The deceased., who was in her 89th year, belonged to one of the pioneer families of Hastings County and she and her late husband were pioneers of Marmora Township. Her maiden name was Martha Jane Bacon and she was born in Madoc township. Sixty-one years ago she was married to the late Robert Lough, who predeceased her December 21st, 1933. She was only confined to her bed about two weeks before her death.

For the sixty-one years she had resided on the same farm, North Marmora, which was widely known, for its attractiveness and hospitality. The life of the early settlers was not easy. Land had to be cleared by hard work and money was scarce and markets, except for the lumber camps and local stores, were hard to reach. Many things that today are considered necessities were unknown, especially in rural areas, and roads were mostly trails for wagons, ox-carts or sleighs. In spite of the handicaps they erected a fine home and developed a farm of which they had reason to be proud.

Kindly and hospitable, good neighbors ready to help anyone in trouble the deceased and her late husband were held in very high esteem and had many friends, who delighted to visit at their home.

When one considers that the late Mrs. Lough was over 7 years of age when the late King Edward as Prince of Wales visited Canada in 1860 and that during 48 years of her life Queen Victoria reigned, it is difficult to realize the great changes that have taken place during her life time. The deceased could tell many interesting events of the early days and was always able to adapt herself to changing conditions.

For many years she, was a devoted member of the Methodist Church and since church union, of the United Church. Ministers always found a warm welcome in her home and received her hearty support.
