JOHN N HAMILTON *

At 4 a. m. on Sunday, Feb. 25, 1923, there passed from time to eternity one of the oldest and most highly respected citizens of Marmora township in the person of John N. Hamilton. He had been in as good health as usual until Saturday evening when he came from the barn where he had been feeding some stock. He complained of his heart being weak and as he was retiring he said, "I feel that my heart is failing me." He went to sleep and nothing unusual was noticed until about 4 o'clock when his wife heard a gurgling in his throat. She called him by name but received no answer. His soul immediately went out to be with God.

Mr. Hamilton was born in the Beaver Creek settlement, about six miles from Marmora, where he lived till he grew to manhood. While a young man he and his brother, Stephen, secured 200 acres of timber to the north Marmora settlement while it was as yet a standing forest. They built a shack and began clearing the land to make for themselves a home. They passed through many hardships but as time rolled on, they prepared a comfortable home and began to enjoy what they had formerly struggled for. They had seen the land of this community cleared and the shacks of early years give way to more comfortable homes.

Since their early life in this community many changes have taken place. They have seen many of their friends and neighbors pass out of this world and others that have sold out and moved away.

He was the only man of the pioneers living in the settlement at the time of his death, his brother Stephen passed to his reward about 22 years ago.

Mr. Hamilton was united in marriage to Miss Nancy Wells 33 years ago. To this union was born three sons and two daughters. The oldest son Hogle, died at the age of three years.

Mr. Hamilton was always known as a very kind and loving husband and very affectionate to his family. He was always ready to lend a helping hand to his friends and neighbors in time of need and upright in his dealings and will be greatly missed in the community in which he lived.

He was converted about 16 years ago after which he became a member of the Free Methodist church which he loved and honored till death. He leaves to mourn his loss his wife, two sons, John Harold and Herbert Reginald at home and two daughters, Mrs. Rev. T C. Hutchings, of Honsey's (?) Rapids, and Miss Evelyn at home and a host of friends.

His funeral services were conducted in the Methodist church at Marmora by Rev. L. Slingerland assisted by Rev D. R. Clare, and Rev. G. Mitchell. His remains were laid to rest in the Marmora cemetery to wait the resurrection of the just.

MRS. NANCY HAMILTON *

Death came very suddenly last Friday evening to a life-long and highly esteemed resident of Marmora township in the person of Mrs. Nancy Hamilton. She had been in her usual health until Friday afternoon, when she complained of not feeling well, but her condition was not considered serious. Later on she became much worse and passed away in a short time.

The deceased was seventy years of age last Thursday and had lived all her life in Marmora Township. She was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wells, pioneers of the township. A good neighbor, kindly and sympathetic, always ready to help anyone in trouble, she had a large circle of friends and was highly esteemed by all classes. For many years she had been a devoted and active member of the Free Methodist Church and Ministers of that denomination always found a warm welcome in her home.

About forty-eight years ago she was married to the late John N. Hamilton, who predeceased her on Feb. 25th, 1923. The latter, as a young man, with his brother Stephen, secured 200 acres covered with virgin forest in North Marmora. They erected a shack and by hard work cleared the land and made the fine farm, where the late Mrs. Hamilton went as a bride and lived all her married life. She is survived by two daughters and two sons: Mrs. T. C. Hutchings, Picton; John Harold Hamilton, on the homestead; Mrs. James Kennedy, Cordova; and Herbert R., Windsor. The eldest son, Hogle, died when about three years of age.

She is also survived by two brothers, John Wells, of Marmora, and Charles Wells, of Marmora Township. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon and was one of the largest held for some time, many relatives and friends coming to pay their last tribute to the deceased.

Service was conducted in St. Andrew's United Church, Rev. R. Babcock, of Picton, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. W. Kay Warkworth; Rev. S. B. Griffith, Peterborough and Rev. N. Bosko, pastor of Marmora circuit of the Free Methodist Church. The service was a very impressive one and tribute was paid to the many fine qualities of the deceased. Interment took place in the family plot in Marmora Protestant cemetery.

In 1962 they sold their business and moved to Stouffville after buying the Maple Leaf Dairy there. Later Frank sold most of his interests to Silverwoods and worked with them until his retirement.

Frank and Viona were instrumental in starting the Pentecostal Church in Stouffville. but their hearts never left Marmora.

A sad drowning fatality occurred in Deer river Belmont township, last Sunday afternoon by which two bright young lives were suddenly cut off. The victims of the tragedy were Charles Ronald, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Moloney, and Wilbert, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Haughton. The former was fourteen years of age and the latter nearly twelve years old. The boys were in bathing at a spot which was quite shallow, except in one place, where there was a deep hole. There was quite an eddy in this hole and the bed of the river, along the edge of the hole was of rock. The boys started to walk along this rock, but it was slimy and slippery and first one, and then the other, shot into the hole which was about twenty feet deep. An alarm was soon given and the fathers of the two boys along with a number of others hurried to the scene of the accident. The bodies were recovered in a short time by diving, but it was too late to resuscitate them.

The lads were great chums and were almost inseparable. Their parents lived on opposite sides of the boundary line between Belmont and Marmora, Mr. and Mrs. Moloney living on the Belmont side and Mr. and Mrs. Haughton in Marmora and the boys were together whenever possible. Both were bright and promising and were popular with their schoolmates and others who knew them. The sympathy of the whole community goes out to the bereaved families. The funerals took place on Tuesday, both starting at 9 a. m. and proceeding to Marmora where service was held in the R. C. for Church for Charles Moloney, after which the remains were interred in the R. JACK HERMAN KILLED

Marmorora was the scene of another tragedy on Saturday night, October 10th, when John Edward Herman was shot and killed in his home on Madoc Street.

Marmorora police were called to the home shortly before midnight and found Herman lying on the kitchen floor with a bullet wound in his chest. Drs. Parkin and McCarthy were called and pronounced the man dead. The Ontario Provincial Police were called in and Mrs. Dorothy Joan Herman, 35-year-old wife of the dead man was arrested and taken to Belleville jail, where she was later charged with murder,

The case was turned over to the criminal Investigation Dept. and Inspector Don Nichol of Toronto took charge. An autopsy showed a .22 calibre rifle bullet in the heart.

Mr. Herman was 39 years of age and was born in the Muskoka district.

After serving overseas in the 2nd World War he was employed as a mechanic at a garage in Havelock. The family moved to Marmorora about ten years ago and for a time Mr. Herman worked as mechanic in local garages. For the past five years he had been employed at the Marmoraton Iron Mine, which is closed at present owing to the steel strike.

He was a son of Mrs. Elizabeth Switzer of Orillia and her former husband, the late John Herman. He is survived by his wife the former Dorthy Joan Keiby, who he married while overseas during the war. She is a native of Surrey, England.

Also surviving are his mother; five children, John 15, Joyce 10, Stanley 6, Carl 4, Wayne, 14 months; four sisters; Mrs. Margaret Johnson of California; Mrs. Lydia Williamson, Peterborough; Mrs. Irene Jewell, Hastings, and Mrs. Connie Lewis, Orillia; and two brothers Lawrence of Peterborough and Carl of Aurora and a half-brother Bruce Switzer of Aurora.

Mr. Herman was a member of the Executive of Marmorora Branch No. 237 Canadian Legion, a member of Spring Brook Lodge I. O. O. F. No. 429 and of Marmorora Public School Board. He was on the executive of Marmorora Rod and Gun Club and was an enthusiastic angler and hunter. He was also a member of Marmorora Volunteer Fire Dept.

The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon with service conducted by Rev. R. G. Fleming at St. Paul's Anglican Church and interment in the Veteran's Plot at Marmorora Protestant Cemetery. CARL HEUMANN

Following an illness of several months Carl Heumann passed away in Belleville Hospital on Sunday afternoon aged 50 years and 2 months. The circumstances of his demise have aroused the deepest sympathy throughout the community for the bereaved family. One of the contributing causes to his illness in the first place was worry over business conditions, due to the economic depression, which has wrecked so many hopes. The deceased was born in Weimar, Germany. His father, Richard Heumann was the first to introduce "the artificial stone industry into that country. He afterwards taught his sons, Carl and Fritz, the processes he had learned. They became very proficient and the late Carl Heumann was said by experienced architects to produce the best artificial stone made in Canada. Mr. and Mrs. Carl Heumann came from Germany to Quebec in 1912, and after residing in that province for ten years moved to Kitchener where he was associated with Mr. Caspar Braun.

Less than two years ago the Heumann brothers, Carl and Fritz, with their families came to Marmora and prepared to carry on business under the name of the Keystone Company. The old Marmora Cooperage Company building was taken over and transformed into an up-to-date plant for the manufacture of artificial stone. Unfortunately the business depression became worse and worse and building construction practically ceased all over the country so there has been little demand for stone of any kind and the factory has been unable to operate to any great extent. The deceased by his friendliness and courtesy had made a good many friends in Marmora who regret his passing.

He leaves a widow and one son, Gerald, and his brother, Fritz, of Marmora, and two sisters, Helena and Martha, of Jena Germany.

The funeral took place from his late residence, Marmora township, yesterday afternoon, and proceeded to St. Andrew's United Church where service was conducted by Rev. C. W. Hollingsworth. Interment took place in Marmora Protestant Cemetery. .
