

## DEATH OF EDWARD TOBIN

The following is taken from last week's North Hastings Review, the deceased being well known in Marmora.

The news of the death of Mr. Edward Tobin, of this village, which took place on Tuesday the 2nd inst., came as a great shock to his many friends and neighbors in and around Madoc. He had been ill with Typhoid fever for the past two or three weeks but his recovery was hoped for, until other serious complications set in a few days ago and death cut him off in his prime at the age of 31 years.

Mr. Tobin was for seven years in the employ of T. L. Nickle in the Agency business, afterwards opening for himself, and the last couple of years he has filled the responsible position of general district agent for the International Harvester Co. In all cases he "made good," being active, intelligent, and reliable in his business dealings. His early death will be generally regretted in many circles. He leaves to mourn his loss a widow, (nee Miss Kehoe) and two young children; father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Jos. Tobin, of Madoc township; brothers, John and Walter on the homestead, James of Madoc township, Patrick of Springbrook, and Charles of Cobalt. The sisters are Mrs. James Ryan of Holloway, Mrs. J. Murray and Mrs. Frank Christopher, of Peterboro, and Mrs. Edward Kehoe, Actinolite.

Deceased was a member of Belleville Lodge of the Knights of Columbus, and also a faithful attendant of the Roman Catholic Church. The funeral service was conducted this morning by Rev. Father O'Riordan at the Sacred Heart Church.
