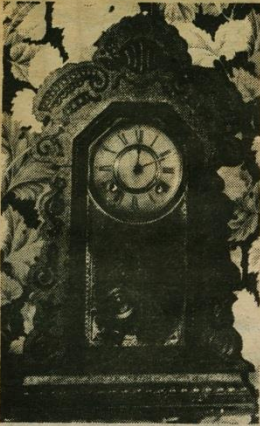

JEROME KEENE *

If the clock could talk...



If this clock could talk, it could tell us the murderer of Jerome Keene. The clock was purchased by William Smith from the estate of the deceased Mr. Keene. William also who sat on the Coroner's Jury inquest into Mr. Keene's death. William's grandson Ron Smith donated to the Historical Foundation.

(Editor's note: The following article, regarding the murder of Jerome Keene, was condensed from various articles which appeared in the Marmora Herald, February and March 1927. The whole story is available, unedited, at the Historical Foundation. It was provided by Cathie Jones)

Last Thursday afternoon, the people of Marmora learned with almost incredulous horror that Jerome Keene had been found lying in bed in his shack just north of the village with two gaping wounds in his head caused by two discharges of a shotgun in the hands of some unknown assailant.

Jerome Keene had been living alone for a number of years, except when working in the lumber camps or for other persons. While always friendly with those he met, and respected and well-liked by those who knew him, he was very quiet and retiring and seemed to mingle with others less and less as time went on. That, and the fact that he was expected to leave on a visit to relatives was the reason his death was not discovered sooner.

Not having seen or heard from him for some time his sister, Mrs. Lewis Gordineer, became anxious about him. As a result of her inquiries, Mr. Keene's body was discovered.

The shack, where the crime was committed, is about 12 feet square. From the nature of the wounds it would appear that the murderer had crept to the door and opened it and fired while still on his knees. If the victim was asleep when the first shot was fired it is unlikely he ever knew what happened.

Mr. Keene was 63 or 64 years of age at the time of his death. He had been married twice.

The body was discovered by John and Charles Gordineer, and the coroner, Dr. W.S. Harper, of Madoc, was called. He instructed Constable Gordineer to secure persons to form a jury.

A number were requested to attend at the town hall and the following were sworn in as a Coroner's Jury: William Linn, Samuel Moffatt, Till Neal, Hugh

Gillen, Fred Johnston, Thomas Warren, and William Smith.

After being sworn in, the jury accompanied Constable Gordineer to the scene of the crime to view the remains, and the inquest was adjourned until Monday, Feb. 21, 1927.

The oft-adjourned inquest was finally held in late March. The town hall was packed to the doors, probably over 600 crowded into the building, with many more being turned away at the door.

Coroner Dr. W.S. Harper presided and Crown Attorney Bryson Donnon examined the many witnesses. After hearing the evidence, the jury brought in the following verdict:

"That Jerome Keene came to his death while asleep in his shack, Lot 9, Conc. 4 Marmora Township, on some date after December 20, 1926, and before February 15, 1927, as a result of being shot in the head by two charges of a shotgun in the hands of a person or persons unknown."

WILBERT KINGSTON *

of West Huntingdon, succumbs after a Brief Illness. Died of Pneumonia.

The friends of Wilbert Kingston have been called upon to realize the sad truth of the saying "In the midst of life we are in death." To see the strong young man cut down at the very threshold of an active career, was a sight to compel even the most thoughtless to pause and ponder over the uncertainty of life. On the Saturday previous to his demise Mr. Kingston had been ploughing and engaged in the various duties about the farm. That night symptoms of pneumonia became manifest, and in spite of the best efforts of physician and friends he grew steadily worse and was called home at an early hour on Thursday morning. So sudden and unexpected was the fatal termination that the reports were scarcely believed. Only a few of the nearest neighbors had even heard of Mr. Kingston's illness.

Mr. Geo. A. Kingston, a brother of the deceased, was in attendance at the Normal College in Hamilton, and the first intimation he had that his brother had been ill, was the telegram announcing his death. He hurried home to find that the sad news was only too true.

The funeral service was held in West Huntingdon Methodist Church on Saturday morning Oct. 28th; when the pastor, Rev. W; V. Sexsmith, delivered a feeling address from the text " But it is good for me to draw near to God."

Deceased was born twenty-eight years ago at West Huntingdon. He was the son of John and Elizabeth Kingston, and was the eldest of three children. His brother George, and his sister Ella, as well as both his parents survive him. Genial and kindly dispositioned, he made firm friends wherever he went.

In his character there was a genuineness that disarmed suspicion and made him respected and loved by all. Seldom is there seen such a universal expression of grief as could be witnessed during the impressive service at the church. To those who mourn his untimely death we tender our sincerest sympathy and trust they will find consolation in the lessons of his blameless life and in the hope of a glad reunion when the morning shall break, and the shadows shall flee away.

On Sunday another physician was called in consultation, when all hopes of his recovery were abandoned. He lingered till nearly three o'clock on Monday afternoon when he breathed his last. He was about 55 years of age, and had always lived in this section, where he was well, and favorably known: He leaves a widow, but no children. Several brothers are residents of this county. He belonged to the Masonic and Orange orders and his funeral, which takes place today, will be under the auspices of the latter order.

MARGARET KIRBY

Margaret Kirby, 24-year-old Peterborough, girl, was drowned in a pond two miles east of Marmora on the north side of Number 7 highway on Saturday afternoon. Miss Kirby had been a Bell Telephone operator in this city for the past year, lived with her brother and two sisters at the Nova Scotia apartments on George street. She had been in ill health and had been on sick leave from work for about 3 weeks. She was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Kirby. With a sister, she had been a guest of her uncle, Mr. and Mrs. D. O'Connor of Marmora for about a week.

The C. N. R. track passes the O'Connor residence about 700 yards north of the pond. With her sister, Agnes, and two cousins, the deceased had planned Saturday to wait down to the pond as had been their daily routine for the past week. As the other girls were busy with household duties, the deceased strolled ahead. After some minutes had passed, neighboring children went to the pond to bathe, noticed her form lying face downwards at the edge of the water, against the bank, and in only about two and a half feet of water. The alarm was quickly spread but all efforts to revive her failed. Dr. H. Crawford and Constable P. Gray of Marmora were on the scene promptly, but were unable to revive her. Dr. S. S. Eagleson of Madoc; county coroner, said an inquest would not be necessary. The circumstances pointed to the fact that the girl had either been subject to a fainting spell or had suffered a heart attack. The body was later removed to the residence of her aunt and uncle. The funeral will be held from that residence on Tuesday morning.
