A. W. CARSCALLEN DEAD *

Passed Away at Marmora on Tuesday Morning A well-known resident of this county passed away at his residence in Marmora at ten o'clock Tuesday morning in the person of Alexander William Carscallen, ex-M.P., aged 62 years. He was a son of the late Edward R. Carscallen. of U. E. Loyalist stock, who was on active service as a lieutenant in the Canadian militia during the rebellion of 1837. He was born in the village of Selby, in the township of North Frederickburg, County of Lennox, in 1814. He was educated at the Napanee Academy and at the University of Nashville, Tennessee. In 1875 he was married to Marcie Pringle, who preceded him to the grave a few years ago. By this issue he leaves two children, Frank, of Marmora, and Mrs. James Parker, wife of the assistant general-manager of the Sovereign Bank at Montreal. He was married again a few years ago and his widow survives. The deceased was quite wealthy. For many years he was a private banker and broker, real estate dealer and lumber merchant in the village of Marmora, and was the original owner of the now celebrated Cordova gold mine. He was also a Justice of the Peace and had been a Councillor and Reeve of his township and chairman of the School Board. He was first returned to the House of Commons at a bye-election on Dec. 30, 1892. when Sir Mackenzie Bowell, the then member for North Hastings, was appointed to the Senate. Mr. Carscallen was re-elected at the general elections of 1896 and 1900 and retired in 1904, when the County was gerrymandered and made into two constituencies. DIED FROM PARALYTIC STROKE AFTER ILLNESS OF ONE WEEK. FUNERAL TOOK PLACE FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

Mr. A. W. Carscallen, the first citizen of Marmora, died at his residence Tuesday morning, Feb. 12th. He took a paralytic stroke on Monday of Feb. 4th, from which he never regained consciousness. For a number of years he had been troubled with a weak heart which no doubt hastened his death, though up to a week ago he was about town and regularly at his office.

Mr. Carscallen was 68 years of age. He was born at North Fredericksburg, Lennox County, on 14th October, 1814, He was educated at Napanee Academy and afterward at Nashville University, Tennessee. He then taught school a short time and gave up teaching to work for the old Page Lumber Company which brought him to Marmora. The Page Company sold out to Rathbun Company and Mr. Carscallen worked for the latter company. He was at different times a partner with the late Geo. W. Bleecker, the late W. E. Gladney and also for some years operated the Pearce Co. .saw-mills here. During the later years he conducted a private bank there and a few years ago sold out to the Sovereign Bank. Since then his business career has not been so active though he acted as executor for several estates and as agent for several leading Insurance Companies.

During these many years of faithful attention to business he amassed a considerable fortune, large in fact for a town the size of Marmora. In his earlier life he took an active interest in municipal matters and re presented Marmora and Lake as Reeve and attended County Council. When Sir Mackenzie Bowell was appointed to the Senate. Mr. Carscallen was elected M.P. for North Hastings. That was in the year 1892. He was re-elected in 1896 and again 1900. In the year 1904 North Hastings was portioned off with West and East Hastings and he retired in favor of Mr. E. Guss Porter, the present member.

In 1874 he married Marcia Pringle, who died of tuberculosis some years, ago leaving two children now surviving, Mrs. James Parker, of Montreal, and Frank Carscallen, of Weyburn.

In May 1905, Mr. Carscallen was married to Mrs. Gladney, who survives him. For some years A. W. Carscallen had been in anything but robust health, his heart giving him much trouble. In early life and to the end, Mr. Carscallen was a worker not only with his hands, but with his active brain and the result is seen in the fortune he accumulated, in the firm grasp he maintained over his political party in North Hastings and in fact with everything to which he applied himself.

The mining industry owes much to him as he developed the Cordova, Gold Mine and sold it to the present owners. Besides he was for years connected with the mining industry generally. Mr. Carscallen was Conservative both in politics and business, but at the same time he was active and energetic. With his fine logical, clear brain he would have shone brightly in a larger centre. But he was not strongly fired with great ambitions, but it can be truly said of him that he had brains. Everyone felt it even if they did not understand or always sympathize. One of those types of men who take an inflexible course, whether popular or unpopular. Mr. Carscallen was a pretty good type of the keen, modern intellect, worked on the truly progressive principle of the survival of the fittest without unkindness or harshness. Many could not and did not appreciate this. That was not his fault. He would be the last man to wish to be painted a saint. No doubt he made some mistakes. At the same time they were few and his sane and good acts are many. He was not a sentimentalist though kind of heart in a real sense and a man whose home life was of the very best and highest type, being affectionate to his family, home-loving and hospitable Mr. Carscallen reminded one of those good old skips of oak that always bravely and successfully withstood every storm it came against. And though decidedly modern in his business career he was a simple upholder of orthodox religion and a faithful member of the Church of England. A truly great man has crossed the bar. The funeral took Place on Friday afternoon, and was largely attended by friends and acquaintances from near and far..

W.Carscallen, Esq., of Marmora, the representative of North Hastings in the House of Commons, was scarcely a surprise as the deceased lady had been in poor health for a number of years, and her condition was given up as hopeless for months past. She was a victim of consumption last winter. Mr. Carscallen took her to California in the hope that the salubrious climate of that country would bring relief, but in this they were sorely disappointed, and after their return to their home in Marmora the deceased continued gradually sinking despite every care and attention that human mind could think of, until death relieved her sufferings.
