survives him. They had six children of which four survived infancy. They are Mrs. T. P. Hogan of Windsor, J. P. of Marmora, Mrs. Geo. Walsh, on the homestead in Madoc township, and Thos. D. of Windsor.

The late Patrick Marrin was a valued member of the Roman Catholic Church and a life-long Liberal. Upright and honorable in all his dealings, with a kindly manner and a keen sense of humour, he won the esteem of all who knew him and made many close friends. While he was quiet and unassuming he took a keen interest in public affairs.

The funeral took place on Wednesday, service being conducted in the Church of the Sacred Heart, Marmora, after which the remains were interred in Marmora R. C. cemetery.

### OBITUARY

#### MRS. ELIZABETH MARRIN

Madoc, April 19—One of Madoc's oldest residents, Mrs. Elizabeth Marrin, passed away on Monday, April 5th, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. George Walsh, Madoc Township.

Mrs. Marrin, who was 93 years of age, was born at Stoco, the daughter of Thomas Mulrooney and his wife, Anne Corrigan. She married Patrick Marrin in 1873, and came as a bride to the old Marrin homestead near Madoc Village, in which her husband was born.

They moved to Marmora in 1911 and celebrated their golden wedding anniversary there. Her husband predeceased her in 1926, when she came to live with her daughter, Mrs. George Walsh. She was a faithful member of Sacred Heart Church in Madoc and saw the corner stone of the present Roman Catholic church laid.

One son, J. P. Marrin, predeceased her two years ago. Left to mourn her loss are Mrs. Thomas Hogan, of Windsor, Mrs. George Walsh, of Madoc, and Thomas Marrin, of Detroit.

The funeral was held on Thursday April 8th, to Sacred Heart Church Rev. V. H. Meagher officiating. Interment was made in the family plot in Marmora.
