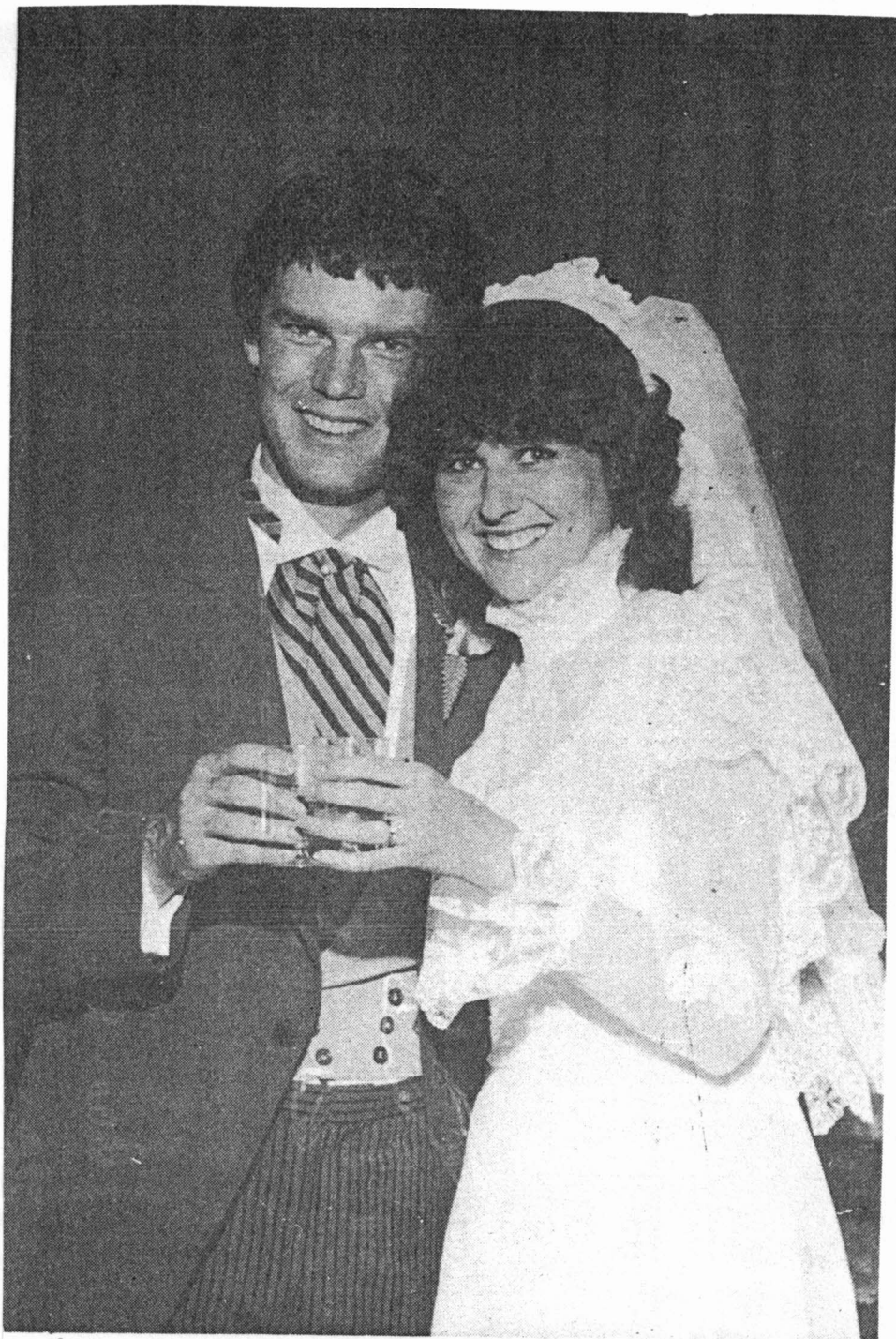

#### MRS. JAMES McGRATH

On Friday, June 17, there passed away at Oshawa General Hospital, one of the oldest and most respected residents of this district, Mrs. James McGrath. The former Mary O'Connor, daughter of Michael O'Connor and Elizabeth Wolfe was born in Marmora Township in January, 1867. She received the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation in the Old Sacred Heart Church, the ruins of which stand on the west side of Crowe River. She obtained her early education at Marmora Public School Section No. 1 and later attended Loretto Convent at Belleville.

In 1896 she was married to James McGrath and resided on their farm at Crowe Lake. In 1914 the portion of the farm fronting on the lake was converted to a Summer Resort, known and remembered by countless summer visitors as Tipperary House.

## MRS. ELIZABETH O'CONNOR

Another of the pioneers of Marmora township passed away last Thursday in the person of Mrs. Elizabeth O'Connor, at the ripe age of eighty-one years. She was born just a little distance west of where Marmora station now stands, the house being on part of the farm owned by her son Mr. E. D. O'Connor, and her maiden name was Elizabeth Wolfe. At that time the only roads were trails through the woods, and she knew all the hardships of pioneer life. After she was married to the late Michael O'Connor, who predeceased her about five years ago, they lived on the farm now owned by Mr. Matt. O'Connor until about twenty-one years ago, when they moved to Marmora village.

The late Mrs. O'Connor had been ill for a considerable time, and owing to her advanced age had lived very quietly for the past few years. Many of the older residents knew her intimately and esteemed her highly.

She is survived by one sister, Mrs. Hester McCallum, who is the last of a family of fourteen. She also leaves a family of three daughters and four sons. The daughters are Mrs. Jas. McGrath, Mrs. Jas. Murphy and Miss Margaret O'Connor. The sons are Matthew, Richard, Michael and Edward. All the family with the exception of Michael live in Marmora Village or township. The latter lives at Gilt Edge, Alta.

The funeral took place on Saturday forenoon, service being conducted in the Church of the Sacred Heart, Marmora, by Rev. J. T. Hanley, and interment took place in the R. C. cemetery.
