AN EXPLANATION

In regard to the turkey taken from Mr. John Neill just before Christmas and found by him in a pasture field on Michael Ryan's farm on Dec. 20th, 1921.

On the morning of Tuesday, Jan. 3rd, 1922, a trapper came to Ryan's enquiring about a turkey. He gave his name as Brandon and told Michael Ryan that he went back north about the first of December and came out on the 19th. He said he had a talkey with him and a lot of other stuff and as he found it hard to carry it all he decided to hide the turkey in the field in a corner of the fence and make another trip after it. Brandon claimed it was near morning and he was tired out.

At that Ryan told Brandon to come along with him. Brandon said he would not and Ryan said well I will just have to fetch you, and told Brandon he was his prisoner.

Brandon then offered to settle with Ryan and the latter told him he would either settle then or before B. C. Hubbell. Brandon then took out a roll of money and counted out \$103.25, which he gave to Ryan.

Brandon then said he was going back north again to trap, and Ryan said "Well Brandon you walked into a trap and new you are out of the trap, you can go and trap, but don't try to trap John Neill."

PATRICK RYAN


Mr. Patrick Ryan, for many years a resident of Campbellford, died suddenly in Peterboro on Sunday while attending mass.

John Ryan, Marmora Pioneer

Last Saturday's Peterborough Examiner had the following sketch of the career of John Ryan, aged Marmora resident:

"Among the few local men who have spent years in shanties and river driving without consuming the liquor of those days, John Ryan, 84 year old resident of Marmora is to be numbered. Also, strange to relate, he has never fired a shot from a rifle.

An inveterate smoker, however, he testifies that he has used the pipe since he was five. In those days the clay variety was in vogue.

This sturdy old pioneer was born on October 9th, 1849, one of the sons of Patrick Ryan and Mary McEvoy. Patrick Ryan came to this country from Ireland when very young. For years he lived in Huntingdon Township where his son John and other children were born. John attended school in the 3rd Concession of Rawdon Township When he was about twenty-one years of age, he did his first work away from home. For about a year he was em ployed by the late Mrs. Sarah Lennon, who with her two daughters Rachel and Mary lived on a 100 acre farm in the 5th Concession of Marmora Township, the bridge crossing Beaver Creek at this spot being still known as Lennon's bridge.

The life of the shanty could not be resisted and so in Rathbun and Gilmour camps he found an outlet for his great strength. Few could exceed him in the art of handling logs. He drove a team for a great part of that time and for a few years was a river driver.

The two smartest river drivers he ever knew, he told The Examiner representative, were Tom Lavelle of Trenton and Dave McGarvey of Marmora. The former was the only man who could put the latter off a log. Lavalle later went to the States and amassed a little fortune through carrying off prizes in log rolling contests there.

The largest body of logs that Mr. Ryan remembers seeing extended from Beaver Creek to Crowe Bay, the distance of approximately nine miles, a mixed drive of the Rathbun and Gilmour Companies.

Close upon fifty-five years ago be settled on land in the 3rd Concession of Marmora Township. He later married Mary Ann, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Michael Bedore of Marmora Township, who shares with him and the children at home the creation of a cheery home atmosphere.

Two brothers and a sister of Mr. Ryan have also well exceeded the allotted span of life and share with him good health and spirits. Frank, who is 90 years of age, resides on the old homestead in Rawdon Township. Thomas lives on his farm in Marmora Township. Mrs. John Keenan, the sister, resides in Campbellford.

Mr. Ryan is a devout member of the Roman Catholic Church. As a boy he attended church at Madoc, when the parish priest there was Rev. Father E. P. Lawlor. Father Lawlor held masses in Marmora seventy years ago, being succeeded by Father Davies. Mr. Ryan has many memories of these two clerics.

Through his vision beginning to fail and infirmities incidental to old age overtaking him, Mr. and Mrs. Ryan moved into the village about six years ago. Though he is of quiet disposition and slow to speak Mr. Ryan treasures visits from his friends particularly from those who shared with him the rigors of shanty life over half a century ago, and he enjoys a good joke.
