

ACROSS THE ROAD, IN FRONT OF THE CHURCH, AND ON THE FLAT STRIP AT THE FOOT OF THE ROCKY HILLSIDE, WAS THE BURIAL GROUND. IT WAS NORTH-WEST FROM THE BUILDING AND IS NOW QUITE DIFFICULT TO LOCATE, BECAUSE NOTHING REMAINS BUT A FEW GRAVE-DEPRESSIONS, LEFT AFTER THE REMOVAL OF COFFINS. EVER-GREENS HAVE CREPT ACROSS THIS SECLUDED 'LAND OF THE UNKNOWN SLUMBERERS' AND HAVE SPREAD THEIR PEACEFULNESS OVER IT. ABOUT THIRTY GRAVES WERE IN THESE GROUNDS, BUT GREAT DIFFICULTY WAS EXPERIENCED WHEN IT BECAME NECESSARY TO DIG A GRAVE. IN FACT, AFTER EXAMINING THE SOIL AND SEEING THE GREAT SQUARES OF ROCK, ONE WONDERS HOW EVEN ONE GRAVE COULD HAVE BEEN EXCAVATED. EVENTUALLY, THESE ROCKS DEFTED ANY ATTEMPTS TO DIG, AND THE PLACE WAS ABANDONED. THERE WERE MONUMENTS HOWEVER, AND THOSE NOT REMOVED BY RELATIVES WERE BROKEN BY THOUGHTLESS RIVER-DRIVERS, WHO USED THE OLD CHURCH AS A 'HANG-OUT-CLUB'. FINALLY, THE EVER PRESENT AND DESPICABLE VANDALS CAME TO DESTROY THE REMAINING MOSS-COVERED MEMORIALS.

THE PRESENT SPELLING OF THIS FAMILY NAME IS MCCALLUM. ANOTHER, STILL SLEEPING HERE, IS JOHN, SON OF LAUGHLIN HUGHES WHO ASSISTED IN CHOOSING THE SITE FOR THE CHURCH. LITTLE DID THE FATHER KNOW THAT HIS OWN SON WOULD BE THE FIRST ONE TO BE INTERRED THERE - JOHN WAS DROWNED IN THE RIVER, NEAR THE CHURCH. THIS WOULD INDEED BE AN IMPRESSIVE SERVICE, FOR THE SYMPATHIZING SETTLERS WOULD COME FROM MILES AROUND ON THIS OCCASION.

DEATH OF KENNETH McCALLUM

On Friday, September 18th, at the family home at Deloro, the death occurred of Kenneth Francis McCallum, in his twenty-fifth year. Never of a very robust constitution, though apparently well, it had been known to his family for the past two years that his health was seriously undermined, and all that medical skill could do was done to renew or prolong the life of one whose fine qualities had endeared him to many beyond his immediate family. For the past three months some considerable improvement seemed apparent, so that when death came after an illness of about ten days the shock to those about him was a severe one.

The interment took place on Sunday, September 20th, in the Sacred Heart Cemetery, Marmora, and Solemn High Requiem Mass was sung on the following for the repose of his soul, as according to the Catholic Ritual, the Mass celebrated on Sunday is only for the benefit of the assembled congregation.

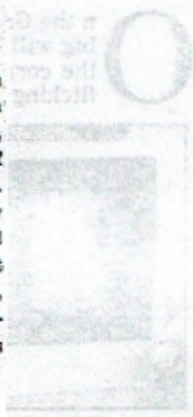

Their travels about 80 people only to have 200 show up. A few weeks later 400 people turned up for the next day. Today the turn on the outskirts of Marmora, about 200 kilometers west of Ottawa on Hwy. 7 has grown into perhaps the most popular pilgrimage in Ontario.

Any doubt about that was erased last October when a crowd in excess of 1,000 descended on the Marmora—the great day of the Shrine of Our Lady— to hear a delivery from Marmora.

In June 1921 they decided to have a small reunion of their fellow travellers. In preparation for the event they set up a wooded trail for the Stations of the Cross—the 14 images that depict the final events in the life of Jesus Christ.

In 1920 Creighton, his wife, Josephine and five of their children visited Medford, a village in Quebec-Province that had attracted special attention because of alleged apparitions of the Virgin Mary.

There have been many reports of apparitions of the Virgin Mary since 1860 brought on by the holy water from an underground spring. Sightings of a smiling, robed figure in a white dress, and messages sent through a stone tablet, have led to the building of a shrine at the Greenlides farm.

On Wednesday, the feast of the birth of Mary, hundreds of visitors came from as far away as Rochester and Buffalo, including those from the Ottawa area.

"It certainly has turned the local parish upside down," said Rev. John Greenlides, pastor of the Sacred Heart of Jesus Church in Marmora.

Just after 8 p.m. by the time well-lit lights the tap for the holy water, a crowd has gathered. A Whippoorwill man in a white robe.

ALEX McCALLUM ACCIDENTLY KILLED

On Monday, May 10th, the news of the accidental death of Alex P. McCallum was telegraphed from Montreal to his friends at Deloro. Mr. McCallum had spent the past year at McGill University, and at the close of the term had taken a position as Assistant Inspection Engineer with the Department of Railways and Canals. In the course of his duties he had evidently come in contact with a high-voltage wire between the nineteenth and twentieth spans on Victoria Bridge, and when found was taken to the Montreal General Hospital, where he passed away a few hours later.

The deceased had lived for the past fifteen years or more in the Southern States, Mexico and Cuba, returning to Canada early in 1917 to enlist at Vancouver with the Canadian Engineers, with whom he served until his discharge from the army in July, 1919.

Besides his mother the following members of his family survive: Miss Mary H., of New York; Anna, McDonald Hall, Guelph; Mrs. Martin Murray, Stirling; Mrs. R. H. Ellis, Ottawa; and Archie, Donald and Lillian of Deloro.

Mr. McCallum was a member of the Knights of Columbus and the G. W. V. A.

The early part of her life was spent in Marmora Township, where she was born.

The deceased is survived by her aged mother, four sisters and two brothers. The sisters are Sister Mary, of New York; Mrs. Martin Murray, Glenavon, Sask.; Mrs. (Dr.) Ellis, Ottawa, and Mrs. A. E. Robillard, Toronto. The brothers are Archie McCallum, of Deloro, and Donald, who resides in the States. Two brothers predeceased her.

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A. E. Robillard Dies At Gravenhurst

Gravenhurst, April 8. — After a long struggle with ill health, A. E. Robillard, for many years a familiar figure in the Civil Service at the Ontario Parliament Buildings, passed away at the Muskoka Hospital, Gravenhurst, Saturday afternoon.

Mr. Robillard entered the Surveys Branch of the Crown Lands Department as assistant surveyor and draughtsman in 1894, and served for a period of nearly forty years. He was superannuated in 1933. The son of the late Alexander Robillard of Ottawa, member of the Ontario Legislature for Russell County under the leadership of Sir Oliver Mowat, Albert Robillard came of a family which has linked five generations of French-Canadians in the Ottawa Valley. His grandfather, Antoine Robillard, was one of the contractors for the Rideau Canal, having constructed the city section and the locks at Parliament Hill, familiar to every visitor to Canada's Capital.

The stone house occupied by Colonel Bye of the Royal Engineers, when in charge of the canal construction, was also built by him. The Robillard quarries supplied the stone for many of Ottawa's public buildings, including the City Hall, the Basilica, the Normal School and Ottawa College. His uncle Dr. Adolphe Robillard, was for many years Medical Officer of Health for the city of Ottawa.

The late A. E. Robillard in his early manhood was an enthusiastic hunter of big game, having in his home trophies obtained in virtually every province in Canada and also Newfoundland. He had crossed the Rockies on horseback; and he penetrated through Northern Ontario by canoe to James Bay years before railway connection was established, in connection with Indian treaty payments. His home at York Mills is a veritable museum of Canadiana.

A widow, Lillian McCallum Robillard, formerly of Deloro, Ont., and three brothers survive, Dr. Alexander Robillard of Seattle, Eubald Robillard, of Ottawa, and Phillipe Robillard, of Montreal.

Some twenty-five years ago Miss McCallum accompanied a patient to New York City, and remained in practise there, post-graduating at Fordham Hospital and the Institute of Physio-Therapy in Philadelphia. Always keenly interested in religious and charitable work, she was an active member of the Third Order of St. Francis, whose adherents follow as closely in the footsteps of the great Saint of Assisi as may be done in the modern world.
