Mr. Stocker was driving a panel truck belonging to Mr. Basil McTaggart and when coming down the hill in front of the former home of the late Ira Murphy the brakes failed to hold the vehicle and the driver turned it into the bank in an effort to stop it. Instead of stopping it went up the side of the bank and toppled over. Apparently Mrs. Stocker partly opened the door to get out and when the truck upset, her head was crushed between the door and the side of the vehicle.

Mr. Stocker ran back to the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Vincent and called to Marmara Village for help. Dr. W. J. Donevan quickly responded and Provincial Constables J. H. Hatch and Thos. Lummiss, of Madoc, also, rushed to the scene of the accident.

As the accident to Mrs. Stocker was fatal, Coroner S. R. Beatty, of Madoc, was also called and after learning the particulars of the death decided no inquest was necessary.

The late Mrs. Stocker was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bailey, Marmora Township, and was twenty-two. years of age. She was the oldest of six children and is survived by four brothers—Douglas, Robert, Charles and Allan and one sister, Anna. She was married to Douglas Stocker m December 1946. The sympathy of the community goes out to the bereaved husband and her parents and other members of the family.

For a few years she worked in the telephone office and made a lot of friends in the village. The funeral was held on Saturday, September 18th, service being con ducted in St. Paul's Church by Rev. J. M. Brownlie. The service was attended by a large number and the many beautiful floral tributes were an evidence of the esteem in which the deceased was held. Interment took place in Marmora Protestant cemetery.
