A tragic accident occurred shortly after noon last Thursday when a car driven by Arthur Fleming, of Marmora Township, went out of control and turned over at least twice, killing Mrs. Fleming and severely injuring their daughter, Mrs. Murray Walker. Mr. Fleming was not seriously injured.

The nurse attending him went to take his temperature when he suddenly collapsed, and was dead in a few minutes. The immediate cause of death was heart failure, though the long siege of sickness had lowered his vitality, and when the strain came on the heart it did not respond. The news was known in the town a few minutes afterwards and the universality of the sorrow expressed was a sincere tribute to the worth of tie man who had passed away.

TRUCK-TRAIN CRASH AT BONARLAW TAKES 2 LIVES * MAXINE FRASER AND SMITH FRASER

One of the most tragic accidents in the history of this area occurred about 8.30 a.m., on Saturday, Dec. 31st, when a light truck driven by Smith Fraser of Rawdon township skidded into the path of a C.N.R. train at the 12th line crossing. Maxine Fraser, aged 10, was instantly killed, Smith Fraser was fatally injured and Carol Fraser, 16, was critically injured.

Mr. Fraser was taking Carol to work at the Bonarlaw General Store and they were accompanied by Maxine. The railway track is obscured from view for some distance south of the crossing and it is impossible to see a train approaching from that direction until one is almost on the crossing. It is thought that Mr. Fraser did not see the train until it was too late to stop and that when he applied the brakes the truck slid on the icy road until the front end was just on the tracks. The train was proceeding toward the Marmoraton Iron Mine with a string of empty ore cars and was travelling fairly slow at the time of the accident. It dragged the truck about 40 feet up the track.

The injured victims were taken to the farm home of George Ray just west of the railway track and Dr. T. F. McCarthy of Marmora and Coroner Dr. E. A. Carleton of Stirling were both called and Bush's Ambulance removed Mr. Fraser and Carol, to Belleville General Hospital.

Mr. Fraser never regained consciousness and passed away on Monday evening.

The funeral of Maxine Temple Fraser was held on Monday afternoon, proceeding from her home to St. Mark's Church, Bonarlaw, where service was conducted by Canon J. M. Brownlie. Interment was in Mount Nebo Cemetery.

Smith Daniel Fraser was born in Marmora 43 years ago, the son of Mrs. Ida Fraser and the late Daniel McCurdy Fraser. He had lived in this area all his life.

For quite a number of years he was an employee of Deloro Smelting & Refining Co. Ltd.

Following his marriage to Stella Nobes they resided on the farm just west of the Bethlehem Mine on the old Madoc road. About, five or six years ago they sold the farm to Ross Rogers and moved to the 12th concession of Rawdon where they have since resided.

Recently he had been employed by the Armstrong Construction Co. at then rock quarry near Marmoraton Mine.

Of a quiet and friendly disposition, Smith Fraser was a good neighbour always ready to help any one in any way he could. He was a member of St. Mark's Anglican Church, Bonarlaw and of Marmora Lodge A. F. & A. M. No. 222.

He is survived by his wife, the former Stella Nobes and four daughters: Mrs. Don. Leonard (Lulubelle), Marmora; Carol in Belleville hospital and Laura and Lucy at home.

The funeral is being held this (Thursday) afternoon with service in St. Mark's Church, Bonarlaw.
