DAVID DANIEL JOHNS *

As noted in our last issue one of the oldest residents of Marmora township passed away suddenly while at the supper table on Tuesday evening. June 20th, in the person of David Daniel Johns.

Deceased was the oldest of a family often who grew up to manhood or womanhood. He was born on the farm now occupied by Mr. Wm. Hilton, and has lived nearly all his life in the same neighborhood. Great changes have taken place in the county during, his lifetime. During his early life, Marmora was known as "The Works," the smelting of iron ore being the chief industry.

There was no railway here then and nearly all merchandise had to be hauled from Belleville or brought on horseback.

The late Mr. Johns was of a quiet and retiring disposition and never took any active part in politics either municipal or otherwise. By his kindly disposition and integrity he won the friendship and esteem of his neighbors and all who learned to know him well. He was twice married his first wife being Miss Margaret Perry, of Peterborough. He had no family by this wife. His second wife was Miss Clara Maybee, of Colborne, who predeceased him about two years ago, and by whom he had four children. Anna the eldest died about twenty years ago, and the others are: Miss Lena and Messrs. Archibald and Harry. He is also survived by three brothers and two sisters as follows; S. M. Johns, of British Columbia, Alex, of Tenn., M C. Johns and Mrs. S. M. Bleecker of Marmora and Mrs. Geo. W. Walker, sr., of Dauphin, Man. The funeral services were conducted in St. Paul's Church on the afternoon of June 22nd, Coronation Day, and were very largely attended. The funeral sermon was preached by Rev. C. M. Harris.. JOHNSTON FIRE – CORDOVA MINES

Mother Rescues Boy of 5 but Four Children Perish as Flames Destroy Home

Neighbors Raise Ladder to Upper Window, But Are Driven Back by Heat – Woman Burned

Cordova Mine. Jan. 23—

Powerless to help, Mrs. Clara Johnston, wife of David Johnston, air-compressor operator in this small mining village, was forced to watch in 20 below zero temperature while four of her children perished in a fire which destroyed their small, two-storey frame dwelling late last night. Mrs. Johnston, almost overcome by the mounting flames, managed to struggle through a downstairs window carrying her five-year-old son Donnie in her arms..

Sleeping in upstairs rooms, the remaining four children were trapped as flames swept the building.

The fire is believed to have started in the ceiling of the first floor from an overheated stove pipe. Two wood stoves heated the dwelling, and the pipes went through the ceiling and second floor to the roof.

Cordova Mines is 41 miles north of Belleville. Asleep downstairs, Mrs. Johnston was awakened by smoke and flames, and only had time to snatch her youngest child from its crib and shout to the others upstairs. . .

"I called to Melbourne, my oldest son, as I ran to the stairway," Mrs. Johnston told neighbors after her escape. "I heard him answer, but I couldn't tell what he said. The stairway was almost burned through then, and it was all I could do to get outside with Donnie."

BADLY BURNED

Mrs. Johnston" was treated for severe burns about the neck and back. Her five-year-old son was uninjured.

Those who lost their lives were: Melbourne, 14; Dorothy, 12; Jack, 10. and Wallace, 7.

Responding to the alarm, villagers were virtually helpless as the flames enveloped the entire building. 'A volunteer bucket-brigade was formed, but the intense heat made approach to the house impossible. As well, water was scarce because of the extreme cold weather;

First alarm was given by Lorne Bowen and Jim Barrons, who reside across the street from the Johnston-home.

"The entire upstairs floor was ablaze, when I first noticed the fire", Mr.. Bowen told The Telegram "By the time we got across to the house, the flames were coming out the ground floor windows. Mrs. Johnson came out of the front window carrying Don. She screamed "The children are caught upstairs. . Get them out."

"We threw a ladder against the house to an upstairs window, but it was absolutely impossible to climb it because of, the heat," Mr. Bowen confirmed, "We tried using an extinguisher that we had taken with us from the store across the street, but it wasn't any good because the fire had too much of a start." "

SAVE FURNITURE

A second frame dwelling scarcely ten feet from the Johnston home fell prey to the flames a few minutes later: Mrs. G.. W. Steenburgh, occupant of the house,, escaped in safety, and the greater part of her furniture was removed as it became evident the house could not be saved.

County Constable Percy Gray and Highway Officer J. Hatch, of Mar mora arrived and supervised the search for the bodies in the ruins.

Shortly before midnight, the charred remains of two of the children had been found, huddled near the outer walls of the house.

Huddled beside one was found the body of

"Lucky," the Johnston police dog, which, was a faithful companion of the children.

Shortly afterward, Provincial Constables Everett Smith and D. Carruthers arrived from Belleville and took charge of the investigation. No decision was reached last night as to whether or not an inquest would be held. Further search of the ruins resulted in location of the bodies of the remaining two children, and these were removed under direction of Constable Smith, to be placed in rough packing boxes, side by side, near the home.

FATHER WORKING

David Johnston, father of the ill fated mining family, was working on the night shift of the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company workings at the time of the tragedy.

Hurrying to the scene, he all but collapsed with grief, and friends found it necessary to forcibly restrain him from entering the still-flaming pyre in which his four children lost their lives. Near collapse early today, Mr. and Mrs. Johnston were under doctor's care at the home of a friend, Mrs. E. Fitzgerald.

Residents of this centre of 275 inhabitants were shocked by the tragedy, which all but wiped out the Johnston family, who have been living here for the past three years.

They had previously lived in Queensboro

A ghost town" until three years ago, Cordova has been a hive of activity since operations were begun by the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company in 1935. A present nearly 75 men are employed in the mine. Majority of the houses in the village are similar to the small frame dwelling in which the Johnston children lost their lives.

Employees Give Day's Pay to Aid Family

CORDOVA MINES, Jan. 24. —

Employees of the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company at Cordova voted on Monday to contribute one day's pay this week to their fellow worker, Dave Johnston who lost his four children and all of his worldly goods in a disastrous fire on Sunday night. There are about seventy employees in the mine, office and smelter and the men average four dollars a day. Villagers are also planning to hold a shower at one of the houses in Cordova Mines so that furniture bedding, dishes and clothing may be obtained. Mrs. Johnston escaped from the fire clad only in a night dress, and five-year-old Donald who was carried to safety by the mother was clad only in pyjamas.

They lost everything including furniture, their sewing machine and all clothes and personal effects. Neighbors provided Mrs. Johnston and the child with clothing and today, more clothing was purchased by the husband. The mother suffered burns on the body and hands and this coupled with the shock and sorrow of losing her four children made medical attention necessary. She is reported, however, to be making progress towards recovery and was able to be out of bed today according to a report from the village.

Four Victims Buried

At ten-thirty this morning the remains of the four little children who met death in the fire were laid to rest in Marmora Cemetery Friends of the family attended a brief funeral service at Mallett's Funeral Home in Marmora which was conducted by Rural Dean B Caldwell.

The children were Melbourne age 14, Dorothy, 12, Jackie 10 and Wallace 8. Donald, the youngest of the family was the only child who escaped.

It was reliably reported today that Dave Johnston, the father of the children, carried no insurance on the furniture and it will be necessary to start again from scratch.

**Tragic Fire At Cordova
Four Children of Mr. and Mrs. David Johnston Burned To Death.
Mother and Little Son Escape Latter Burned.**

About 9.30 o'clock Sunday evening fire broke out in the residence of Mr. and Mrs. David Johnston at Cordova Mines with tragic results. Mr. Johnston, who operates the air compressor for one of the shifts, was at work and the family had retired early. All had fallen asleep And the house was filled with smoke when Mrs. Johnston, who slept downstairs with her younger son, Donald, age 5, was awakened by the dog which was also in the room (illegible) ...she called to the children upstairs and then carried Donald outside and set him down and rushed into the building to go upstairs, but Donald followed her and she had to take him out again. By the time she returned, the stairway was a mass of flames and the children upstairs were trapped and perished in the flames. They were Melbourne, age 14, Dorothy, 12, John 10 and Wallace, 8.

A call for help was sent to Mar mora and County Constable F. Gray, Provincial Officer Hatch, and a number of others took one of the chemical engines out on G. Steenburgh's truck, but it arrived too late to check the fire or save the adjoining building, which was also destroyed. It was used to put out the fire in the burning embers so that the bodies might be recovered Consts. Gray and Hatch gathered up thee charred remains of the children. From the location of the bodies apparently all but the little girl had left their beds. One had gone to the head of the stairs and another had crowded back into a corner. It was an experience that the officers do not want to ever go through again.

Mrs. Johnston was badly burned about the arms and back and is also suffering from shock and exposure. With the temperature around 10 below zero she was forced out by the fire clothed only in her night dress. She is under a physician's care at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Terry Fitzpatrick.

An overheated stove or stovepipes are thought to have been the cause of the fire. Apparently it smoldered for a time and when the door was opened and the air rushed in it burst into flames. Quite an old frame building it burned almost like tinder. It was owned by Consolidated Smelting and Mining Co. of Canada Ltd. Dr. Holdcroft, coroner, of Havelock, was summoned and after investigating the tragedy decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

The other residence, which was destroyed is said to have been owned by Mr. Ross Barrons. It was occupied by Mrs. G. W. Steenburgh, Mr. Arthur Steenburgh, Mr. Carman Steenburgh and Mr. Vance, principal of the Public School. It was the finest house in the village and the loss is estimated at \$3000.00. Most of the contents were removed by residents of Cordova. The funeral of the children was held on Tuesday morning, the remains of all four being placed in one casket. A short service was conducted by Rural Dean A. B. Caldwell at the undertaking parlor of F.N. Marett & Co. and interment was made in Marmora Protestant Cemetery.

Mr. & Mrs. Johnston, in addition to their terrible bereavement, suffered the loss of all their household effects, their clothing, etc. Friends and neighbours are showing their sympathy in a practical manner. Employees of The Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. at Cordova have voted a day's pay for the assistance of Mr. and Mrs. Johnston. Numerous articles of clothing and household furniture have been contributed and we understand subscription lists have been opened at a couple of places in Marmora.

***Rescuers Unable To Reach Four Children Trapped Upstairs Asleep In Beds
Mother And Child Escape Through Window
(By Peter McGillen)***

CORDOVA MINES, Jan. 23.—Four children ranging in age from 8 to 14 years were burned to death as they slept in the upstairs of their two-storey frame home in the village of Cordova Mines, forty miles east of Peterborough, on Sunday night. Their mother, Mrs. David Johnston, who was sleeping with the baby, Donald, aged 5, on a studio couch in the living room downstairs, was awakened by the child's screams, and fought through smoke and fire to the nearest window, which she smashed and escaped carrying the child with her. She was badly burned about the hands and neck.

The temperature was sixteen below zero when the fire broke out. Another dwelling directly west of the Johnston home was also burned to the ground, and the only occupant at the time of the fire, Mrs. G. W. Steenburgh escaped without difficulty. Neighbors saved all the furniture in the Steenburgh home.

The dead are: Melbourne Johnston, age 14 Jackie Johnston, age 10 Dorothy Johnston, age 12 Wallace Johnston, age 8
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Father At Work At Plant Of Smelters

The father, David Johnston, compressor operator for the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company, had gone to work at four o'clock on Sunday afternoon in the mine, working on the four to midnight shift. He was brought home by Jack Peacock, grocery store clerk, fifteen minutes after the alarm had been sounded and three neighbors had to restrain the grief-stricken man as he attempted to enter the house which was an inferno from top to bottom.

The screams of the mother was the first inkling the village had of the tragedy. Two men, Lorne Bowen and James Barrons, who were in Bowen's home directly across the street, rushed out and saw Mrs. Johnston standing on the front of the house in night attire, and five-year-old, Donald standing in bare feet. Clad only in flannel pyjamas on the verandah of the house next door where the mother had placed him before she started back to attempt saving the other children.

The men placed a ladder against the west side of the dwelling, smashing the upstairs window, and as Jim Barrons climbed the ladder, Mrs. Johnston ran to the downstairs window with the five-year-old child following her screaming in terror. Mrs. Johnston attempted to climb the ladder but two other men, Gerry Ward and John Quinlan, took her by the arms and assisted her across the road to the home of L. Bowen. The distracted mother was in hysterics and Mrs L. Bowen and her sister-in-law, Mrs. B. Lincoln, found her night dress scorched and her hands and neck badly burned. They put vaseline on her hands and soda on her throat and neck, and

wrapped her in warm clothes. It was very cold and the woman had been walking around in her bare feet. A few minutes later Bren Lincoln carried five-year-old Donald into the house. The child was chilled through and through.

Flames Block Attempts To Rescue Children

"When I reached the window I felt around with my hands, hoping to find a bed but a billow flames and smoke bust out in my face and drove me back. I called loudly and thought once I heard someone answer but the inside was like a furnace and I couldn't get in", Lorne Bowen said Jim Barrons and Ross Barrons both climbed the ladder, the latter taking a five gallon can of chemicals with him, but found it impossible to get inside

The Johnston house, was on the north side of the main street in the village and was a two-storey frame house. The fire is believed to have started from overheated stove pipes, and Mrs. Johnston told neighbors she too would have perished if the smoke and flames had not awakened the baby, The room was in flames as she battled her way to the west window and clambered through after smashing the glass, carrying the child in her arms. By this time the whole interior of the house was ablaze and neighbors who attempted rescue work said flames gushed out through the front door and the upstairs windows simultaneously, leaving absolutely no chance for the men to rescue the four children.

House Next Door Is Also Destroyed

Directly west of the Johnston home and separated only a ten-foot lane was a double house of frame construction owned by Arthur Steenburgh, who occupied the house with his mother, Mrs. G. W. Steenburgh, his brother, Carlen Steenburgh, and the school teacher, Cameron Vance.

Mrs. Steenburgh was alone at the time and had no difficulty getting out when the flames spread to her home. Neighbors immediately carried all the furniture from the Steenburgh home, while others attempted to slow up the fire with buckets of water. The water froze almost as fast as it was doused in the walls. It was the finest dwelling in the village and the loss is estimated at \$3,000. The Johnston home was owned by the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company. Volunteer fire fighters had some trouble saving a large frame tenement house directly across from the fire on the south side of the street and occupied by three families,

Another building east of this house and in the direct path of the flames because the wind was blowing strong from the northwest caught fire and the firefighters tore away the sheeting at one corner before they were able to extinguish the fire. This building housed a barber shop and pool room operated by Harry Bowen.

A chemical pumper from Marmora answered the call for assistance, but was of little value because the fire had made so much progress and the intense cold interfered with operation of the pump.

Three Bodies Recovered By Searchers

Both Mr. and Mrs. Johnston were taken to the home of Terry Fitzpatrick, a short distance down the road, where there, was accommodation, and were given treatment by Dr. Taft of Marmora, who quietened both with sedatives and gave further attention to the burns received by Mrs Johnston.

The full horror of the awful tragedy struck the rescue workers as four empty packing boxes were placed alongside the house foundation to receive the remains of the children as soon as they were found. Provincial Constable David Hatch and Constable Percy Grey of Marmora recovered three bodies shortly after one o'clock this morning, and it was noticed all were lying face down in the beds they had been occupying.

A short distance from one of the beds was found the remains of "Lucky" a mongrel dog which slept every night with Wallace, the 8-year-old boy. The dog had remained faithful even in the face of death quite evidently refusing to leave the side of his little pal.

All four children attend the public school in the village. Melbourne, the oldest was the Examiner carrier boy in the village, and both he and his sister Dorothy were in grade six, with the others in the junior room. The Johnston family moved to Cordova from Queensboro about two and a half years ago, and before that had lived at Flinton and Cooper. Mrs. Johnston is only 33 years of age.

Went To Bed Early

So far as could be learned last night the Johnston family had gone to bed at 8.30 and it was an hour later when the fire was discovered. The construction of the house is entirely of wood, and villagers believed the fire had been burning for some time before Mrs. Johnston was awakened. The interior burned like matchwood turning the whole structure into a flaming mass within a very short time.

Shortly after midnight Provincial Constables Carruthers and Smith of Belleville arrived and started an investigation into the disaster, which will be continued today, and Provincial Constable Hatch and Constable Grey gave up hope of locating the other body until the ruins, had cooled. At two-thirty both houses were piles of blazing embers and tangle wreckage. The tragedy is the worst within the memory of Cordova Village residents, and perhaps the entire county.

The half century old village has a population of about 300 people and most of the men are employed in the gold mine operated by the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company about a mile south of the settlement.

BRUCE HERBERT JOHNSTON

The funeral of Bruce Herbert Johnston of Marmora was held on Saturday afternoon, July 18th from the chapel of the G. Howden Funeral Home, Marmora, conducted by Rev. H. Dawson. Interment was in Marmora Cemetery. Bearers were Elgin Danford, Marshall McCoy, Carl Boyd, James Robertson, Herbert Wright, and Wellington Althouse.

Flower bearers were: Robert Davidson, ' Charles Curtis, . Ralph and Bruce McGregor, Leonard and Murray McGregor.

Mr. Johnston died" suddenly last Wednesday at his residence as the result of a heart attack.. He was in his 74th year. Born and educated in Marmora he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Johnston. He had lived in the community all his life.

He was employed at the Deloro Smelling and Refining plant at Deloro for many years after returning from France where he served with the 38th Battalion during World War 1. Mr. Johnston retired 12 years ago.

He was a member of Marmora Pentecostal Church and of the Royal Canadian Legion No. 237. He was well known and highly respected member of his community. Surviving are his wife, the former Pearl Davidson, two daughters, Mrs. M. (Muriel) McGregor of Marmora; Mrs. T. (Betty) Blair of Belleville and three sons, Bruce, Thomas and James all of Marmora. Also surviving are two brothers, Thomas of Fort Saskatchewan and Henry of Edmonton; 22 grandchildren and one great grandchild.

CURTIS JOHNSTON

Another of the older residents of the township passed away on March 26th in the person of Mr. Curtis Johnston, at the age of 71 years and 4 months. His death occurred at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Frank Rodgers, where he has been residing for some time, and was caused by heart trouble. He was only ill a few hours. The deceased was born in the township of Rawdon on Nov. 12th, 1854, and was a son of the late Benjamin Johnston. For a good many years, while Marmora was the centre of a big lumbering industry, the deceased was known as a capable woodsman and a clever and fearless river driver. Many of the older lumbermen will remember with pleasure their experiences with him in the woods and on the drive.

For some time he taught in the Ridge Road school, near Stirling, and then enlisted and went overseas with the 155th battalion. After his return from overseas he resided in Toronto for some time.

A year or two after leaving the army he married Miss Emma Grant, daughter of the late Wesley Grant and Mrs. Grant, of Marmora, About ten years ago they moved to Detroit where they had since resided.

Besides his widow, he leaves one daughter, Helen, and one son, Lawrence, the latter being at present in a Detroit hospital, where he underwent an operation. HENRY MITCHEL JONES * 50 YEARS OF SERVICE SEPT, Printed in 2004

Henry Mitchel Jones was born on 6th August, 1844 in Barbados, West Indies. He was the son of Reverend Henry Jones and Francis Ellen Gainchbury. After his father finished his tour in the West Indies, the family then moved to Worcester, England .

Henry spent his boyhood days at Boxford. When he was eighteen, Henry emigrated to Canada where he eventually attended McGill University in Montreal, Quebec to study medicine. After obtaining his degree, he practised medicine in Combermere, Ontario for a period of time. It is believed that he then moved to Marmora, Ontario where he practised medicine and later opened a Drug Store with his sister Francis Jones.

Henry's first wife, Elizabeth Bamber were married on November 27th, 1872 in Frankford, Ontario. Three children were born from this union ; Henry Clive (1873) , Francis Clare (1877) and Elizabeth Pearl (Feb 24th, 1884) Elizabeth Pearl died on 20th April, 1884, and her mother died on 6th March, 1884.

Henry remarried Mary Wilkinson, the daughter of Mr. & Mrs. James Wilkinson on June 30th, 1886 in Marmora. Mary had been born in England in 1862 and had moved to Canada with her parents at a very young age. Henry and Mary had four children - Muriel born in 1887, Charles Stewart in 1890, Olive in 1892 and Hubert in 1898.

Doctor Jones' house was number # 2 located on the South end of Main Street. It was a large white wooden house.

Hubert served in the Canadian Army as a Lieutenant Colonel. Olive taught school in the Toronto Public School System for years, Charles a graduate from the Peterborough Normal School, also taught school and died in 1934. Olive died 12th December, 1953. Muriel died in 1960. All are buried in the family plot at the Marmora Protestant Cemetery. After Elizabeth's death , Francis came to help her brother in his Drug Store. She liked Marmora and as a result stayed on and worked in the store with him for years. Francis died on March 10th, 1927 and is also buried at the Marmora Protestant Cemetery.

The Morton Drug Store chain was sold to Mr. Oliver (Dentist) on February 2, 1909. Dr. Oliver would later sell his business to James Patrick Marrin of Tweed. On May 24th, 1914, a fire completely destroyed the drug store. However, on November 26th, 1914, the new red brick Marrin's Drug Store was officially re-opened. It was built on the same site as the original Jones Drug Store. The new building was designed to have an apartment above the store.

The Marmora Herald , November 26th, 1914 wrote -

" J.P Marrin's building was created and fitted up with one idea of making it one of the most convenient and attractive drug stores to be found in eastern Ontario. The interior woodwork and fixtures are all mahogany finish .. while the ceiling is metal painted white".

This is the building now joined to the South end of the old Royal Hotel.

Henry Jones had lived in the Marmora community for over 50 years. He was a very enthusiastic lacrosse and hockey fan and played in the Deloro Orchestra for years. Henry died on March 23th, 1923 and his wife died on April 25th, 1947. Both are buried at the Marmora Protestant Cemetery.

He attended High School in Trenton and then took a position as teller in a bank in Ottawa. He decided he would rather go into, business of some other kind and returned to Marmora where he went into partnership with the late Harry Connor in the hardware store known for years as Connor & Jones Hardware. After the death of Mr. Connor, Clayton Potts, who had been employed by the firm as a clerk went into partnership with Mr. Jones and the firm was known as Jones & Potts until this fall when the partnership was dissolved. The school sections were very poor and received but little assistance from the Government, the teacher having to board around from house to house, and sometimes Miss Jandrew had to walk four miles to school and back again at night.

About thirty seven years ago she was united in marriage to Mr. Robert Jones, who with a family of seven children survive her. The names of the children are as follows: Mrs. Julius Bedore, Marmora; Robert of Toronto; Cyrus, of Peterboro and Charles, Hugh, Mildred and Francis. She is also survived by two brothers; W. J. Jandrew, principal of the George street school, Ottawa, and Charles, of Frankford, both of whom were present at the funeral. The only living sister Mrs. John Stacy, of North Bay, was unable to be present.

Mrs. Jones was operated on by Dr. Holdcroft, of Havelock, but it was found to be too late to be of any avail and the absent members of the family were immediately summoned all being at the bedside when the end came. Deceased was a member of St. Paul's Anglican church, and for many years was a very active worker in the interests of the church.

The funeral took place on Tuesday, service being conducted by Rev. C. M. Harris in the church. It was very largely attended.

ROBERT JONES *

After a comparatively short illness, following a stroke, Robert Jones passed peacefully away last Friday forenoon at the home of his son, Charles Jones, at the ripe old age of eighty-five years and ten months. He was a life long citizen of Marmora township, having been born on a farm close to the place where he passed away. He was one of ten children of the late Hugh and Anne Jones and was born on May 8th, 1853. He was the last surviving member of the family. His father was Reeve of Marmora Township in the years 1860-1864 and was also a Justice of the Peace.

Remarkable changes have taken place during the life time of the late Robert Jones. Much of Hastings County was still virgin forest and a trip to Belleville would be as memorable an event as a trip to New York is today. Frankford had not been erected into a Police village when he was born and Stirling was not incorporated until five years later. At that time Madoc, Tudor and Elzevir were all one municipality. County Council had control of road allowances and Township Treasurers were also treasurers for the school fund and paid to the teachers the small amount they received, upon the orders of the local superintendents. One of the earliest County By-Laws on record, No. 43, passed June 11th, 1852, attached the township of Lake to the township of Marmora. In 1869 a By-Law was passed by Hastings County for the endowment of a Professorship of Agricultural Chemistry and Mineralogy in Albert College Belleville. On March 25th, 1869, a by-law was enacted by the County that no taxes shall be levied in any of the minor municipalities within the County of Hastings for the purpose of paying for sheep killed. It was further enacted that no municipality shall be liable for any sheep killed in said municipality to any person or persons whatsoever, etc. To-day such regulations are under the control of the Province and are entirely different.

The late Robert Jones had a very retentive memory and liked to tell of conditions as they existed and events which happened in the early days and compare them with modern times. When he was a young man lumbering was the chief industry in the county and for about ten years he worked in the lumber camp for the Rathbun Company. The big drive of logs down the rivers and lakes each spring were among the outstanding events of the year.

For most of his life deceased was one of Marmora township's best known farmers. He was assessor for the municipality of Marmora and Lake for about fifteen years and had charge of the work the first year a colonization road grant was received by the municipality. He was also a school trustee for many years and a director of Marmora Cheese Factory. He was an ardent Conservative in politics and a member of the Anglican Church. He served as Rector's Warden at Trinity Church for some years.

The maiden name of deceased's mother was Anne Keys and she was a daughter of Royal Keys, one of the pioneers of Hastings County, who lived to the remarkable age of 107 years, 1 month and 26 days. He was a native of County Fermanagh, Ireland.

On January 17th, 1872, the late Robert Jones was married to Margaret Jandreau, of Rawdon township, who was then teacher at S.S. No. 2, Marmora. At that time teachers boarded around with families in the section in turn and received only a small amount in money. She passed away about thirty years ago. Seven children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Jones, six of whom survive him. Robert passed away years ago. Surviving are Mrs. Julian Bedore, Marmora; Mrs. A. Kaiting, Kingston; Mrs. H. Mitchell, Crediton; Cyrus Jones, Ottawa; Hugh, Belleville; and Charles, Marmora township. He is also survived by 37 grandchildren and 26 great grandchildren.

The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon from the home of his son, Charles Jones, to St. Paul's Anglican Church, Marmora. In spite of stormy weather and bad roads there was a very large attendance, the community turning out to pay their last respects to a good neighbor and highly esteemed citizen.

The funeral services were conducted by Rural Dean A. B. Caldwell, who preached an impressive sermon from the text "this is life eternal, to know Thee, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom Thou has sent," John 17:3. The hymns sung were "On the Resurrection Morning" and "Abide With Me." Interment was made in the family plot in Marmora Protestant Cemetery. The pall bearers were Messrs. L. E. Neal, John Bell, Dan Shannon, Bert Crawford, Irwin McCoy and John Moffatt.
