He would have graduated next month and had accepted a position with the Ontario Hydro.

In addition to his parents he is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Thomas Lewis (Isobel) of Detroit and Miss Phyllis Hickey, at home. He was "a member of St. Paul's Anglican Church. The deceased was a consistent Christian and a loving wife and mother. The sympathy of the whole community goes out to the bereaved family in their great loss. The funeral took place on Saturday service being conducted in the Deloro Hall by Rev. Rich. Irving, after which the remains were interred in Marmora cemetery.
